

EX-COWPUNCHER BECOMES A PEER

Wyoming Man Will Get Title, Then Return

Earl of Portsmouth, Rancher in Western State 30 Years, to Remain Citizen

LONDON, Sept. 9. — Honorable Oliver Wallop, one time cow puncher on Wyoming ranges and now a ranch owner of Big Horn, today is earl of Portsmouth, through the death of his brother.

The new peer has long been a resident of Wyoming. He is married to an American woman, Marguerite Walker of Kentucky, and has two sons. The elder of these, Gerard V. Wallop, married to Miss Mary Lawrence Post of New York, becomes Viscount Lomington. He was a lieutenant in the world war.

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Sept. 9. — Oliver Henry Wallop, Wyoming cowboy and ranchman, today is the earl of Portsmouth.

The word was received here last night at Big Horn, the ranch in which the new peer lives, that his brother had died in London and that he was the heir to the earldom.

Wallop said he would assume the title and leave for England in a short time.

The Big Horn ranch consists of 3,000 acres and is just a short distance from Sheridan.

The new peer is 64 years of age and has lived in Wyoming for nearly 30 years.

The Wallop ranch here is one of the finest in the state. The buildings are all patterned after those in England.

Remains American

The present earl came to this country with the pioneers and is described by his friends here as being a hoon entertainer and a good fellow.

Although he is reported never to have been overly successful in his cattle business, he is rated as wealthy, the money thought to have come from his English interests.

People well acquainted with the earl describe his wife as a charming woman and say that the Big Horn ranch has been the scene of many entertainments.

Although Wallop always was very much of an Englishman in manners,

he is said to be a good mixer with the westerners and highly esteemed by his cowboy friends.

According to Wallop, he will go to England, be invested with the peerage and then return to his ranch. He will maintain his legal residence here as well as his American citizenship.

Doesn't Bother Wallop

"I'm still an American citizen as far as I know, though I am the earl of Portsmouth, too. I don't know when I'll make a trip back to England, perhaps in November. It doesn't change things much for me."

And with this brief statement, the new earl of Portsmouth, until last night Oliver Henry Wallop, Big Horn rancher, went into the fields where for the past 30 years he has worked side by side with a few employees in an effort to survive the misfortunes which have harassed the stockmen of the west.

Former Corvallis Man Buys California Paper

Reported price was \$100,000, although no announcement of the figure could be obtained.

Present Scopes Brief Late In Month, Stated

NEW YORK, Sept. 8. — Counsel for John T. Scopes, Tennessee school teacher convicted of teaching evolution, has about completed its brief which they will present before the court of appeals at Knoxville, Tenn., on September 28.

The plans were outlined to the United Press today by Arthur Garfield Hays, one of Scopes' attorneys. Hays said all of the defense attorneys, including himself, Dudley Field Malone, Clarence Darrow, and John R. Neal, would be present to argue the appeal in Knoxville.

The appeal will be presented on the grounds:

That the conviction of Scopes is contrary to the 10th amendment of the federal constitution.

That the conviction is contrary to religious provisions of the Tennessee constitution.

Mitchell Trial Ranks High In Importance

not the aircraft controversy is the sole issue before the court.

Because, under this anticipated ruling, Mitchell cannot at a court martial get a hearing on his charges against superiors, friends said today they would ask a separate congressional investigation for the purpose.

Mitchell is expected to be charged with violation of the 96th article of war, a "general article" covering "all disorders and neglect to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, all conduct of a nature to bring discredit upon the military service."

He may also be tried under article 62 for "disrespect to the secretary of war" and others; article 63, for "disrespect toward superior officers," or for article 95, for "conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman."

The supreme court has ruled out the possibility of appeal from a military to a civil court, except when jurisdiction is questioned, which does not apply in this case.

MITCHELL UNCONCERNED

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Sept. 9. — "If an investigation is desired, I am eager to have it, but it must be entirely public and all the evidence must be published," said Colonel William Mitchell today in reference to the action taken by the war department to investigate his severe criticism of the country's defense system.

Colonel Mitchell said he knew nothing of an investigation of himself except what he had read in the public press.

He declared that it made no difference to him whether he is in the army or out of it, and that if the "bureaucracy" wish to throw him out, they have the power to do it.

REFUSE CRIMINALS BOND
