

Pittsburgh Remains Favorite In World Series Betting

LITTLE MONEY SEEN, HOWEVER

Giants Banking on Pirates' Punch

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Pittsburgh still remains the favorite in the betting here to win the world series from Washington, which starts next week in the National league city.

Betting commissioners in the financial district said they had seen less world-series money and heard less activity this year than they had in years.

Several firms had \$5,000 to bet against \$5,000 that the Pirates will win the series and the same amount at the same price that the Senators will lose the first game of the series.

Odd on players have been so badly stung on the favorites in the past three years that they may have learned the lesson that baseball does not follow form and averages when two evenly matched teams go into a short series.

John McGraw, manager of the Giants, who would not be swayed by league loyalty to pick the Pirates if he thought the Senators were going to win, voices the sentiment of many baseball men.

"The better team does not always win a short series," he said. "The breaks are of the most vital importance and they can't be figured. The Pirates and the Senators look to me like even money."

With the exception of Jack Bentley and Bill Terry, all of the Giants regulars think that Pittsburgh's punch and speed will beat the Senators.

Reports that Hurky Harris, Walter Johnson and Roger Peckinpaugh are not in good shape may be keeping some Washington money off the market. Bets offered in New York, however, are no indications of outside sentiment. The feeling in New York is absolutely neutral and is influenced too much by the desire to take in a bet.

BEND TEAM TO TRY TO OVERCOME JINX

Redmond Unbeaten In Six Years In Bend Day Game

For the sixth consecutive time the Bend high school football team on Friday will attempt to remove the "jinx" which has hovered over its attempts to win the annual Bend day game against Redmond at the Deschutes county fair.

Since 1919, when the local high school drubbed Redmond in this game, one of the three outstanding events of the sports calendar in Central Oregon, the Bend team has not won a victory on the gridiron at Redmond. Last year Bend won the conference championship, but the Bend day game was a scoreless tie.

Prospects of breaking the six year hoodoo appeared slim today, with the local team, particularly the line, showing less form than its predecessor; but the Bend fans are counting on the team's traditional morale to win a victory, and will be on hand in record numbers to lend their support.

Strictly speaking, the Bend day game has been an annual affair only since 1921, but such a game was played in 1919, and it was won by Bend 44 to 0. The next year the game at Redmond was not played during the fair, but it marked the beginning of Redmond's long domination of athletic honors in Central Oregon. The team from the north end of the county won 27 to 7.
