

FLIERS SAFE AT HONOLULU

Sleep While City Holds Celebration

Men Rapidly Recuperating From Terrific Ordeal, Physicians State

HONOLULU, Sept. 12.—Five navy fliers, battered but well and happy, today were resting here—the goal of their ill fated flight from San Francisco.

Commander John Rodgers and the crew of the PN-3-1 arrived in Honolulu from Kaula last evening, but the wild crowds which greeted them were forced to carry out their celebration without the participation of the guests of honor.

Physicians aboard the destroyer MacDonough, which brought the aviators from the island where they were taken after being rescued from the rolling wastes of the Pacific, insisted they have complete rest and barred them from joining the revelers.

Admiral McDonald, Governor Farrington and other notables were among the thousands who thronged the pier at Pearl harbor shortly after 7 p. m. to greet the Argonauts, completing a new epoch in marine aviation.

McDonald was the first to shake the hand of Commander Rodgers and the crew when they strode down the gang plank. As the crowd surged around them the admiral suggested they retire to a hospital where they might talk quietly.

Forbidden Flight Stories
Arriving at the naval hospital it was decided none of the aviators should further describe the epic adventure until more rest had been obtained.

It was a city become frenzied that massed at the docks to welcome the quintet who had survived for nine days in their crippled seaplane to be saved only when hope for their rescue was all but abandoned.

Harbor salutes were deafening. Every manner of craft riding the calm waters of the bay shrilled its greeting to the returned aviators. There was a bedlam of bells, sirens, whistles and guns.

The grim, grizzled, tanned faces of Commander Rodgers and his men mirrored appreciation of the amazing tribute. Nervous smiles twitched at the corners of chapped lips; there were no dry eyes.

Reaching shore, the McDonough and its burden of heroes precipitated a burst of greeting that would not die down. Even when the joyful throngs were told that physicians would not allow the aviators to join them, the cheering continued.

Tired Men Guarded
Rodgers and his fellow aviators left the neighboring island of Kaula in the afternoon, following eight hours of restful sleep in a little hotel where they were protected from curious and happy crowds by armed guards.

They were awakened in the morn-

ing and given a light breakfast. Physicians declared they were rapidly recuperating from the terrific ordeal. The aviators discussed the strain of their flight but soon after tumbled back into their beds for more sleep.

Once more awakened, they stepped aboard the MacDonough late in the afternoon and a few hours later reached the city for which they departed from San Francisco on August 31. Early this morning all were again sleeping the peaceful sleep of men after a job well done.

TREASURE IS FOUND IN ANTIQUE TOMBS

Many Pearls In 2000 Year Old Mound, No Weapons

CHILLICOTHE, O., Sept. 12.—Colorful costumes of 2,000 years ago were found in the magnificent pearl strewn tombs of mound builders near here. Professor H. C. Shetrone, curator of the Ohio museum, said today.

Knee high royal tunics of intricate design were found near four skeletons—probably two men and two women of royal lineage.

On the walls and floors are "more pearls than the United States will produce in a decade," Shetrone declared.

Over the skeletons was a huge canopy of logs, uprights and cross pieces over which a less permanent roof work had been built. The logs had rotted and turned to carbon but were solid enough to be removed in large pieces.

Many tortoise shell ornaments were found in the ancient burial place. All were intricately etched and polished, the prevalent designs being those of birds.

The findings also indicated the dwellers who buried their dead in these tombs were peaceable. No weapons were found.

Bend Club Votes \$250 For Women's Building

Directors of the Bend Commercial club have voted \$250 to assist in financing the construction of a woman's building on the Deschutes county fair grounds at Redmond. Approximately \$160 of this amount has already been raised among the club membership.

Bend will further assist in financing the building work through a dance which is to be given in the school gymnasium Friday night. Music is to be furnished by the Homer orchestra. Women of Bend are sponsoring the dance.

Work laying the foundation of the building has already started. It is to be completed before the start of the fair, October 1.

INCOME TAXES DUE TUESDAY

\$325,000,000 Expected For U. S. Treasury

Notices All Mailed Out, and Department All Ready to Take In Money

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Uncle Sam will collect about \$325,000,000 from taxpayers next Tuesday when the third installment of income taxes falls due, treasury department officials estimated today.

