ALL FOR ONE

The activity that is now under way
looking toward the full colonization
of the Tumalo project is an extremely
interesting and very much worth
while work. We remember few things
that have occurred here that
enlisted so little effort the interest
and assistance of so many different
people. In a way the business
is to be compared to what goes on
in the human body when it is at-
tacked by disease germs. At such
times, we read in popular medical
articles, other parts of the bodily
system assume an unusual activity
and rally to the defense against the
invading germ. The well parts or
functions of the body recognize the
need of an extra effort to help out
the part that is in trouble and the
effort is made.

So it is with the Tumalo today.
Slowly the weakness of the project—
the lack of settlers—has been develop-
ing. Other weaknesses—in particu-
lar, an insufficient water supply—
have been cured but settlers have
not been found. Without them the
project must fail and in appreciation
of the fact and of the proposition
that it must not be allowed to fail
there has been a general rallying to
its support by the friends of the project.
The state securities commission
has done its part, the Bend Commer-
cial club has helped and is helping,
the land settlement committee of the
Portland Chamber of Commerce is
giving invaluable aid and individual
members, especially Marshall Dana
personally and through the Oregon
Journal, have worked hard.

It is interesting, we say, to ob-
serve on all sides this development of
the desire to help. And most inter-
esting of all is the fact that the whole
Tumalo community is together as one
to do its share in fighting for suc-
cess. Nowhere on the whole project
is there a knicker nor any who are
not filled with confidence for the
future.

For this happy condition as well
as for much of the work that has
been brought about the present general
activity on behalf of the project
thanks are to be given to the project
manager, D. J. McLellan. In less
than a year Mr. McLellan has fa-
miliarized himself with the many
intricacies of his task, he has met
and handled good sized problems, he
has won and retained the confidence
of the people of the project and he
has secured the helpful interest of
many friends.

The Tumalo is fortunate in its
friends and in its manager.

Women's Benefit Dance Given Good Patronage

The dance given by the women's clubs of Bend last night in the school gymnasium for the benefit of the building to be erected on the Redmond fair grounds by the women of Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook counties was well patronized, especially by local business and professional men and members of their families.

Although no accurate figures are yet available, it is estimated that the receipts from the sale of tickets approximated \$140. Expenses are to be deducted from this amount. A number of the local business concerns and the mills cooperated with the women in putting on the dance. According to information from Redmond, men working on the basement of the building find it necessary to blast through considerable rock. This is slowing down the work, and at the same time increasing the cost of the structure.

Miss Anna McNeil leads Bend contestants in the race for queen of the Deschutes county fair with a total of 6,310 votes, or an imposing lead of several thousand votes her rival. The standing of the other contestants in Bend follows:

Football Turnout Largest In School's History

The turnout for football this year is the largest in the history of the Bend high school. Approximately 50 are out for grid practice, under the able supervision of Coach James C. Riney.

"Things are looking rather dark for the first game with Bend's old rival, Redmond, which is scheduled for October 2," says Coach Riney. Only 10 days' actual practice remain, with vacancies made by graduation yet to be filled, and prospects do not look as bright as had been anticipated earlier.

This year's team is much lighter than had been hoped for and practically all are inexperienced. Coach Riney's faith is not in "less weight and more speed," but in striving for a strong, undefeated team.

Observance of training rules will be one of the greatest factors in determining the selection of candidates. Workouts are stiff and as yet no one is sure of a place on the team. From present indications the boys will have to work hard in order to win the first game of the season with Redmond.

B. H. S. Receives Flagpole From Bend Legionnaires

The American Legion has given a flagpole to the high school. A tamarack tree from the Metolius country was selected for this purpose and brought to Bend by truck. The committee in charge, which consisted of John Runge, Roy Brown and Craig Coyner, supervised the bringing in of the tree and getting it into shape for the school grounds, where it now lies ready to be raised. Of its 75 feet of length 67 will be above ground when finally in position. It has been waterproofed and painted white.

PLAN HIGH SCHOOL PAPER

Plans are on foot to establish a high school paper, which will be published as a separate unit this year. At present the plan is to form an organization that is responsible for everything but the actual setting of the type and printing of the paper. The editor in chief and business manager will be elected from the junior or senior class by the student body, but the associate editors and other members of the staff will be chosen by the ability shown in material submitted. Possibility of becoming a member of the staff is expected to induce students to produce a higher grade of work and to spend more time on the article and voluntary contributions.

BUSINESS MEN VISIT HIGH

Work In Machine Shop Found Highly Popular

Enlarged enrollment has made it necessary to have an afternoon class in machine shop instead of auto mechanics, which has been previously taught. The present classes are now being taught in the basement of the Kenwood school by C. A. Guderian.

Because of the inexperience of the new pupils, Guderian has found it necessary to place some of the experienced pupils in both classes to aid the beginners.

The work this year will consist of repair work, modern machine shop practice and mechanical drawing. As soon as the basement is finished, the wood working department and the machine shop will be moved into the new building.

Girls Glee Club Pleases On Its First Appearance

The girls' glee club made its initial appearance on Friday, at the regular student body assembly in the gymnasium. They gave the selection "Moon Rise" by Alphonsa Culbuka.

A great deal of interest is being shown in the work, and at present 33 girls are enrolled in the class. The club meets on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, and under the supervision of H. H. Dirksen it is progressing rapidly.

Dirksen, who directs the boys and girls' glee clubs, has announced his intention of giving an operetta some time this year, if he can secure a sufficient number of tenors.

Attendance In High School Now Beyond Four Hundred

Attendance at the Bend high school on Friday passed the 400 mark for the first time in the history of the institution, the number of students present that day being 401. Principal D. A. Emerson reports.

SENIORS WILL PICK OFFICERS SHORTLY

Nomination Committee Will Meet With Class Advisor

The first class meeting of the year will be held in a short time.

Rapid Progress Shown By Girls In Athletics

Under the direction of Miss Golda Boone, the girls' physical education program for this year is progressing rapidly. The meetings so far have been given over chiefly to physical examinations. These examinations are being made for the classification of the students to determine their fitness for the athletic program.

Sports this year have been divided into the classification of fall, winter and spring. The fall sports consist of swimming and volleyball, winter of basketball and minor sports, and spring of tennis, baseball and track events. Most of these sports were not participated in strongly last year by the girls, but it is expected that much interest will be shown this year. Miss Boone is being assisted in her work by Miss Clawson in the gymnasium classes and by Miss Althea Stoneman, the school nurse, and Dr. Henderson, the county physician, in physical examination.
