

Pirates' Wait Of Sixteen Years Culminates In Victory

CLIMB IS MADE AGAINST ODDS

McGraw Strong Backer of Pittsburgh Chances

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—After 16 years of patient waiting, Pittsburgh has another National league championship and within a few hours Washington may be American league champions for the second time.

The Pirates clinched the National league pennant yesterday, and the Senators can cap it today if they win a double header from the Cleveland Indians and if the Philadelphia Athletics are dropped by the St. Louis Browns.

The Senators need the equivalent of only three more games in their final eleven to make it impossible for them to lose.

Very few of the critics gave the Pirates a chance last spring as the Cincinnati Reds were considered to have the best opportunity to keep the Giants from winning their fifth straight pennant.

Although they were in the cellar and looked to be demoralized, John McGraw kept insisting that the Pirates were the strongest opposition he had and that he would have to beat them to win the pennant.

The club did not start moving until early May, but their advancement was steady and on June 29 they went into first place for the first time. It was then a battle between the Pirates and the Giants, in which they exchanged possession of first place about five times. Since August 2 the Pirates have been in possession of the lead.

The Pirates are a popular team of young players and fine sportsmen. They have never been in trouble on or off the field and they will be a popular color bearer for the National league in the world series.

By Williams Rooters Get Behind Team as Alumni Game Nears

First Yell Practice and Rally to be Held by Students on Friday Morning, Is Announcement

Three weeks of hard work on the gridiron will be culminated by the Bend high school squad in Friday afternoon's game with the alumni; but the force behind the football squad, the student body, is just getting into action.

Friday morning, just a few hours before the opening game, the students will hold their first yell practice and rally; but although three weeks behind the team in getting ready for the football season, the rooters are planning to give a good account of themselves from the start.

The students, just as fervently as the players, are praying for a victory over the alumni to blot out the memory of the team's only defeat last year; and it is expected that the rooting at the game tomorrow will be as voluminous as any ever heard on O'Donnell field in the past.

Lester Gallagher is acting as yell leader for the present, due to the fact that Stuart Rae, who has directed the rooters for several seasons past, is turning out for football. It is probable that a yell leader for the football season will be elected soon, but that Rae will resume his duties for the basketball season.

Other arrangements for the game were being completed today. The field is to be scraped and wet down, the goal posts erected, and the field marked. This year time is to be used instead of the sawdust which has served for lines in past seasons.

The rule established last year, that all spectators should sit on the bleachers on the west side of the field or back of the wire on the east side, will be enforced this year.

The game will be called promptly at 3:30 o'clock. It was announced today. The high school squad will hold light practice this afternoon, but the alumni closed their preparation Wednesday evening. The alumni players will meet at the school gymnasium at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon.
