Cause of death, according to the information received by Mrs. V. A. Forbes, local Red Cross secretary, was the perforation of an ulcer. Drinkwater had been in the Portland hospital for more than a year. His condition had improved so rapidly in recent months that only a few days ago he asked to be released from the hospital.

Drinkwater was given assistance by the local post of the American Legion when in the veterans' hospital.

Purebreds Brought In For Farmers of County

Twenty-one purebred Holstein dairy cows were shipped into Bend this week from the Ford dairy ranch, near Vancouver, Wash., by the Henkle & Miner Land Co. These animals are to be placed on farms of the Deschutes country through an auction sale in the near future.

The animals, all tested for tuberculosis, are the pick of 64 head on the Ford dairy ranch. They are all young cows, ranging in age from three to six years. Despite the fact that they were in a stock car for several days, 90 gallons of milk have been obtained from the cows since they were unloaded here Sunday.

A carload of farm equipment and five draft horses was shipped into Bend by the local land company also.

2. Scald jars, rubbers and lids. Pack fruit in jars; fill jars with plain sugar syrup; place rubbers in position and adjust lids loosely.
3. Preheat electric oven at 250 degrees for 10 minutes. Place jars on bottom rack (as for baking). Cook at 250 degrees—1 hour for quarts, 40 minutes for pints.
4. Remove from oven, screw lids tightly at once.
