

Fast American Play On Courts Retains Davis Tennis Cup

STRAIGHT SETS TAKE DOUBLES

Singles Left Tomorrow Can't Alter Result

GERMANTOWN CRICKET CLUB, PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11.—America retained possession of the Davis cup, emblematic of the tennis championship of the world, when H. Norris Williams and Vincent Richards defeated Jean Borotra and Rene Lacoste in the challenge round here this afternoon, 6-4, 6-4 and 6-3. The victory gave the American team three matches straight, Tilden and William Johnston having won their singles matches from Borotra and Lacoste, respectively, yesterday. Two matches will be played tomorrow, but the outcome cannot be changed and they will be merely exhibitions.

The big trophy that came here from Australia six years ago will remain for another year.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11.—With two victories in the opening matches and three more matches to be played, the United States has practically clinched a victory over France in the challenge round of the Davis cup matches, the world series of the courts.

The title for another year's possession of the trophy which has been in this country since the two Bills, Tilden and Johnston, went to Australia in 1920 and brought it home, probably will be passed over to the American team at the end of today's doubles match.

The hopes of the French team for victory were virtually shattered in yesterday's matches when Bill Tilden and Bill Johnston won their matches. The only hope that the challengers had was that Johnston would lose one or both of his singles matches and that the American doubles team could be beaten.

Tilden frequently has been accused of trifling with an opponent and "grandstanding," and it was thought in the first set yesterday that he was not extending himself, but he was playing his very best and his best wasn't much too good for Borotra.

Johnston had to go four sets to beat Rene Lacoste, the 29-year-old Wimbledon champion.

One match will be played today—a doubles battle in which Young Vincent Richards and the veteran, Captain Dick Williams, will play against Borotra and Lacoste, who are doing all the playing for France.

If the American team takes today's match, the cup will be won and the two matches tomorrow will be only consolation affairs.

Three Fights, Three Draws, on Bricklayers' Card

Hard Battling Seen by Fans at Hippodrome Smoker— Dean Outweighed by Former Bend Boy

Sol Dean and Spec Woods, headliners on the fight card staged last night at the Hippodrome under the auspices of the local plasterers' and bricklayers' union, stepped 10 determined rounds to a draw, with the greatest crowd ever packed into the hall on Wall street wildly yelling for a decision for Dean. But regardless of the momentary sentiment of the fans, the majority of the veteran ring followers believe it was the only decision which could have been given.

In fighting to a draw, Woods and Dean followed the example of the men who appeared in the curtain raiser and the semi final, for all three bouts of the 20 round card resulted in draws. The curtain raiser was Joe Taylor and Fred Green, and the principals in the semi final were Earl Stols and Frankie Doyle. There was no stalling in any of the fights.

Dean and Woods used far more science in their bout last night than they did in their previous fight here—a 10 round bout which went to Woods on a decision. Instead of slugging each other for the entire 10 rounds, as they did in their first encounter, the two fighters last night hunted for openings before unleashing the leather. Dean evidently realized that a blow which would lay away Spec must have some force behind it, for he started many of his swings "near the floor." Spec saw the majority of these swings in time not to be present, and consequently Dean missed frequently. If Dean had not started and missed those haymakers, it is believed he would have been given a decision.

Things looked somewhat dark for Dean in the fifth round. From ring-side appearance, he was groggy. Many of the fans were waiting for

Woods to lay him away. But just before the round ended, Dean snapped out of it in a surprising manner and rocked Woods with a right swing to his jaw. In the sixth round, Dean waded into Spec, hitting him at ease. Woods swung wildly without doing any damage. It was Dean's round without question, and from then on, the crowd was for him. But Dean's swings did not halt Woods, who was trying for a knockout. In the final four rounds, open clinches were frequent, the men jabbing at each other from short distances. The fight ended with both men in much better condition than at the end of their first battle in Bend several weeks ago. Dean was considerably out weighed. Woods weighed in at 152½ and Dean at 145½.

Frankie Doyle, youthful Pendleton fighter, won a hand from the crowd by his aggressive fighting. He was on the offensive for the entire six rounds, following Stols around the ring, taking what Earl could give and landing some vicious hooks and swings in return. At no time in the fight did Doyle resort to defensive tactics. He always moved forward.

This bout would very likely have gone to Doyle, primarily because of

his aggressive tactics, if Earl had not opened up with his heavy artillery in the final round. Frankie was visibly dazed for the final minute of this round, with Earl attempting to land a knockout. Although dazed, Doyle continued his aggressive fight. The decision, a draw, appeared to meet with popular favor.

Taylor and Greenley fought one of the best curtain raisers seen in Bend in many months. There was no stalling, but the fighters did little damage to each other. In the second round, one of Taylor's swings landed on Fred's jaw and his knee touched the mat. But he was on both feet again before Joe could follow up. Both were able to connect frequently and in a manner which pleased the fight fans.

Claude Metz was referee for the bricklayers' fight card. It is announced that Duffy Knorr and Allie Taylor are to appear in a card at Princeville at fair time.

Will Play Off Finals At Tennis On Sunday

Van Allen and Dr. Hoach will oppose each other in the singles finals.
