

Tilden Takes Three Out Of Five Sets From Frenchman

AMERICA AHEAD IN NEXT MATCH

Johnston Wins Two First From Lacosta

GERMANTOWN CRICKET CLUB, PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 10.—America jumped away to a 2-0 lead against France in the challenge round for the Davis cup here this afternoon.

Tilden and Johnston, the "two Bills," who went to Australia in 1920 and brought the cup home, scored the victories in the opening matches.

Tilden, playing nothing like world's championship tennis, defeated Jean Borotra at 4-6, 6-0, 2-6, 9-7 and 6-4.

Johnston, with a first class spirited attack won from Rene Lacoste, Wimbledon champion, 6-1, 6-1, 6-5 and 8-3.

GERMANTOWN CRICKET CLUB, PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 10.—William T. Tilden, American ace, defeated John Borotra of France today in the first match of the challenge round for the Davis cup after the Frenchman had been within a single game of victory in the fourth set.

The American won by three sets to two.

Both were near exhaustion by the time the match was over, Tilden just outlasting the game little Basque from Biarritz.

Thus America got away to a 1 to 0 lead in the challenge round.

Tilden played anything but championship tennis and it was his superior endurance that enabled him to outlast the Frenchman in a willing fifth set. The American victory was witnessed by a crowd of 10,000.

Tilden just managed to keep enough steam in his game to win the ninth and tenth games and get the deciding set at 6-4.

Bill Johnston took the first and second sets from Lacoste by a score of 6-1, 6-1, losing the third set.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 10.—Facing the most formidable opposition of the six years in which the trophy has been defended in this country, the American tennis team is meeting the representatives of France in the challenge round of the Davis cup matches starting today at the Germantown Cricket club.

Because of Bill Tilden's position as the ace of the team, the American defenders were favored to retain the cup, but they were only slight favorites.

Big Bill Tilden and Little Bill Johnston, who went to Australia in 1920 and brought the cup back with them and who played in all the singles matches until last season, were named by Dick Williams, veteran captain of the team, to play in the singles matches.

The doubles team does not have to be named until tonight, but it is likely, although it has caused a vehement protest from Tilden, that Richards and Williams, who have been going very good, will be asked to play the doubles.

DEMPSEY TO TOUR LONE STAR STATE

Wants to Show Fans That He's In Earnest

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 10.—Jack Dempsey will tour the state of Texas soon on a barnstorming trip. It was announced.

The champion has already arranged engagements at Dallas on September 22 and San Antonio September 24. Appearances at Houston and other Texas cities are in the making.

Dempsey will meet two Texas heavyweights at Dallas in two-round bouts each, his opponents to be picked by local promoters. He expects to duplicate this feat at San Antonio.

"I want to convince the public I am in earnest about fighting Harry Wills," Dempsey told the United Press today.

"I want to show them I am getting back into my old fighting form. I have a dozen exhibition bouts in the fire and will announce a complete itinerary soon."

Dempsey said he would leave for Texas as soon as he had completed arrangements with Floyd Fitzsimmons at Benton Harbor, Mich., for the championship bout with Harry Wills next summer.

Waterfowl Open Season Extends to January 15

Under the recent changes in the migratory bird treaty act regulations and state laws, the open season in Idaho and Oregon on waterfowl, except swans and wood ducks, now extends from October 1 to January 15, inclusive. It is emphasized in an announcement from the biological survey to local sportsmen.

Such birds legally killed may be possessed only during the open season and the first 10 days of the closed season. Procuring storage permits must be observed.

There is no open season on wood ducks or swans, and these birds may not be hunted or killed at any time.
