

Four Teams Picked From B. H. S. Squad Practice Hard

PROMISE FIGHT AGAINST GRADS

Veteran Backfield Is to Oppose Alumni

Forty-four football players of Coach James C. Riney's Bend high school squad performed on O'Donnell field Tuesday evening, but none of them was idle during the signal practice period. Forty-four players exactly by eleven, and Coach Riney had just four full teams running signals simultaneously.

There were really several full teams practicing on the field, two being recruited from Coach John L. Chute's junior high school squad and the seventh high school alumni.

The veterans who will oppose the high school team Friday afternoon may not have felt any misgivings as they watched Riney's four well conditioned eleven in action, but they might be pardoned if they had. The alumni had only about enough men on the field for one team, and the odds appeared to be four to one against them.

The more promising high school players are pretty evenly divided among the four teams, although the backfield letter men are all on one of them—Loomis, O'Brien, Shull and Ballantyne. There are linemen on all four of the teams who may find places on the first team, and the eleven which faces the alumni Friday will undoubtedly be drawn from all four. Coach Riney is planning to give just as many men as possible a chance to show their ability in this game.

But at the same time the high school means business when it announces that the alumni are going down to defeat this year. The confidence that this will be the result, is noticeable throughout the squad and throughout the student body, and apparently it is based on something more than empty hope.

Last year Coach Riney sent a green backfield and a line which included only one or two experienced men against the alumni. The other veteran linemen played in the backfield of the second team.

This year the line will include only one experienced man, Dick Brink, and he has been shifted from guard to tackle. But the backfield which scored enough points to defeat Redmond and Seaside late last season will be intact, and the alumni will face an entirely different machine from that which they opposed a year ago.

The former high school players will lack the services of Norcott, one of their most consistent ground gainers last year. Philbrook and Smith will alternate in filling his place, Philbrook playing quarterback for part of the game. Young and Marshall will take turns at the other halfback position, and Brostherous and Curtis will also play in the backfield.

In the line the alumni will have Mahoney and Dutt as centers, Eslick, Hunsell and Steidl as guards, Hunsell, Hodgson and Boyd as tackles and Marshall, Claypool, Young, Swick and Birdsell as ends. There may be some other former Bend high school players who will also appear in the lineup.

The alumni's strength can scarcely be judged, as they have had no opportunity for scrimmage, and only a few signal practices.

Officials were to be selected today and other final details of the game agreed upon.

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Fast Scrimmage In Second Week Cheers Coach

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 21.—Varsity football practice is on its second week here with a spirit of optimism in evidence among both players and coaches. This optimism is not based on any individual occurrence, but on the general showing made by the men the first week.

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"A mighty good scrimmage for the first week," was Coach P. J. Schiller's comment.

His assistants were even more enthusiastic when their remarks would not be heard by the men. Passing and punting scrimmage had been indulged in earlier in the week, so Saturday's mix consisted largely of line bucks, end runs and some passes. Speed and agility as developed in the men through the long spring practice was easily apparent, and resulted in a number of startling plays that bring the stands to their feet in a real game.

Next Saturday a regular practice game will be played between two teams from the squad. On the showing made then the coaches will pick the starting lineup for the first game of the season, Saturday, October 3, against Willamette university here on Bell field.

Four games are scheduled this year for the varsity on the home field, all of which come comparatively early in the season. The first game expected to test the strength of the Aggies is October 10, when "Clipper" Smith brings his aggregation of Irishmen down from Gonzaga.

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While the youthful Harris probably will be able to return to his customary position before the first game of the October classic, his temporary loss may prove a menace to the morale of the champions in the closing days of the season.
