

All Tennis Honors Taken By Bend As Tournament Ends

BROTHERS WIN DOUBLES SETS

McClintocks and Hosch Are Hailed Victors

Tennis honors in Central Oregon were all brought home by Bend players from the tournament at Redmond, following the belated final matches played Sunday afternoon.

The McClintock brothers, Donald and Graham, won the doubles with surprising ease in view of the close play which had featured the first two sets played the week before. They took the third and fourth sets from Dr. J. F. Hosch and Billy Van Allen 6-1, 6-2. The scores in the earlier sets had been 6-3, 3-6.

Dr. Hosch again established his supremacy in singles play by defeating Van Allen, but he had a harder time doing it than in the previous tournament. The sets went 7-5, 4-6, 6-1, 6-4.

Van Allen held the lead through most of the first set, and came within a point of winning it. He had the games 5-4 and the score 40-0 for another one, but was unable to get another point until Hosch had worked his way out of danger with his customary even paced, steady game.

The second set was the only one which Dr. Hosch has lost in tournament singles play this year. He took the first three games and then Van Allen won five in succession, principally through the use of his past cross court backhand drive and short volleying game. With the score 5-3 for Van Allen, the next two games followed service.

Dr. Hosch took the third set with ease, Van Allen's strokes temporarily losing their accuracy, but the Redmond player came back strong and made the champion fight hard to win the final set.

The McClintocks' play in the doubles Sunday was just as machine like as it had been on Labor day, but they used more alloy placements and fewer overhead volleys. Their repeated parallel rushes to the net caught the opposing team out of step from the start.

Flier Killed, Comrade Hurt In Non Stop Record Trial

HELMY CAN'T MAKE ENGLISH CHANNEL

5 Miles From Dover When He Gives Up

GRIS NEZ, Sept. 14.—I. Helmy, big Egyptian swimmer who put forth from the "gray nose of France" early today, determined to be the sole person this year to master the channel, abandoned his attempt at 5:29 tonight when five miles from the Dover coast.

GRIS NEZ, France, Sept. 14.—After many postponements, waiting for favoring winds and tides, I. Helmy, Egyptian swimmer—and rescuer of women contestants for channel honors—set out from here today to swim the English channel.

At noon he was 12 kilometers from the French coast and progressing favorably.

Helmy's attempt today was in a way an answer to police suspicions that his prolonged stay here had had political motives. Examined as to a possible connection with the flight of Prince Siefeddin, brother in law of Egyptian King Fund, from England, Helmy recently swore that he had nothing to do with the matter and was merely studying channel conditions in preparation for his swim.

By 1 o'clock Helmy had covered 18 kilometers and was swimming easily.

The weather favored him and the channel was smooth, although the current was stronger than when Miss Ederle made her unsuccessful attempt. (Miss Ederle sailed for America aboard the Mauretania Saturday.)

At 3:46 p. m., Helmy was 20 miles north of Gris Nez, swimming easily with a strong overhead stroke. The trans Atlantic liner Nieuw Amsterdam, steaming up channel for Rotterdam, spied Helmy and his tug during the afternoon, whistled his salute while passengers cheered him.

This seemed to give the big Egyptian new enthusiasm and he struck out courageously for the chalky cliffs of Dover, then plainly visible, but still a long way off—as a man swims.

ORDERS ARE TAKEN FOR SERIES SEATS

Senators and Pirates Now Considered Safe

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Pittsburgh and Washington have advanced so near to the pennants in the major leagues that orders for tickets are being taken.

The Pirates need 11 more victories to clinch the National league pennant and the Senators are within 13 games of the American league flag.

The Pirates and the Giants have 16 more games to play and if the Pirates win 11 of them the Giants could not beat them if they didn't lose another game for the remainder of the season.

The Senators have 19 more games to play and the Athletics have 20 more on the schedule. If the Athletics won every one of the 20 games—which would constitute a miracle as well as a record—the Senators could lose six more games and still beat out Connie Mack's youngsters.

With the Senators a cinch for the pennant, the fight between St. Louis, Detroit and Chicago for third place is holding the attention of the American league fans. A few points over

two games separate the three contenders.

Tennis Stars Entered For New York Tourney

Difference of \$35,000 Halts Fight Articles

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Signing of articles for a heavyweight championship fight next summer between Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills was held up today by a difference of \$35,000.

Floyd Fitzsimmons, Chicago promoter, who claims to have Dempsey signed, offered Paddy Mullins, manager of the negro, a forfeit of \$65,000 if he would sign articles, but Mullins demanded \$100,000.

Fitzsimmons said that Dempsey would be in Chicago on September 24, ready to sign final articles.