Revenues received from income and profit taxes during the first eight months of 1925 totalled \$1,059,421,269.32 and more than \$300,000,000 in checks and money orders will pour into the government coffers next Tuesday.

The 65 revenue collectors throughout the country have finished mailing out "due" notices to taxpayers who elected to pay their taxes in four installments and the machinery is now ready for collection of the third payment.

Receipts on September 15 will not be one-fourth of the total revenue collected from the income tax as many taxpayers decided to pay the government the full amount due in one payment. The full payments were made, officials said, because under the tax reduction granted, small taxpayers were able to meet their obligation in lump sums.

"The majority of the income tax payers are honest in making returns, our investigations have revealed," say bureau officials. "In checking up returns we find that many errors are made by mistake, but, of course, there are many persons who attempt to avoid paying their legal amounts."

Two thousand trained sleuths, all qualified income tax investigators, are now engaged in checking up returns, assessing delinquents and rounding up tax dodgers and evaders. Latest figures reveal that there are about 20,000 income tax delinquents, while there are nearly 10,000 persons who failed to make returns this year for payment of miscellaneous taxes.

Superintendent Visits Five School Districts

Arnold, Richardson, Buena Vista, Hoeh and La Pine school districts were visited this week by J. Alton Thompson, county superintendent of schools. By next Monday, virtually every school in the county will have started, he reports.

No school will be held in the Pleasant Ridge district this year. Thompson reports. Arrangements have been made to send all pupils in this district to the Redmond schools. Provisions have been made to care for the transportation of 40 children from this district to Redmond.

That the attendance in the La Pine high school has increased 70 per cent over the attendance of last year, was found by Thompson on his visit to La Pine. W. C. Howard is principal of this school. Mrs. Howard, a graduate from the Walla Walla college last June, is teaching the upper grades. Miss Helena Reeder is in charge of the lower grades.

Part of the improvement to rural school buildings this summer was the painting of the Arnold school. Pupils of the Harper district will move into their new buildings in about two weeks.

Source of U. S. Rubber Is Seen In Philippines

MANILA, Sept. 12.—The Philippines are ready to produce all the rubber needed by the United States but the islands will never permit large scale production by American capital under conditions which would render independence more difficult of attainment.

This was the consensus of opinion expressed here today by Filipino leaders following the "rubber speech" of President of the Senate Quezon.

Quezon called the discussion in the United States of rubber production in the Philippines a "mere bluff" to force England to remove restrictions which have forced up the prices of crude rubber.

New Arctic Disaster Forecast by Wireless

SEATTLE, Sept. 12.—Picking up weak signals at 6:20 o'clock this morning after other coast stations reported failure, the Seattle harbor radio this morning received meager details of a new arctic disaster.

Early winter ice has gripped the 1,322 ton auxiliary schooner Baychimo of the Hudson Bay fur fleet, off Herschel Island in the Arctic ocean east of Point Barrow.

Operators here said the message was relayed with difficulty by the steamer Oduna, reporting its position as 788 miles out of Cordova.

The Oduna's faint walls, local operators said, declared that notes picked up during the night indicated that the United States coast guard cutter Bear, now in Bering sea, would attempt to rescue the crew of the Baychimo.

County Fair Members Are to Visit In Bend

REDMOND, Sept. 12.—Members of the Deschutes county fair board who will visit Bend Wednesday to appear before the Bend Commercial club with a message relative to the county fair, were appointed at a meeting here yesterday evening.

Those who will make the trip to Bend are L. E. Smith, manager of the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co.; Max Canning, local attorney; N. A. Burdick, secretary manager of the fair board; M. A. Lynch, vice president of the board, and Guy Dobson, one of the fair board members.

Talks will be given by Burdick on "The Finances of the Fair," Lynch on "Development of the Fair," and by W. T. McDonald, county agriculturist, on the purposes of the exhibit. The concluding remarks will be by Dobson.

