

CHURCH SCHOOL WILL OPEN SOON

Promotions Will Feature Sunday Program

Many Activities of Methodists Scheduled for Beginning of Rally Week

Formal opening of the year's work for the church school of the Methodist Episcopal church in Bend will be featured in the rally week program which will begin Sunday, according to an announcement made today by Rev. Frank James, pastor, and J. O. Gibson, superintendent.

The opening day's exercises, at the regular Sunday school hour, 9:45, will consist of promotion of pupils who have completed the work in their departments, to the department next higher. The general public is invited to this program.

On Monday evening at 6:10 o'clock will be held the annual meeting and luncheon of the church school board. Election of officers and announcement of the program for the coming year will take place at this meeting, which will be attended by officers and teachers of the church school.

The same evening at 7:45 o'clock is scheduled the Bible story telling contest for juniors, ages 9 to 11, and intermediates, ages 12 to 14. A suitable prize will be awarded the winner in each department. All parents, members and friends of the school are invited to this program, which will be held in the church auditorium.

Wednesday evening at 6:15 o'clock will be held the adult department night program in Epworth hall. All families, members and friends of the church and church school are invited. Each family will bring one dish of any kind of food and enough sandwiches for the family, together with knife, fork and spoon for each one, and arrive at the church as early as possible in the afternoon. The luncheon will be served cafeteria style under the supervision of the Ladies' Aid and Dorcas societies, which will also furnish something to drink.

To Install Teachers Friday evening has been designated as young people's night. All young people are invited to attend the program, which begins with a cafeteria banquet served by the young ladies of the Dorcas society at 6:15 o'clock. A program of short speeches and musical numbers by members of the young people's department will be given.

Beginners' and primary department day will be Saturday, with a program at 2:30 o'clock p. m., in charge of the officers and teachers of the primary classes. Parents of children in these departments are invited. The program of stories and games will be followed by the serving of refreshments.

The annual rally day program will come as a climax to all of this preparation, and will be held in the

church auditorium Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, following the regular church school classes at 9:45. At the regular church school session, the officers are planning for a record attendance. The rally day program, in addition to inspirational addresses, will include the installation of the newly elected officers and teachers.

Chairman Dwight W. Morrow, New York banker and intimate friend of the president, told his fellow members of the special board that economy would be necessary since there are no congressional appropriations for the probe.

The board has definitely decided to call witnesses from the war, navy and postoffice departments first and Mitchell and other critics later, it was announced.

Mitchell, the arch critic, who was demoted as assistant chief of the army air service for previous attacks, will hold the center of the stage during two and possibly all three acts of the investigation.

Complications will increase if Mitchell is summoned in the case of the Shenandoah inquiry at Lakehurst, as anticipated. A member of the navy court denied today that Mitchell had been invited to appear and substantiate his serious charges of navy negligence as a cause of 14 deaths and the dirigible's destruction.

He added, however, that such a summons was probable. War department officials declared today that Mitchell should be made to explain his accusations against the navy as well as those concerning the army.

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Traveling Libraries Are Gifts from State

Nineteen traveling libraries, containing about 900 books, have been presented to the Deschutes county library by the state library in Salem. These books were loaned to the Deschutes county library in 1921 and have been in continuous service in groups of 50 in rural schools and smaller stations since.

"In these groups, the books' usefulness has been exhausted, but cataloged separately and belonging to the county they will be of great value," Miss Helen Johns, librarian, comments in making known of the gift of 900 books from the state library. "The books are not new, but comprise standard works of fiction, history, poetry and other subjects which are of constant interest, and necessary to every public library," says Miss Johns.

The work of cataloging the gift from the state library has already started.

Navy Seaplane Flight Likely to be Put Off

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—Contemplated flight of the navy's Boeing seaplane to Hawaii probably will not take place this year, according to flight officials here today.

The PB-1, left behind when two other planes attempted the hop, is not yet in shape for a real test flight but will make a trial Monday before leaving for San Diego to be permanently based.

Captain Stanford Moses, Hawaiian flight project commander, accompanied local officials on an aerial survey of locations in the San Francisco bay district suitable for air ports or seaplane bases.

Only Small Loss Results From Fire in Mill Cupola

Believed to have been caused by a spark, a fire broke out in the cupola of No. 1 mill of The Shevlin-Hixon Company shortly before 6 o'clock Thursday evening. Damage from the blaze is reported to be small. No general alarm was sounded by the Bend fire department, the mill fire crews extinguishing the small blaze without assistance.

Wasn't Ready to Quit Says Gertrude Ederle

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—"I didn't ask to be taken out of the water when I failed to swim the channel. I wanted to go on," Miss Gertrude Ederle declared today upon her arrival here from Cape Gris Nez, whence she attempted to swim the English channel.

"I could have gone further," she told newspaper men who met her on the Cunard liner Mauretania at quarantine. "I was taken out of the water on orders of my coach, Jabez Wolfe. I was very surprised that he forced me to abandon my swim."

During the discussion it was brought out that Wolfe was discharged as Miss Ederle's trainer after her failure. L. D. De Handley, another coach, said he did not understand why Wolfe had frightened Miss Ederle with stories about sharks.

"Wolfe knew there were no sharks in the channel," Handley declared.

Theft of Awning Cranks Reported by City Police
