Double Arrest Stops Beach Robbery Series

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 24.—The mystery surrounding a series of robberies at summer resort cottages at Seaside, Gearhart, Cannon Beach and Sunset Beach, was cleared up early today when Deputy Sheriff Instenes and Federal Agent McKnight arrested D. Dietzman, 19, and Earl Emich, 15, both of Portland, in a tent at the Cannon Beach auto camp ground. More than \$1,000 worth of stolen property was recovered.

On the way back to Astoria, Dietzman leaped out of a machine driven by Onstenes and escaped in the woods. Emich was lodged in the county jail here and faces a larceny charge.

It is said the youths admitted the robberies. They had been "working" the summer resort district for the past several weeks, digging clams in the day time, peddling them from house to house and locating the places they would rob that night.

WELCOME GIVEN PACIFIC FLIERS

Failure Is Forgotten by Cheering Crowds

Parade and Formal Pro- gram In San Francisco Celebrates Return

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 24.—Five men of the navy's air force, successful failures in an attempt to cross the Pacific to Hawaii by air, today received San Francisco's tribute to their heroic venture.

Returned to the city from which less than a month ago they sailed westward in the seaplane PN-741 Commander John Rodgers and his mates were welcomed with a warmth which could not have been heartier had their flight succeeded.

In fact, the nine days adrift at sea during which the world waited for news of their discovery and feared that they were lost, heightened the fervor of the home coming.

Coming ashore from the U. S. S. Idaho, Commander Rodgers and his crew—Lieutenant Byron J. Connell, Pilot S. R. Pope, Machinist's Mate W. H. Bowlin and Radio Operator Otto G. Stantz—were met by an official welcoming committee.

An escort of honor, headed by Brigadier General Thorndell Mulrilly, started up Market street ahead of the machines bearing the fliers. Thousands of persons were massed on both sides of the thoroughfare, and a sustained cheer went up as the procession advanced.

With Commander Rodgers rode Major General W. C. Neville of the marines, Major General Charles T. Mehon, commander of the ninth corps area; Rear Admiral John H. Dayton, commandant of the 12th naval district; Captain E. S. Smith of the U. S. S. Idaho, and Captain Stanford E. Moses, flight project commander.

A battalion from the 30th infantry and sailors from the Idaho added military touch to the parade.

Lieutenant Connell and other members of the crew followed in a machine behind the one bearing Commander Rodgers.

All five of the fliers were pressed with questions. Arriving at the city hall they were the center of a swarm of admirers who crowded about them so closely as to almost prevent the scheduled program from proceeding.

fluence greatly the peace of the world," said Mellon. "We, ourselves, cannot escape its repercussions. We feel, therefore, the great responsibility resting upon us. It is our duty to reach with you a conclusion in the estimation of each of our peoples, fair; and, in the practical test of time, workable."

"In the constructive attitude of the representatives of the two countries who now meet together, a solution will come."

Caillaux for his part declared, "Now we will go to work as practical men, desirous to come to a settlement satisfactory to all material interests worthy of the past of two great nations combined in such a way as to fortify peace and help the economic stabilization in the world."

Outstanding in the remarks of Mellon to the first session of the two bodies which lasted an hour, was a declaration that France's financial difficulties will be taken into consideration in the debt settlement.

"The war is over," he said, "but we minimize neither the burdens France has borne nor the difficulties which menace her future. Through the necessity of recreating her destroyed productivity, through postponement of reimbursement from her destroyer, her present fiscal situation has been permitted to become impaired. We should make allowances for this condition."

French Courage Strong
"France now faces, however, all the facts under a strong leadership and with the courage which withstood the assaults at Verdun. The condition is not permanent. France will emerge successfully from her difficulties."

Caillaux frankly stated at the outset of the conference, "I have come from France entrusted by my government to meet the obligations of my country towards the United States," thus reaffirming at the council table France's intention to pay. Members of the French commission, he said, "like myself, have the greatest desire to reach a settlement."

"We do not forget and no one in our country will ever forget," he continued, "what we owe to America for her splendid work to end victoriously the war and for the generous help our people received from citizens of the United States in time of need."

Mellon prefaced his pointed remarks with a general statement that

the loose ends of post war troubles, already greatly minimized, remained to be gathered in, and that among these were the war debts.

Following the exchange of statements, both commissions posed for pictures and then adjourned to the front of the treasury for further photographs beside the statue of Alexander Hamilton. The Frenchmen hurried back to the embassy, Caillaux explaining he had an engagement with a clairvoyant.

The Americans returned to the conference room to resume discussions among themselves.
