

Experience And Weight Score Victory In Early Season

GRADUATES WIN BY TALLY OF 12-9

Find Only One of B.H.S. Teams Vulnerable

Experience and weight once more triumphed over youth in the annual game between the Bend high school football and the alumni Friday afternoon, but the alumni had a harder time winning this year than they did last, and their victory was not as complete as the old grads might have wished. They won 12 to 9.

If the 30 minutes played against the high school's strongest team had been all, the high school would have won by a score of 9 to 0. On the other hand, that is an "if," and it is not certain that the high school would have scored in such case, or even if the best team had played the entire game.

Certainly the weary alumni earned the victory by holding the high school's best team scoreless through-out the final quarter, in spite of the fact that the high school men were fresh after 25 minutes rest.

It is also true that the high school's nine points were not made from offensive scrimmage, and were in the nature of flukes, both resulting from erratic punts on the part of the alumni. A safety was made when one of these punts bounded back from a high school player, was touched by an alumni man and rolled over the goal line to be recovered by the alumni.

The touchdown came in much the same way, but this time it was a high school man, Pitman, who fell on the ball. Loomis kicked the goal.

Grads Score Twice
The alumni scored two touchdowns in fairly easy fashion and the lighter team, one in the first quarter and the other in the third.

The alumni scored their first touchdown by advancing the ball steadily from their own 40 yard line, by line smashes alternated with split backs. The split backs caught the high school team completely off their guard, and on one of these Brosterhouse went the last 12 yards to the goal.

The alumni's second touchdown came following the blocking of a high school punt at the 12 yard line. Philbrook gained three yards on a "dead man" play, and Marshall plunged for the remaining nine yards and was stopped by nothing but the goal post.

Straight backs through the line proved the alumni's best method of offense against the lighter team, but against the high school's veterans they were able to make better yardage off tackle.

The high school threatened the alumni's goal throughout the second quarter and gained yardage with considerable ease until it reached the 19 yard line. Here the alumni braced and held for downs, and would have worked their way out of danger except for misfortune in punting.

With a three point lead, the alumni started a drive to score on the high school in the last quarter, but after they had advanced the ball to the high school's 20 yard line, the high school guards, Williams and Fultz, broke up the offensive, and the alumni lost the ball on downs.

Running Plays Predominate
From this point on the high school took the aggressive and made considerable progress on end runs, but made the mistake of not opening up in the last five minutes and using end runs or an overhead attack against the weary veterans. Aside from this, the high school used good strategy throughout the game.

One of the few passes the high school tried was intercepted by Mahoney of the alumni, and the high school also lost a big distance through a pass from center which the punter failed to stop. The high school had reached the alumni's 30 yard line, but through these misfortunes it was forced back to its own 15 yard line by the time the game ended.

Versatile attacks were used by both teams, but these were confined almost entirely to running plays. Each team completed one forward pass, the alumni a short one from Philbrook to Brosterhouse, the high school a long one, Loomis to Pitman.

High school players who made the best showing included O'Brien, who made several long runs; Williams and Fultz, who starred on defense; and on the lighter team, May, halfback; Rollins, quarter, and G. McKay, end.

The team was stronger than had been anticipated, especially on defense; but its attack will have to be strengthened if Redmond is to be defeated next Friday.

Clean Play Seen
The game was cleanly played on both sides, time being taken out for an injury only once, and none of the players was injured so as to be out
