MARKET PASSES SEVERE TESTS

Sharp Advance Experienced in Call Money

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Technical conditions within the market were given a severe test today by a sharp advance in call money which renewed at 4 1/2 per cent and then advanced steadily until the six per cent rate was established in the late afternoon. This flurry gave rise to some hurried unloadings built up on last week's rapid gains. At the same time, professionals became active on the side of the declines with the result that the general list was forced to absorb heavy offerings.

This pressure brought about substantial recessions in American Can, Mack Truck, Pullman, Detroit-Edison and other issues whose recent spectacular uprushes attracted widespread attention.

However, the market at no time showed any real weakness due to the important support afforded by the strength of the rails and of indications of influential buying in General Motors, Fisher Body and Dupont. This accumulation which was traced to Morgan and Dupont interests kept the selling movements from getting out of hand so that the decline proceeded in an orderly fashion.

FALLING PINE LIMB RESULTS IN DEATH

Wife and Six Children Survive A. H. Prichard

Injuries suffered by Ardin H. Prichard Friday when struck by pine limbs knocked from a tree by a "high line" resulted in his death Sunday afternoon at the Lumberman's hospital. Prichard's death came less than a year after that of his brother, Asa L. Prichard, injured when working under a car in the Shevlin-Hixon lumber yard last October.

Prichard and his family came to Bend from the Willamette valley, where they were picking fruit, after Asa L. Prichard was injured. Shortly after this, he started working for The Shevlin-Hixon Company, where he had been employed previously. Prichard was injured Friday at camp No. 2.

Ardin H. Prichard at the time of his death was 52 years of age. He was born in Belton, Texas, September 24, 1873. He and his family moved to Oregon last year from Big Springs, Texas. Prichard is survived by his wife and six children. The children are William, 19; Joseph, 18; Arthur, 16; Walter, 13; Jesse, 6, and Ina Louise, 4.

Funeral services for Prichard will be held at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon from the Newwenger chapel, Rev. Frank James of the local Methodist church in charge. Burial will be in the Greenwood cemetery.

Fear Deer Hunters Lost In Cabot Lake Section

A party of deer hunters are believed to be lost in the Cabot lake country, is the information telephoned to Bend today from La Pine. The men are said to be from La Pine. According to further information received from La Pine this afternoon, a search party was organized there this morning. One of the men believed missing is John Donnelly.

The Cabot lake country, in the Metolus district, is rough, being cut by deep canyons, forest officials report. It is not believed by these officials that hunters could get lost in the country where the La Pine men are said to be, but it would be easy for them to get hurt.

Local forest service officials attempted to check up on the report that hunters were lost, but have been unable to get any definite information.
