

Central Oregon Schedule Gives Chance For More Games

OUTLINE PLANS AT CONFERENCE

Two Weeks Rest Afforded Local Squad

Opportunity for all of the Central Oregon high schools to schedule games with teams from other parts of the state is given this year for the first time by the schedule which was adopted at a meeting of school officials and coaches at Redmond Saturday.

The Bend high school at least is planning to take advantage of this opportunity and to schedule at least two outside games.

In stead of six games as in the past with other teams in the conference, Bend will have only five games for the first time, playing Mitchell only once, on the home field, while the second team will play against Madras.

Madras high will also play against the Redmond and Prineville second teams.

Following the game with Redmond high Friday of this week, the Bend team will have two weeks' rest before Prineville's eleven comes here. Unless an outside game is scheduled. Again on October 24 there will be opportunity for an outside game, as on the 23rd the local second team plays at Madras.

Furthermore, the Central Oregon conference schedule closes on Armistice day, and two games could be scheduled after that date if desired. However, it is probable that not more than two outside games will be played unless Mitchell high fails to show the strength which would require the local first team to play, as seven games is a pretty fair schedule. If the local second team holds Mitchell, then a third outside game might be arranged.

The schedule as drawn up is unfavorable to Bend in that the local eleven must play its two hardest games—against Prineville at Prineville and against Redmond here on Armistice day—within five days of each other.

On November 6, Bend plays Prineville at the Crook county seat, always a desperately fought game, while Redmond plays Mitchell at Redmond, probably a less grueling contest and the next Wednesday the Armistice day game is played here.

The schedule follows:

October 2, Bend at Redmond, Madras at Moro.

October 9, Madras at Redmond (second team), Prineville at Mitchell.

October 16, Redmond at Mitchell, Prineville at Bend.

October 23, Bend (second team) at Madras, Prineville at Redmond.

October 30, Madras at Prineville (second team), Mitchell at Bend.

November 6, Mitchell at Redmond, Bend at Prineville.

November 11, Redmond at Bend, Mitchell at Prineville.

STANFORD DEFEAT FIRST DAY UPSET

Notre Dame Score Looks Auspicious for Rockne

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—One tremendous surprise—the defeat of Stanford by the Olympic club of San Francisco—was the only upset attending the opening of the football season.

There were very few chances of upsets, however, as practically all of the big teams had opponents that were scheduled only to give them a workout. The size of the scores, which mean little in early season games, were the chief features.

The Notre Dame-Baylor game was, from a national standpoint, the most interesting game of the day. There was a general curiosity to see what Knute Rockne had done to replace the 11 stars that were recognized last year as the national champions.

In winning by a score of 11 to 0, it looked as if Rockne had not only developed another great team, but three teams. The size of the score was impressive because Baylor is anything but a setup, having been undefeated in the southwest for several seasons.

Among the eastern teams Syracuse, Dartmouth, Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania looked to be very promising. Penn State was a disappointment in beating Lebanon Valley only 14 to 0.

The "big three" and the western conference teams do not get started until next Saturday as they are bound by a limited schedule agreement.

One of the most important games of the season will be played Saturday at Urbana between Illinois and Nebraska. It will have no bearing on the western conference or the Missouri valley conference standing but will go a long way to prove what Red Grange is up to this season.

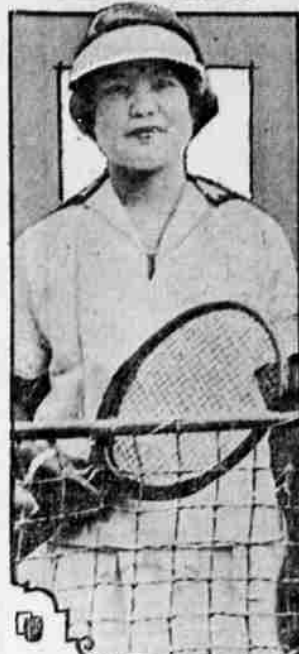
Yale, Harvard and Princeton will open with warmup games—Yale against Middlebury, Harvard against Rensselaer, and Princeton against Amherst.

Redmond Lineup Mystery Although Game Near

All Prevailing Silence Interpreted as Indicating Surprise From Coach Borden Beck In Store

With the big opening game of the season just four days away, complete mystery surrounds the preparations of the Redmond high school football squad for its annual tussle with the Bend high eleven on Bend day at the Deschutes county fair.

Further than that Redmond has several big linemen, new to Central Oregon but experienced high school players, absolutely no information has emanated from Coach Borden Beck's camp. The Redmond Spokesman remains totally silent regarding the squad, and citizens of the city to the north are keeping remarkably quiet, all of which points to Beck's springing a surprise in this first game.

It is probable that whatever the nature of this surprise, it will be built around the versatile ability of Justin King, one of the most dangerous backs who has ever donned padded trousers in Central Oregon.

Chief among King's propensities is his proficiency as an open field runner, which is all the more effective because he is that rare article, a perfect threat man. From punt formation he can either run, pass or kick; and against Bend's green line, his menace is all the greater.

In opposing straight line smashes, the local forwards may be able to hold their own, but they are not sufficiently experienced to cope with the

surprise type of attack which Redmond is expected to adopt for this game. This is where King, with the assistance of the heavy and experienced linemen reported to be in Beck's camp, come in; and followers of the local team are revealing considerable uneasiness in consequence.

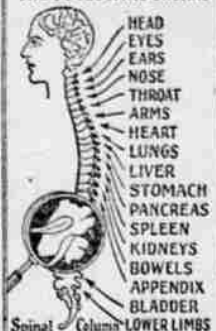
