

Opening Of World Baseball Series Set For October 7th

NATIONALS HOST FOR FIRST GAME

No Days of Rest, Decided at Conference

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 12.—The world series will open Wednesday October 7 in the city that won the National league pennant. It was announced today following a conference of leading club officials of both leagues with Commissioner K. M. Landis here.

Two games will be played in the National league park, after which the contenders will move for a three game stand on the American league diamond. It was announced. If a sixth or seventh game is necessary for a decision they will be played at the National league park.

The series will be played through with no intervening days of rest. If a game be postponed because of rain or other cause, the teams will remain at that park and the subsequent games moved back to accommodate the delay. The starting time of the games will be 2 p. m.

The games will be played off, if necessary, at the original park, after the series schedule has been completed.

Prices for seats will be the same as former years.

Installation of Furnace Under Way at Capitol

Installation of a complete new furnace and ventilating system is progressing rapidly at the Capitol theater and extensive alterations on the stage are being made, without interfering with the daily programs.

The ventilating system, Manager B. A. Stover announces, is guaranteed to keep the temperature in the theater at 70 degrees on the hottest summer evening, and will circulate the furnace heat so that all parts of the building will be comfortably warm in winter.

The motor which operates the curtains has been moved so that the curtains part and close silently, and the ropes controlling the drops and borders have been moved to allow additional stage and dressing room space.

Marshfield Will View Question of Railroad

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 12.—A mass meeting will be held in North Bend on September 17 to determine the attitude of Coos Bay cities toward the proposal of Ben C. Day, chief counsel of the Southern Pacific, that Coos Bay abandon its plan for an east-west railroad in favor of the Southern Pacific's Klamath Falls project.

Representatives of all parties interested in the Portland interstate commerce commission hearing on October 5 will be invited. These include the public service commission, which proposed the east-west railroad plan to shorten the distance from Coos Bay to the east by 400 miles and representatives of the Union Pacific, which would build the east-west line if plans materialized.

POMPEY IS WINNER AT BELMONT PARK

\$70,000 Stakes for Two Year Old In Race

BELMONT PARK, New York, Sept. 12.—The Shoshone stable's Pompey, by Sun Brar out of Cleopatra, ridden by Laverie Fator, today won the 36th running of the \$70,000 futurity stakes, beating 12 of the best two year olds in training.

Pompey raced the seven furlongs in 1:23, just three-fifths of a second lower than the track record made in 1914.

J. E. Griffith's Canter finished second and the Log Cabin stable's Chance Play got third money.

Pompey was an overwhelming favorite with one of the largest holiday crowds ever assembled here. He paid 6 to 5 straight, 1 to 2 place and 1 to 4 show. Canter rewarded his backers at 5 to 1 place and 5 to 2 show. Chance Play was quoted at 3 to 1 show.

The race was worth approximately \$58,000 to the winner.

Germans Will Deport Klansman From U. S.

Slattery had been on the floor three times in the 10th round and

three times in the 11th round and he was trying to get up again when Referee Haley heeded the cries from the crowd "Stop it, stop it!" and ordered Slattery to his corner.

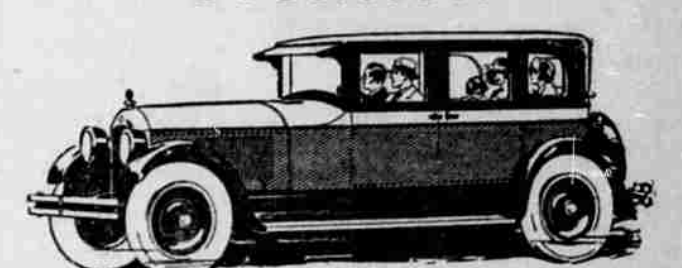
Work Upon Shenandoah Will be Finished Soon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Salvage of the wreckage of the dirigible Shenandoah will be completed next week, Commander J. H. Klein, in charge of the broken airship at Caldwell, Ohio, notified the navy department today.

Completion of this task is expected to be followed immediately by the convening of a special naval board of inquiry at Lakehurst to examine the debris in an attempt to discover the cause of the collapse.
