

# WORD OF DEAD MAY TAKE LIFE

## Alleged Dying Statement Used In Way Trial

### Beaten Over Head With Gun Tim Murphy Told Brother, Is Testimony

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 10.—Frank Way, Prineville sheepman, took the stand in his trial for murder today and told how he fought with Timothy Murphy, another sheepman, over the possession of a little black sheep.

He denied that he struck Murphy with the butt of his revolver, saying that Murphy must have fallen to receive the fracture of his skull, which police said caused his death.

"We have a long argument and it ended in a fist fight," Way said. "I never hit him with a revolver."

This testimony was in answer to the prosecution's claim that Way beat Murphy on the head until he was dead.

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 10.—The word of two men—one dead and one alive—is expected to determine the fate of Frank Way, Prineville sheepman, on trial here today on a charge of murder.

Timothy Murphy, well known Klamath county sheep man, and Way met in an encounter in the sage brush, fighting for the possession of a little black sheep. Murphy died shortly after the fight. There were no witnesses save perhaps a few loitering birds and rattlesnakes out in that desolate Devil's garden country.

It was the defense's contention that Murphy, who died of a fractured skull, received it when he fell, his head striking a rock. Way contended he downed Murphy in a fist fight—a fair fight in the western country.

The word of the dead man was brought to court by Ben Murphy, his brother.

He testified for the prosecution, saying he encountered his brother a few miles from the ranch house, kneeling beside an alkali stream and washing blood from his face.

Before Ben could question the wounded man, Tim Murphy staggered to his feet and then fell, gasping:

"My God, I'm dying. He hit me

over the head with his gun."  
The prosecution closed its case just before court adjournment yesterday. Way's fate may be determined today by the jury, which is composed entirely of men, cattle and sheep raisers of the open range.

President Coolidge late today left the White House to visit Dr. Charles W. Richardson, a throat and nose specialist, who has attended the chief executive from time to time for a minor nose trouble.

Coolidge was to have his nose treated and then return to the White House for dinner.

## Postoffice Fund Thefts Admitted by Ex-official

## State Senator In Ohio Arrested as a Witness

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 10.—State Senator George W. Bender of Cleveland, who gained notoriety when his home was raided for liquor a few days ago, was arrested today.

He was taken for failing to appear on a subpoena issued by the state prohibition department, who sought to have him bear out his accusation that 500 illegal "liquor joints" were running wide open here. The department subpoenaed him to Columbus to give it the names of "joints," but he said he would point them out to a representative if one should be sent here.

Damage caused by the derailment was repaired early this morning. The morning train left for the north on time today.
