

WILL RECOGNIZE SOVIET, BELIEF

Change of U. S. Policy Expected by Japanese

Ambassador Says Nipponese Will Eventually Relinquish Claims in Manchuria

MOSCOW, Sept. 15.—That the United States will follow Japan's lead and recognize the soviet government was the firm opinion expressed by Japanese Ambassador Tokiti Tanaka in an exclusive interview with the United Press. This resumption of diplomatic relations, he predicted, would be followed by a heavy stream of Russian-American trade.

"I would not be surprised," he said, "if half of Russia's foreign trade, import and export alike, will be conducted in the future with America. The United States will probably acquire much of the Russian trade which was formerly carried on with Britain. The soviet government is apparently eager for American capital investments. Certain of the conditions which the soviet government will exact for concessions to American finance may not be acceptable to American bankers and industrialists, but I believe that America ultimately will place very large investments in soviet territory."

He expressed the view that the soviet government is fully stabilized and that the realization of this fact will bring about American recognition.

The talk veered to the question of a Russo-Japanese-Chinese bloc. Tanaka conceded that there is much gossip over the tenuous in the east regarding such a grouping.

"But twist the cup and the lip," he mused. "And Japan, of course, also has powerful interests in common with nations other than the soviet union."

"Would Japan abandon her extra-territoriality in China in order to gain new Chinese confidence and friendship?" he was asked.

"Japan's intention," he replied, "is to give up gradually her special extra-territorial rights in China up to the point where Japan's footing in China is on the same basis as in other foreign countries."

"Since Japanese investments in China, including Manchuria, total approximately \$1,000,000,000, it is evident that Japanese special privileges in China cannot be abandoned overnight."

Commemorate Finding Of Crater Lake In 1853

Commemorating the discovery of Crater lake by John W. Hillman in 1853, a bronze plate will be dedicated at the lake Sunday, according to invitations being received locally. It is expected that a considerable number of Bend people will visit the lake to be present at the ceremonies. State officials, including Governor Walter M. Pierce, will attend.

"You are cordially invited to attend ceremonies to be conducted at the rim of Crater lake Sunday afternoon, September 20, 1915, at 2 o'clock, commemorating the discovery of that great beauty of the Cas-

cades by John Wesley Hillman in 1853," reads the invitation. A bronze plate bearing the following inscription will be erected at the point where the lake was discovered: "John Wesley Hillman discovered Crater lake at this point June 12, 1853." Hillman, who was born in Albany, New York, died only 10 years ago, on March 18, 1915, at Hope Villa, La.

Ceremonies in connection with the dedication of the bronze tablet will be conducted by the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

RADIO BROADCASTS NAMES OF HUNTERS

Portlanders Can't See Why They Are Attacked

To hear their names broadcast from Portland as a group of men cited to appear in court for bagging venison before the opening of the deer season, was the experience of a group of hunters seated around a camp fire in the Deschutes country, according to reports brought to Bend yesterday.

It was while tuning in a Portland station on their camp radio that the hunters picked up the news broadcast. First came the announcement that a group of sportsmen in the Bend country had proved to be poor "sports" by bagging the season. Then the men heard their names come through the air. And as they listened, their indignation grew.

Some of the hunters were in Bend yesterday in an attempt to endeavor why their names should be broadcast over all of western America as poor sports. They were assured by C. A. Adams, district deputy game warden, that only two members of their party had been named in court proceedings and that he had sent the other names to Portland.

One of the hunters stated that he had received a letter from his wife in Portland, who had heard the broadcast, chiding him for being a "poor sport."

The hunters, aside from the two whose guns were confiscated, are again in the mountains.

BID FOR AIR MAIL IN FROM AUTO MEN

Eight 200 Horsepower Airplanes Needed on Coast

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 15.—A \$250,000 syndicate composed of Oregon, Washington and California automobile stage operators has filed a bid with the postoffice department for the Seattle-Los Angeles air mail contract. It was announced today by V. C. Gorst, Southwestern Oregon stage operator, who returned today from Los Angeles.

If the bid is accepted, the syndicate will immediately place an order for eight 200 horsepower airplanes and Pacific coast mail, passenger and freight air service will be inaugurated on a regular schedule. Gorst said. Only one other concern, the Western Air Express Company of Los Angeles, is bidding for the coast air mail contract, which will be awarded in 30 days. The successful bidder will be given six months to obtain proper equipment and establish the service.

Gorst has been absent for the past month organizing coast stage operators to secure the air mail contract. His syndicate also investigated the Salt Lake-Los Angeles route, but did

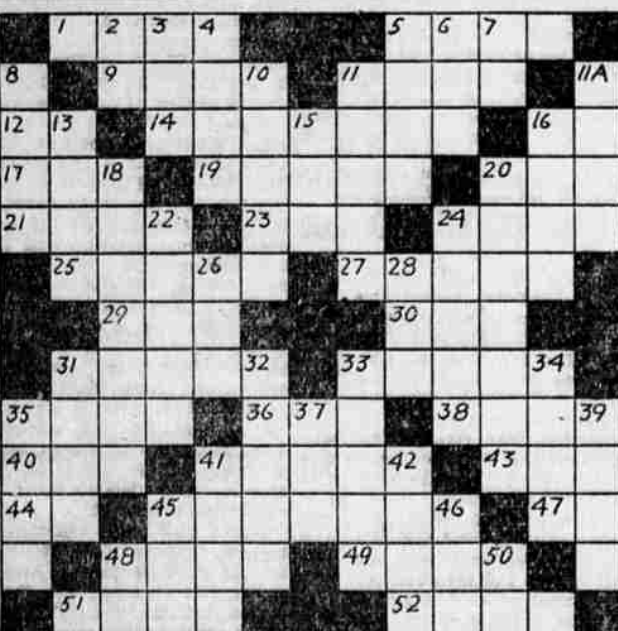
