GAME ASSISTS COACHING PLAN

Two Teams Picked by Riney for Encounter

With a large crowd of townspeople as well as students in the stands, the bend high school football team opened its season this afternoon with a game against the high school alumni. The game was scheduled to start at 3:30 o'clock.

The Deschutes Rod and Gun club meetings are open to any sportsman in the Deschutes country, officials of the club explain. No action would be taken by the club which would be detrimental to any hunter or angler in the county.

BIG RACING CARD PLANNED AT FAIR

Horses From State Fair to be Entered at Prineville

PRINEVILLE, Sept. 25.—One of the fastest and biggest racing cards ever staged here is assured as a result of the announcement this week of the numerous well known owners who will enter their stables for the Crook county fair, October 7, 8, 9 and 10, according to Manager R. L. Schee.

Schee announces that Harry Walters will be here with four new runners, Miss Lorena Trickey will have her entire string, Jack Coleman and Dr. Clark will bring a carload and possibly two carloads of fast horses from the state fair, and the well known John Day horses will compete. Schee has gone to attend the Lane, Linn and Clackamas county fairs this week.

Other features of the fair are developing satisfactorily. A carnival has been secured, to exhibit at the corner of Main and Fourth streets.

Many prize cattle are coming from Deschutes county and both beef and dairy breeds will be represented. There will be community exhibits from Lone Pine and possibly Terrebonne, in addition to those from communities which have participated in the past.

The only question causing any uneasiness is whether rooms can be provided for all of the visitors to the fair. Manager H. T. Smith of the Ochoco Inn is in charge of this feature, and has asked all who have rooms to spare to notify him.

No Rest Before Series Says Senator Manager

SWATTING HONORS TO BE ANNOUNCED

Hornsby and Speaker Lead Major Leagues

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—With the two pennant races decided in the major league, there remains nothing for regular season distribution but the batting honors and the money prizes that the Senators and the Pirates will produce for the second, third and fourth place teams.

Rogers Hornsby, the flashy St. Louis manager, is sure of winning the National league batting championship and the season's home run honors, and Tris Speaker, the venerable Cleveland manager, is the favorite for the American league hitting honors.

First division places in both leagues seem to be taken. In the National league the Giants have clinched second place, the Reds are almost as sure of third place, and the Cardinals are a safe bet for fourth.

The Philadelphia Athletics, who lost the American league pennant by a tragic slump in the last quarter of the race, have second place clinched with a lead of eight games over the Browns. The Browns are holding third place by two and one-half games, and the Tigers have an advantage for fourth place of three and one-half games over the White Sox.

One day later than the National league championship was decided, the Washington Senators won the American league pennant by taking a double header from the Cleveland Indians, while the Athletics were losing to the Browns in 11 innings.

There is an unusual diversity of opinions as to the outcome of the world series and very little money will be offered until the Washington lineup is definitely known. If the Senators have their full strength to start, it is likely that even money will prevail, although the Senators may be slight favorites on account of their experience.
