7 GAME LEAD HELD BY EACH

Eligible List For World Series Given

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Six more victories out of their 11 remaining games will win the National League pennant for the Pittsburgh Pirates if the New York Giants should do the near impossible and win all of their remaining 16 games.

The Pirates and the Giants won their games yesterday and the Pirates retained their lead of seven full games.

The Athletics gained a half game on the Senators in the American league race by winning a double header while the champions were grabbing a single but the Senators are still seven full games in the lead.

The Senators need eight victories in their remaining 15 games to finish first in the Athletics should win 13 games in a row.

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THE DISTURBING ELEMENT

By Williams Tilden Again Proves He's World's Best In Tennis

Beats Johnston Three Out of Five In National Championship Finals at Forest Hills

WEST SIDE TENNIS CLUB, FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 19.—Proving himself indisputably the greatest tennis player in the world today, William T. Tilden, II., of Philadelphia, this afternoon retained his singles championship, defeating William Johnston of San Francisco, 4-6, 11-9, 6-3, 4-6 and 6-3.

It was the sixth meeting in seven years between "Big Bill" and "Little Bill" in the finals of the national tennis championships and the fourth victory in as many successive years for the tall champion, who has six wins out of the seven to his credit. Starting slowly, according to his custom in recent matches, Tilden came from behind to wear down the more popular, but frailer challenger.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 19.—Another serial number, akin to the record making Britton-Lewis partnership of the ring, was staged on the courts of the West Side Tennis club this afternoon when Bill Tilden and Billy Johnston met for the American tennis championship.

It seems that the noted Bills of American tennis are always meeting to decide which is the better player in the United States, and this year, because of the number and the prominence of foreign entries, the winner will be entitled to claim the world's championship.

It is the fourth year in succession and the sixth time in the last seven years that Tilden has faced the frail little Californian in the final round for the championship.

Johnston looked to be in the best form of his career until the semi final round yesterday, when he eliminated Dick Williams. Although Williams was far off form, he gave the little Californian a hard battle and he looked badly spent when he left the courts.

Tilden had to go four sets to beat young Vinnie Richards but he was so good, after dropping the first set through carelessness, that he looked unbeatable.

The champion has too much pace for Johnston and he has too much endurance for any player in the game.

FIELDER STATZ FINE

WALKER FAVORITE TO DEFEAT SHADE

Training Ends In Preparation for Monday Bout

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, was a slight favorite in the betting today to retain his title when he meets Dave Shade, the California challenger, in a 15 round bout Monday night in the Yankee stadium. Both finished their hard training today.

Because of two unsatisfactory decisions in recent contests here, one of which resulted in the suspension of two officials, the New York boxing commission has ordered six referees and four sets of judges to report for duty Monday night and the selection will be made by James A. Farley, chairman of the commission, just before the boxers enter the ring.

Boxing writers who visited Walker's camp yesterday reported that he was down to weight, but that he looked drawn and appeared sluggish in his work. Shade, according to Leo Flynn, his manager, is under weight and is in fine form.

Ralph De Palma Wins 100 Mile Auto Event

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 19.—Ralph De Palma won the 100 mile dirt track automobile race at the state fair grounds here this afternoon. His time for the race was 1:15:18.98. Leon Duray was second and Ralph Hepburn third. De Palma took the lead at the start and held it throughout.

Norman K. Batten lost control of his car on the 23rd lap and crashed through the fence. He ripped up several yards of the fence and wrecked his car, but no one was injured.
