Certified Potato Acreage Increased Over Last Year

Approximately 25 acres of potatoes in Deschutes county passed the inspection for certified seeds, according to information obtained from W. T. McDonald, county agriculturalist, who was in Bend today. A final inspection of the fields were made this week by E. R. Jackman, farm crops specialist of the O. A. C. extension service. About 40 acres of potatoes were approved for standard seed purposes. This is an increase in acreage over that of last year, the county agriculturalist makes known.
