

Record Number Of Football Players Turning Out In Bend

ONLY ONE TEAM FEW YEARS AGO

Junior High and Alumni Have Squads, Too

"Where in the world did they all come from?"

This appropriate question was asked Tuesday evening by an "old grad" who was watching the football practice of the Bend high school squad under the direction of Coach James C. Riney.

The double row of uniformed players stretched all the way across the gridiron, the men being separated from each other by the ordinary distance between men on the line in defense; and anyone who took the trouble to count them would have found the number to be 41.

The old grad saw in memory the squad of which he was a member nine years ago—14, possibly as many as 16 youths, poorly equipped both as to appearance and protection.

That year the squad had scrimmage practice, but on only one side of the line at a time—the guard, tackle and end from the left side would be switched over the play defense opposite the right side of the line, and then after a while they would be switched around the other way. The three or four substitutes would fill in at center and in the backfield on defense.

But last night, in addition to the 41 high school athletes under Riney's supervision, there was another good sized squad at the opposite end of the field—Coach Jack Chute's junior high school boys, numbering about 25; and over at one side was still a third squad, the high school alumni.

More Squads on Field
On the playgrounds beside the grade schools throughout the city, were other squads of boys, all playing football, and next Saturday these fields will all be busy with the practice of school or boy scout troop teams—or possibly even the first "scrub" games of the season.

In 1916, outside of the handful of boys who turned out for the high school team, there were a few grade school boys who played a nondescript and unsupervised sort of game on the Central school grounds, where the tennis court is now. This group, however, included a number of the boys whose names were shouted from the high school rooting section in more recent years.

It will be seen that not more than 16 boys received football coaching in Bend that year, and not more than 40 played it at all.

Hundreds in Game
This year there are close to 70 boys receiving daily coaching from men who know the game thoroughly, and 300 or 400 who play it. And those who do not receive coaching themselves, have much more opportunity of watching the play of those who do, and learning at second hand.

All this wouldn't be true except for the average boy's unfailing interest in active sports which test both physique and nerve, but a school administration which is friendly to athletic development and a public attitude which is also encouraging, have helped greatly to bring about progress which has been made in amateur sports in Bend.

FORBIDDEN FRUIT

Both Expected to Survive National Semi-finals

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 16.—William T. Tilden and William M. Johnston, the two biggest Bills in tennis, who have been fighting about the American championship for five years, may have it out again when the final round of the national tournament is held here Saturday.

It seems almost certain that Johnston will be the survivor in the upper half and that the defending champion will work his way through the lower half.

Just as a guess, with some dope behind it, Johnston will beat George Lott, the Chicago youth; Manuel Alonso, the Spanish Davis cup star, and Jean Borotra, the bounding Frenchman. In successive rounds, and Tilden will win from S. Onda, the young Japanese; James O. Anderson, captain of the Australian Davis cup team, and Vincent Richards, the brilliant American youngster.

George Lott, the former Chicago junior, and Alfred Chapin, the young Tilden protege, have a severe test in the third round and it is doubtful if they will survive the round. Lott has to play Billy Johnston and Chapin has to overcome Manuel Alonso. Lott has only a forlorn hope, but young Chapin may cause a surprise by beating the Spaniard.

Jim Anderson, the tall Australian, has no cinch as he faces Wallace F. Johnston, the Philadelphia veteran, who always seems to manage his way through the late rounds.

Fuzztails as Fishfeed Predicted by Averill

Some of the wild horses which range the plains of the Deschutes country will be converted into fish feed, if plans announced by E. F. Averill, state game warden, when in Bend Tuesday evening, are carried to completion.

That young trout not only like horse flesh, but "grow fat" on this diet, was discovered recently at the Canyon City fish hatchery, according to Averill. He has recommended that Peary Lynes, superintendent of the Tumalo hatchery, obtain some horse meat for the young trout being propagated in Central Oregon.

Should the plan prove feasible, a number of the worthless range horses may be secured and placed in cold storage for fish feed. The matter of feeding the young trout is one of the problems which faces the game commission, it is said. The utilization of horse meat may solve this problem.

Attack Upon Whitefish To Save Trout Favored

Action to lessen the inroads of white fish on trout spawn in the Crane prairie country will be taken by the Deschutes Rod and Gun club, according to an announcement made by Dr. J. C. Vandever, president of the sportsmen's organization. The matter of trapping some of the white fish was taken up by Dr. Vandever with E. F. Averill, state game warden, when the warden was in Bend yesterday evening. Pearl Lynes, superintendent of the Tumalo hatchery, reports that white fish move in great schools through the upper stretches of the Deschutes river.

Fournier Will Remain Believed by Robinson

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Sept. 16.—"That problem will have to be handled when it comes up," Wilbert Robinson, president and manager of the Brooklyn Robins, said when told that Jack Fournier, his veteran first baseman, had announced that he would retire at the end of the season.

In a statement given to the newspaper men with the team, Fournier said he would have to give up the Brooklyn team to retain his self respect as he had been so abused by the Brooklyn fans that he could not stand it.

"Fournier has baseball so much at heart that I don't believe he can give up the game," Robinson said.
