

Welterweight Ring Championship Of World Unchanged

WALKER GIVEN THE DECISION

Shade Has Better of It For 14 Rounds

RINGSIDE, YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Sept. 22.—Mickey Walker, welterweight champion of the world, is still champion by virtue of a strange decision rendered by Referee Patsy Haley and two judges, George Kelly and Dick Nugent, at the end of his 15 round fight with Dave Shade in the Yankee stadium last night.

It was a terrific scrap for the full duration and both men were nearly out at times. As the last round ended, a big force of policemen, civilian hounders and private watchmen took stations at the sides near the ring-side to suppress any disorders that might arise from the fact that huge sums were reported to have been bet on the fight, with Walker a 7 to 5 favorite.

There was no row, however, and the fighters got out of the ring without trouble in less than a minute after the decision.

Walker probably kept his title on strength of a wild finish in the 15th rounds, in which he almost stopped the lad from California. Shade seemed to have the fight won at the end of the 14th, for he had outpointed Walker and slugged him from corner to corner, with disregard for Mickey's swings almost all the way.

By the slim margin of one good round, Mickey Walker is still the welterweight champion of the world. Going into the 15th round of a hectic contest in the Yankee stadium last night, Walker was a beaten champion, and Dave Shade, the California challenger, was all set for the title. Walker staged such a desperate rally in the last round that he almost knocked Shade out, and he enthused the referee and the two judges so much that they gave him the decision.

Kearns Scolds Charge
When the 14th round ended, Jack Kearns, Walker's manager, gave him a tongue lashing almost as severe as the pasting he had taken all during the fight from Shade.

"You gotta get this round. Go out there and fight. You're going if you don't!" Kearns shouted above the tumult at the ringside. Walker went out and fought. If he had carried the same kind of attack earlier in the fight he might have annihilated Shade, but he seemed content to let Shade do all the leading and fighting and score all the points.

Walker had been trained carefully to meet a crouching attack that Shade usually uses and he was surprised and annoyed when in the early rounds of the fight Shade stood up straight and started to swap punches with him.

In the clinches also Walker received a surprise when he found the Californian tossing him around just as much as he wished.

The worst that Shade should have received was a draw. One good round does not make a decision and Walker certainly won the decision on the showing that he made in the 15th round. Perhaps the sight of a little blood from Shade's face in the last round made Walker look like a big winner.

Shade through most of the fight did all the leading, all the fighting, his were the harder and cleaner punches and he completely outboxed the champion. He won at least 10 of the 15 rounds, but it seems that the last one is the big and the only one that counts.

Both the high school squad and the alumni team are working out on the same field, side by side, and they would have an opportunity to watch each other's plays and plan a defense for them if they so desired, but it has been noticed that each squad attends to its own business, and each will go into Friday's game without any previous knowledge of what the other team is likely to do.

Coast to Coast Trip By Boat Nearly Ended

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—With only one portage, 400 miles across the continental divide, John Edwin Hogg and Frank S. Wilton have nearly finished their trip across the continent in an 18 foot motor boat.

The men sailed from Astoria, Oregon on May 26. They chugged up the Columbia river to The Dalles, and from there the boat was shipped over the mountains to Fort Benton, Mont., where the journey was resumed down the Missouri river to St. Louis.

The Mississippi then was followed to the Illinois and at Ottawa, Ill., the men took the Chicago drainage canal to Lake Michigan. From there it was clear sailing to Montreal and after a few days' rest the navigators set out for here by way of Albany. They are due at that city tonight and probably will reach here Thursday or Friday.

Bucky Harris Injured, May be Out of Series

WATERFOWL SEASON ONLY A WEEK AWAY

Geese May be More Plentiful Than Ducks This Fall

With the opening of the season on waterfowl only one week distant, Bend nimrods are oiling and polishing their shotguns, fixing up their decoys and preparing to visit the habitat of ducks and geese in the Deschutes country and in Lake, Crook and Klamath counties. The season on waterfowl opens at sunrise October 1. The season will close January 15.

Prospects for good bags of ducks and geese are better this year than they have been for a number of seasons, according to Bend hunters who have been in the country south of Deschutes county in recent weeks. Favorable hunting conditions have been made possible by plenty of water in the lakes and an abundance of feed.

Great flocks of geese have been winging their way south for the past month. Although some of the geese continued on their way south into California, many of the flocks stopped in the south Central Oregon lakes. It is predicted that geese will be more plentiful than ducks this fall. The geese have been well fattened on their northern feeding grounds and on the wheat fields where they stopped on their flight south.

The bag limit on waterfowl is 25 birds in any one day, and not to exceed 30 such birds in any seven consecutive days, except that the bag limit on geese shall be eight in any one day and not to exceed 30 in any seven consecutive days.

Open season and bag limits on waterfowl are to be the same in both game districts, east and west of the Cascades, this year.