A Word to the Wise--

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Maintains Executive Gains Too Much Power

PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—Insisting that the demand of President Coolidge made on Bert E. Haney for his resignation from the United States shipping board because of his alleged violation of a secret understanding had with the president at the time of his reappointment "raised a pertinent question for the consideration of the American people," Senator William H. King of Utah has issued a public statement here reviewing the situation and challenging the public policy as indicated in the president's demand, according to a special Washington dispatch to the Oregon Journal.

Senator King contends that, in his belief, it is the opinion of a majority of the American people now that the "executive department of the government is too powerful, and that any augmentation of its authority would disturb the equilibrium established by the fathers with respect to the three coordinate branches of the government."

He further points out that Congress, by the terms of the shipping board act, clearly intended that the shipping board should be an independent and discretionary body, set on the same independent plane as the interstate commerce commission, and

that "no executive has the right to circumscribe its duties or to determine the policies it shall adopt."

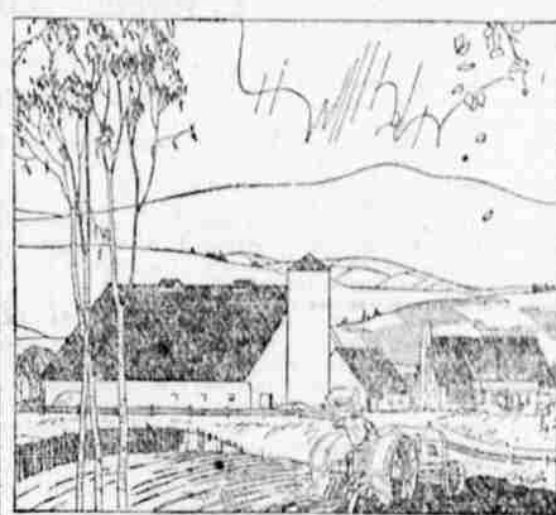
Drinks, Leaves His Money, Now Can't Remember Where

He did not give his name, but he admitted that he had been "a little under the weather" Friday and might have left his money most anywhere. Anyway, it was gone.

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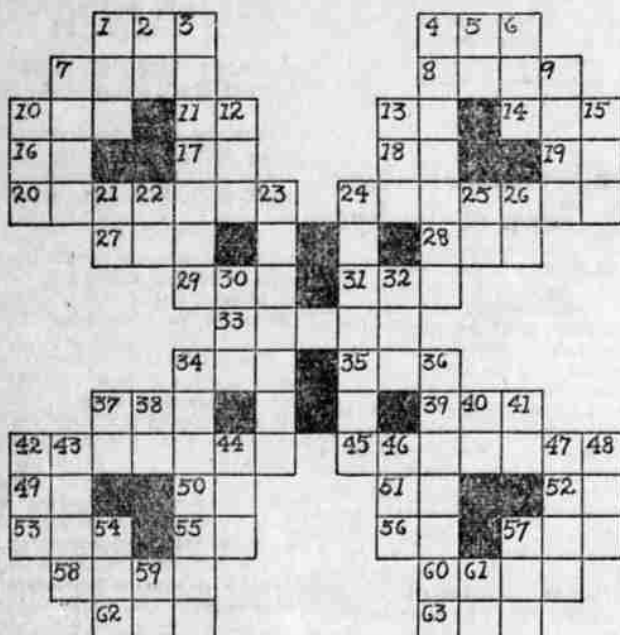
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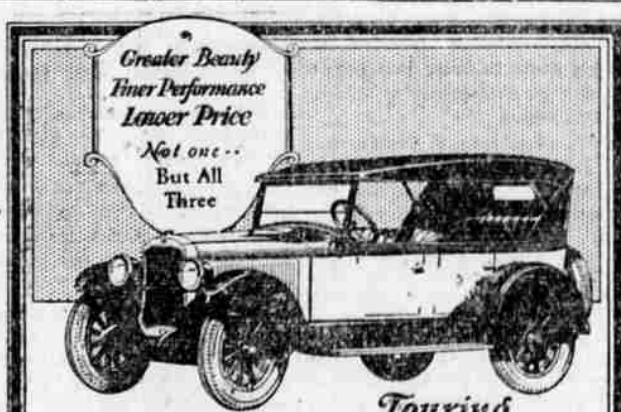
