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MAFALDA

CHAPTER XXI

Rex vs. Gaete and Seaton

"... that you, Pietro Gaete, did on the 21st day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, wilfully and wickedly kill and slay Tatham Colvin Brough."

Four hundred pairs of eyes were turned on the saturnine olive face in the dock as Rialto Pete answered the question put to him by the clerk.

"Not guilty."

There was a pause and rustling of papers before the voice of the clerk made itself heard again.

"... that you, Jill Seaton, did wilfully and wickedly kill and slay Tatham Colvin Brough."

Jill Seaton's voice was only just audible.

"Not guilty."

Against the background of dark panelling behind the Old Bailey dock, Jill Seaton looked remarkably frail and slim. Her face was white as a flower, and as composed as the face of a statue. Both the prisoners were seated. They were separated by the breadth of the dock and by two impassive looking warders.

The Old Bailey was packed to the limit of its capacity, and the street outside was thronged with disappointed sensation hunters. The amazingly intriguing yet incomplete evidence that had been brought forward at the inquest, and the curtailed proceedings during the magisterial inquiry three weeks previously, when the defense was reserved, had whetted the appetites of even the most jaded habitués of the central criminal court. Further, the full story of Mafalda's appearance at Tufnell Park on the reception had now been common property for a month past, and had tuned the strings of public curiosity to a still higher pitch.

The case was clearly to be one of those triangular duels which invariably provide the keenest and most acrimonious fighting, for the accused in the dock were separately defended by two of the best known counsel at the bar.

The apex of the triangle was the attorney general, Sir Charles Comyns, prosecutor for the crown, a man with an enormous body, bald eyebrows, a mild blue eye and a mouth that was like a thin line seen through a steel plate, one of those rat trap mouths which never utter a word that is not to the purpose.

For Jill Seaton appeared the celebrated Morton Bell, that broad faced, elderly figure with the confident manner, who had carried many a jury with him triumphantly when all the odds seemed to be on the hangman.

John Belhouse, K. C., one of the youngest men in "silk," with a great and rising reputation, sat at the barrister's table, with a pile of papers before him. John Belhouse was wondering, now at the eleventh hour, why he allowed himself to appear in what was so obviously a lost cause.

A touch of his own sardonic humor cheered him as he reflected.

Mafalda had found that, even with her thousand-pound check, it was beyond her to brief a famous K. C. The solicitors through whom she applied received a refusal. Mafalda had not taken no for an answer. She had adopted the unprofessional course of seeking out Belhouse personally; the upshot was that Belhouse had become so interested in the case, and incidentally in Mafalda, that the day of the trial found him fully prepared, and charged with the defense of Rialto Pete.

The crown counsel rose, a big, commanding figure, his gown thrown back, his hands behind him, and for a moment contemplated the self-conscious faces of the jury.

"Members of the jury," he said, every word dropping clear and incisive from his thin lips, "the case before us imposes on you, in a sense, a double task. You will be told how the body of Tatham Brough, on October 22 was found in the Thames in

circumstances which point clearly to the fact that he was murdered. And it will be for you to say, on the evidence laid before you, whether the prisoners in the dock are jointly or severally guilty of the crime of which they are accused.

"I shall sketch for you briefly the history of the case as it is presented by the prosecution."

The crown counsel then gave a masterly resume of the facts. Even those among the audience who were best acquainted with the inner history of the case, were surprised to find how complete was the evidence which the police had compiled.

The marriage of Tatham Brough at Deptford, under the name of Berkeley, the disappearance of Tatham to America, his return and the swift development of his acquaintance with Jill Seaton, were made clear.

The scene at the Corner House, the quarrel that ensued, and the subsequent encounter between Pete and Tatham at the Eagle tavern were outlined.

The meeting of Jill Seaton and Tatham on Rialto's wharf the same evening at 10 o'clock; the fact that Jill had on that occasion worn a jeweled hatpin of peculiar and unmistakable design; and the finding of Brough's body by the river police with this pin buried in the left breast—these things were represented to the jury.

"In examining a charge of murder," said the crown counsel, "the first and vital question that arises is that of motive. I shall submit that in the case of the prisoner Gaete, the motive is clear. Brough was the obstacle between Gaete and the woman he loved. The immediate quarrel was of Gaete's seeking, and Gaete was the aggressor."

"What motive had the prisoner Jill Seaton? It is not suggested by the prosecution that she committed an act of deliberate and premeditated revenge. But that she had grounds for a deep and bitter resentment against Brough, is not denied. She would naturally consider her sister to have been wronged by Brough, and his attentions to herself were doubtless an added wrong, which most women would find it difficult to pardon."

STOCK TRADING
STRONG AGAINSelling of Tuesday Fails
to Continue

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—No repetition of yesterday's outpouring of stocks occurred in today's session. On the contrary, traders who had taken a short position on yesterday's decline found a decided scarcity of offerings available for covering purposes and in many instances were forced to retire their contracts at substantial losses.

In view of the bearishness which the reaction roused in speculative quarters, this quick turn about furnished a striking commentary on the market's fundamental strength.

It was ample proof that the general list was still in powerful hands.

As a result the recovery steadily gained in aggressiveness as the session progressed.

One of the important factors in the market's improved tone was the easing of call money to 3 1/2 per cent, the lowest rate for several weeks.
