

Riney's Squad Gets Finer Points With Its Fundamentals

LINE IS GETTING HARD WORKOUTS

Rockne System Studied by Coach Used In Part

While prospects for a strong eleven for the Bend high school this year are still dim due to the lack of experienced linemen, the course of events this week is demonstrating that even though Coach James C. Riney may not turn out a championship team, he will teach his charges a lot more football than he was able to give them in the 1924 season.

This entire week has been spent in drilling on some of the fine points that no coach has ever had time to work on in Bend before.

The circumstance that makes this possible is that Coach Riney has plenty of experienced backfield men who are already grounded in his system of play, and he does not face the necessity of stressing the more elemental points of backfield play.

The backfield men, new candidates as well as letter men, are getting plenty of practice in these fundamentals, but they do not require the supervision that they did last year.

This gives Coach Riney more time to work with the linemen, and the result is that they are going to know more about their positions than Bend high school linemen have ever known before. The ends especially are getting concentrated training in just what to do under all circumstances.

Another factor in gaining time for concentrated work on individual play is that Riney is following to a great extent the system which he studied under Coach Knute Rockne of Notre Dame during the summer.

Riney's methods last year were extremely modern, and he had already abandoned many of the things which have been included in early season training for many years just because they were customary. But this year he has eliminated still more of these non essentials, and the result is more time for intensified drill on the finer points of the game.

AVERILL TO FAVOR SMALLER CATCHES

Recommendation to be Made to Game Commission

That he will make recommendations to the state game commission at its next meeting that bag limits on trout be reduced at East, Elk and Diamond lakes, and that the season be shortened to do away with ice fishing, was the announcement made in Portland by E. F. Averill, state game warden, when he returned from the Bend country this week.

Action to be taken by Averill when

the game commission meets will be in accordance with the announcement he made at the meeting of the Deschutes Rod and Gun club in Bend Tuesday night. It was recommended at the meeting of the club that the bag limit on trout be cut one-half. The action to eliminate ice fishing is also in accordance with the desires of local anglers. It is held that there is not sport taking fish out of a lake through the ice.

TILDEN, JOHNSTON ARE LEFT IN PLAY

Final National Tournament Round Saturday

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 18.—Big Bill Tilden and Little Bill Johnston, leading rivals for the American tennis championship, will meet here again tomorrow in the final round of the national singles tournament.

The two noted Bills survived the semi-finals here this afternoon before a crowd of 15,000 and became opponents in the finals for the third successive year.

Tilden reached the finals by disposing of Vincent Richards, 6-8, 6-4, 6-4 and 6-1, while Johnston defeated Richard Williams 7-5, 6-3 and 6-2.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 18.—Four good reasons why America has been supreme in international tennis for five years were being exhibited on the courts of the West Side Tennis club this afternoon.

America's big four, including the players who brought the Davis cup back from Australia in 1920 and those who have been defending it against foreign attack ever since, fought among themselves for individual honors in the semi-final round of the national singles tennis championship.

Sixty-four international stars, including the champion of Wimbledon and all the best players in the world, started after Bill Tilden's crown last Monday, but only the "big four" survived the preliminary battles.

Bill Tilden, Bill Johnston, Vinnie Richards and Dick Williams, who beat a fine French team five to nothing in the Davis cup challenge round last week, emerged yesterday from

the fourth round after they had eliminated the last of the foreign players and the two surviving Americans out of the select group.

To Survey Deschutes As to Run of Salmon

PORTLAND, Sept. 18.—Survey of salmon conditions in the Deschutes river to determine whether the run of spring Chinooks is heavy enough to justify construction and operation of a hatchery on the stream, will be made this week end by Hugh C. Mitchell, field representative of the Salmon Protective association, who departed today for Central Oregon.

Mitchell will estimate the number of Chinook salmon, which have gone up the Deschutes to spawn this year and probably will conduct a similar survey in the Klickitat river in Washington during his absence.

Other similar surveys probably will be conducted later on other tributary streams in Oregon and Washington.

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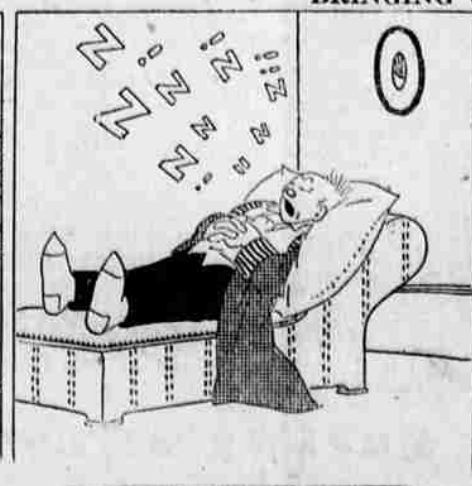
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
