MAFALDA

It could not be suggested that Brough stabbed himself with a hatpin and fell into the river. It is clear that one or other of the prisoners put him in the Thames; you would not be likely to believe that this girl disposed of a six foot man in such a fashion. Gaete says that he acted in defense of Jill Seaton and in the struggle Brough went over the wharf into the water.

"But observe, members of the jury," said Sir Charles quietly, "that Brough was not merely found drowned; the cause of death—though made more certain through his being thrown in the river—was a wound from a hatpin."

"Who dealt that wound?"
"Could it have been deliberately inflicted by Gaete? In that case he must have taken that pin from Miss Seaton, with or without her knowledge, for it was her pin, and she was wearing it? And contrived, during the struggle, to wound Brough with it, mortally. Is such a thing likely?"

"I come now to Jill Seaton. She stands in a very different category from Gaete. Whatever the result of this trial, sympathy must naturally be felt for her. Here is a young woman against whose character nothing has ever been said, who had been badly treated by Tatham Brough, and feeling, of course, a natural resentment against him."

"He encounters her in this lonely spot on the wharf, a quarrel arises. So much is certain. And Brough is mortally wounded by the hatpin which Jill Seaton brought to that place and was wearing. That also is certain.

each other with hatpins. Is it conceivably possible that Gaete took this pin from the girl who was wearing it, in the course of the quarrel, and used it against Brough? Such a theory would not bear examination.

"Gaete says he knows nothing of any hatpin. Why does he say that? Is it to shield Jill Seaton?"

"I submit that the evidence points clearly to one conclusion; the accused are jointly responsible for the death of Brough; that Jill Seaton in the course of the quarrel struck that blow with the pin. Whatever the result of that blow, it was Gaete who put Brough in the river—and sealed his fate. That is the case which the prosecution puts to you."

"As to the provocation which Jill Seaton received, and what occurred between her and Brough on the wharf, you will mark that you have her word for it, and the word of Gaete. The prosecution neither accepts nor rejects that story; it will be for you to weigh it. The dead man cannot testify for himself."

"Jill Seaton's story is that she fainted and was oblivious to all these vital things that happened when Tatham Brough lost his life; she cannot explain them, and has to leave that to Gaete."

"Do you believe her?"
"And Gaete? What do you think of his story? That he came upon Brough in that lonely place, practically by accident—a coincidence? That he put Brough in the river—which he did not mean to do—and as an afterthought tried to rescue him? That he did not know Brough had 200 pounds in bank notes on his person at the time when the meeting occurred, and that Gaete was not the man who changed those same notes at the bank the next morning as soon as the doors were open."

"I invite you to accept fully the testimony of the bank cashier, who recognized Gaete and swore to his identity, having no possible interest to swear anything but the truth. That witness' hesitation when cross examined was nothing more than the hesitation of an honest man hard pressed by clever questioning."

"Where was Gaete when those notes were being changed? Who was the man that changed them, if it was not he?"

"Do you believe him? Do common sense and experience lead you to credit a word of Gaete's story?"

"As to any difference in the degree of guilt, between the prisoners, I intend to say nothing. You will have other directions than mine."

"I ask you to consider the weight of evidence, and to give your decision whether or not the two accused, or either of them, caused the death of Tatham Brough."

The crown counsel turned over his papers and sat down, with the air of a man whose task is over, and whose doubts, if he ever had any, are at rest. The faces of the jury were somber, and even the whippers in the gallery were hushed.
