

AVIATION QUIZ PREPARED FOR

Board of Inquiry Studies Testimony

Question of Relative Value of Battleship and Plane Is Looked Into

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Taking advantage of the voluminous aviation data and information already submitted, the various members of President Coolidge's special air inquiry board today began acquainting themselves with the government's air efforts.

The board has disbanded for the week end but each member has with him a complete print of the testimony taken last session by the house aircraft committee. Other documents offered by the war and navy departments are also available for study.

Members of the board believe their work can be greatly facilitated if they educate themselves on the board aspects of the issues involved in the existing aviation controversy. With this in view, considerable attention is being devoted to the testimony of Colonel William Mitchell, air service critic, before the house committee.

With instructions from President Coolidge to investigate aviation's place in our system of national defense, some study is already being made of the report of the navy general board on the relative value of the battleship versus the airplane. This report, together with secret testimony before the board, was presented to the air board yesterday by Secretary of the Navy Wilbur.

Every effort is being made to have Mitchell on hand for testimony at an early stage of the inquiry. Board members believe a major part of their efforts will be taken up with charges, criticisms and recommendations from Mitchell and they are agreed that he should be the first witness to appear after formal state-

ments have been made by representatives of the war and navy departments. It appears now that he will take the stand later Wednesday or Thursday morning.

Whether Acting Secretary of the War Davis, who will be the first witness Monday, and Secretary Wilbur, who is scheduled for testimony Tuesday, will enter denials of Mitchell's recent charges of negligence and incompetence in administration of the air service, is a matter of conjecture.

DISPLAY NEW FORD AT LOCAL AGENCY

Model Exceeds Expectations —Many Orders Booked

The first of the improved Ford cars to arrive in Bend was put on display Friday in the show rooms of the Central Oregon Motor Co., local authorized Ford dealers, and has attracted general attention.

The new type exceeds expectations in improved appearance and convenience. For the most part the bodies have been completely redesigned and conform to advanced ideas in body construction.

Not only have bodies been built lower, but they are set on a lower chassis frame and with larger, low hanging fenders, impart to the complete car a striking suggestion of riding and driving ease.

While only the touring car has been displayed so far, other types will be shown as soon as they can be secured from the assembly plant in Portland.

Probably the best evidence of the widespread interest manifest in these cars comes from the general offices of the Ford Motor Company at Detroit, where it was stated that since the new cars were announced, orders for more than 192,368 have been booked by dealers throughout the United States. Thousands of orders are coming in every day.

NO LAW TO HELP RED LEGISLATOR

Immigration Rule Would Bar Saklatvala

Brother, Resident of United States, Says Kellogg's Action Right

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—While the American Civil Liberties Union offered to pay the legal costs of a fight against the state department's ban of the British communist legislator, Shapurji Saklatvala, its investigations now indicate that Saklatvala has no legal redress.

Its lawyers have probed the question and have decided that, even if Saklatvala should come as far as Ellis Island, the immigration authorities would have the right to keep him out and he would have, under the immigration law, no ground on which to fight.

Consequently, the union is now endeavoring to fight his case by means of stirring public opinion. It planned to issue later today a stirring attack on the Kellogg action by Samuel Untermyer, noted New York attorney.

While the union is seeking to stir public opinion in favor of Saklatvala, the latter's brother, P. D. Saklatvala, president of the Middle States Oil Corporation, of New York, indicates his belief that the state department action, probably was proper.

"My brother might be called a destructive genius," remarked the successful business man, indicating simultaneously that the parliamentarian liked publicity and was perhaps being taken too seriously.

RULING ASKED
WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Secretary of Labor James J. Davis has requested the solicitor-general of the United States for a ruling on the immigration law, under which he can exclude any avowed member of the

communist party who seeks admittance to this country.

DEATH MAY RESULT FROM FALLING LIMB

Internal Injuries Suffered by A. H. Prichard

Struck by limbs knocked from the top of a tree by a "high line," Ardin H. Prichard, intermittent employee of The Shevlin-Hixon Company for the past four or five years, suffered injuries which it is feared will result in his death.

Prichard is the brother of Asa L. Prichard, who died in Bend November 4, 1924, from injuries received when a train backed a "bad order" car against the car under which he was working in the Shevlin-Hixon yard.

Injuries suffered by Prichard yesterday at Shevlin-Hixon camp No. 2 consists of broken bones and a punctured lung and kidney. The limb, falling from a height of approximately 100 feet, struck him across the shoulders and face. He was conscious this afternoon.

Little hope is held for the recovery of Prichard. He is at the Lumberman's hospital. He has a wife and six children.

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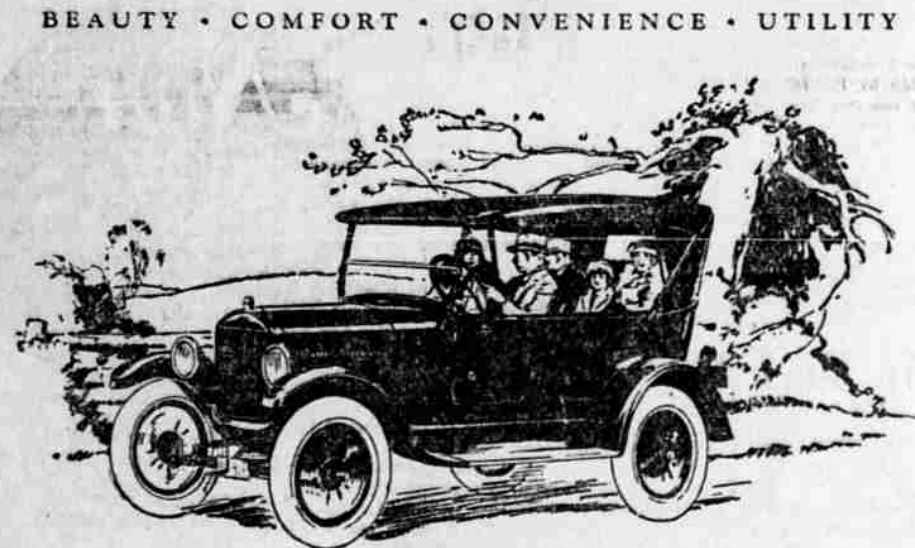
