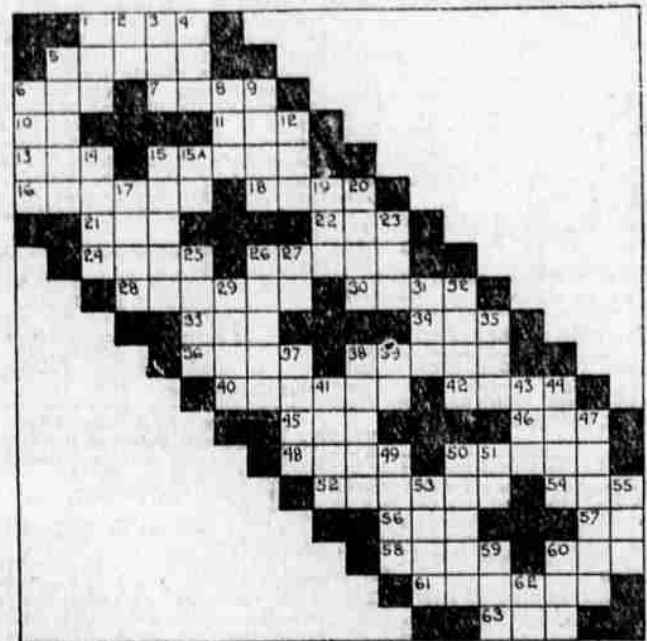
WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—"Bucky" Harris and the members of his championship baseball club called at the White House today to receive the president's congratulations for their American league championship.

WITNESS ASKS REAL FLIERS

Major Kilner Says Pilots
Dissatisfied

Separate Air Unit Suggested
When Hearings Resumed by Board

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Army airmen are convinced that if the United States air defense is to be made effective it must be taken out of the hands of those now in control and operated by "actual flying men." Major W. G. Kilner, executive officer in the army air service, told the president's special aircraft board today.

Kilner, who had charge of all aviation training during the war, declared that there was great dissatisfaction among pilots with the present system.

A reorganization to establish a separate air unit—as recommended by Major General Patrick—was advocated by Kilner, the first witness, when hearings were resumed by the board in a crowded house committee room today.

"We have the best pursuit planes and training planes in the world," Kilner said.

Representative Carl Vinson, Georgia, democrat, asked Kilner to explain what he meant when he said there was "dissatisfaction" among the men.

"There is first, a slowness of action," Kilner said. "When we want to do anything, we can't do it speedily. We are hampered by avoidable delays."

"Then there seems to be a lack of comprehension of our problems by authorities. I mean in the department—not in congress. We never asked congress for anything we did not get."

"Then we are hampered by the facts that all our officers are junior grades."

"The recommendations of our first lieutenants don't carry much weight when there are brigadier generals around."

Cholera Plague Spreads
Through the Philippines

MANILA, P. I., Sept. 28.—The cholera record over the week end here was 11 dead, with 35 suspected cases admitted to hospitals.

In addition, a number of cases have been reported in the municipal area surrounding Manila. Major General McRae, commanding the Philippines departments, has ordered the entire military personnel to be vaccinated.
