

Pacific Coast Football Coaches Starting Season's Work

TEN DAYS LEFT BEFORE GAMES

Hundreds Turning Out For Practice

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—The smack of educated and near educated teen against leather spheroids, the barking of signals from the coaches—the dozen and one things characteristic of football—were abroad today as coast grid men started official practice sessions of the 1925 season.

Ten days intervene until the first games and if the preliminary work is well done, each team will get off in good shape. Conference standings depend as much upon early season games as any others, and each of the favorites hopes to jump right into the winning column.

The University of California and Stanford university, who led coast gridgers last year, and the University of Southern California seem now to loom as possibilities to top the column this season. Each will have a game September 26; California against Santa Clara, Stanford against the Olympic club and U. S. C. against Whittier Tech.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—Approximately 1,000 football players turned out for the first practices of the season at Southern California universities today. At the University of Southern California, Howard Jones had more than 100 players to pick from for his first Pacific coast eleven. Other new coaches in the Southern California district are Hoge Workman, formerly of Ohio State, at Redlands; Bill Spalding at University of Southern California, and Leo Calland, former U. S. C. star, at Whittier.

New Yorker Is Winner In Fifteen Mile Event

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Albert Michelson, Port Chester, N. Y., won the national 15 mile running championship from a classy field last night in the Knights of Columbus meet at the Yankee stadium. His time was 1:23:44.45, which was short of the record, but he made new marks for 12, 13 and 14 miles when he turned in 1:06:40; 1:12:21.45 and 1:18:09.35.

De Hart Hubbard, world's broad jump champion and western conference sprint champion, won the special sprint series at 50, 75 and 100 yards when he finished first in the three events in front of Jack Scholz, Chet Bowman and Al Leoney. His times were 1:5; 1:4.5 and 10:1.5 seconds.

Mme. de Brown de Tiege, who has been elected burgomaster of the village of Walllet, near Dinant, is the first woman in Belgium to hold such a position.

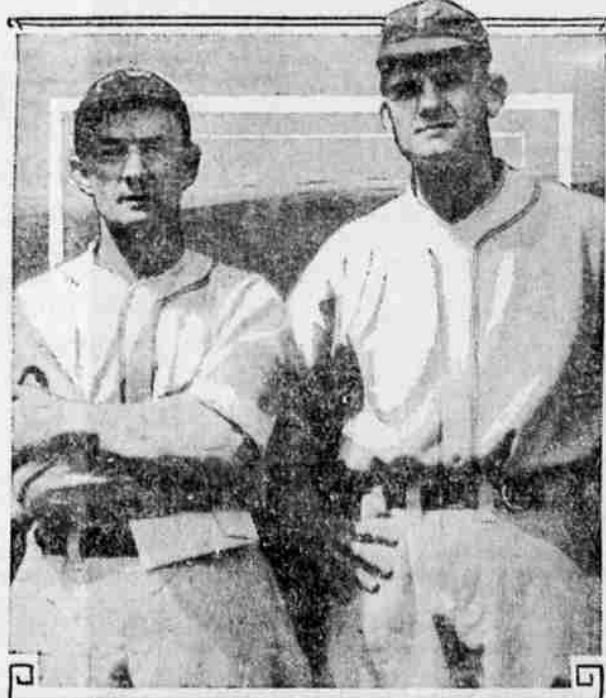

OREGONIAN LEADER IN SOUTHERN GOLF

H. Chandler Egan Improves Score Over Monday

DEL MONTE, Cal., Sept. 15.—H. Chandler Egan, Medford, Oregon, American amateur golf champion more than a score of years ago, today led the qualifying round at the annual California championships with a score of 144 for the 36 holes, 15 at Pebble beach and 18 at Del Monte. Today he shot a splendid 71 as against a 73 yesterday.

George Von Elm, Los Angeles, with 73 today, Charlie Chung, Honolulu, with 70 today and 76 yesterday and Ron Stein, Seattle, with 70 today and 76 yesterday, were tied for second place with 146.

Among those finishing early, Johnny McHugh, pride of San Francisco, wiped out the stain of an indifferent 81 at Pebble beach with a brilliant 71 today including six birdies in the 18 holes.

Dr. Paul Hunter, Pasadena, registered a 75 today which, with his 74 yesterday, placed him among the leaders with a score of 149. Scoring conditions on the Pebble Beach course yesterday were good and the Del Monte course proved even better today.
