OREGON RESOURCES ARE SEEN AT FAIR

Wealth and Its Utilization Shown at State Exposition

OREGON STATE FAIR, Salem, Sept. 30.—"Aren't you proud of your Oregon?" is often heard from the citizen who has inspected the state fair exhibits. Showing the vast wealth of Oregon resources and how to utilize them, rather than advertising past accomplishments, is the spirit of this state fair.

A little diversified well laid out and well managed Oregon farm with buildings and farmstead laid out to scale, shows how the real business farmer is putting it over. The home and the outbuildings are flanked by garden, lawn and orchard, with wood lot, pasture and field lying behind. Animals and poultry are feeding, even the clothes are on the line, an automobile purring at the door, while most of the machinery rests in barn and shed.

A merry-go-round is used by the experiment station to show the weakness of some farm management systems, which lead to failure. These systems are always in hasty action but never get anywhere, like the merry-go-round—just like that. The weak horses are such points in the systems as no rotation, lack of record keeping, low yield, and wrong crop selection. Methods of correction are pointed out.

Child welfare is represented by a house of health—a real house in form and color suggestive of the glory of wholesome child life. The colors are bright, the structure rugged, and light and air abundant. One poor sister is seen building on her beauty with rouge and pencil, while her prettier sisters tell her the real American beauty products are foods such as carrots for vim, beets for color, and milk for growth. Real moving pictures accentuate the same idea.

Forest gifts are seen on native Christmas trees—gifts of utensil and ornament, a profusion of useful and beautiful wood products. Distillers are at work distilling and refining essential oils from waste lumber products.

NEAR EAST RELIEF THEME OF SPEAKER

Inmates of Orphanage Will Rule Turkey, Predicted

Work being carried on by the Near East relief in Asia was briefly described today noon at the Bend Commercial club forum luncheon in the Pilot Butte Inn by Mrs. W. E. Rambo, missionary with many years' experience in India and the Near East.

Mrs. Rambo in her brief address described her experiences at the Harounia orphanage, near Tarsus. Mrs. Rambo was in this orphanage when it was shelled by Turkish forces. An American flag flying from the orphanage was not touched by shell fire, although the building was riddled by bullets. This flag was shown to the commercial club members by Mrs. Rambo.

The relief work cannot be dropped until the children now being cared for have grown up, Mrs. Rambo said. She predicted that some day Turkey will fall and that the children now being educated and cared for through relief work will rule. Following Mrs. Rambo's address, pictures of children and orphanages in the Near East were projected on an improvised screen by W. A. Selwood, connected with the Near East relief work.

Mrs. Rambo was introduced by Rev. Francis H. Ball, who presided at the luncheon. Others introduced included George C. Jewett, president of the federal land loan bank of Spokane, and his associates, R. B. Ramo, in charge of the distributing plant of the General gasoline company in

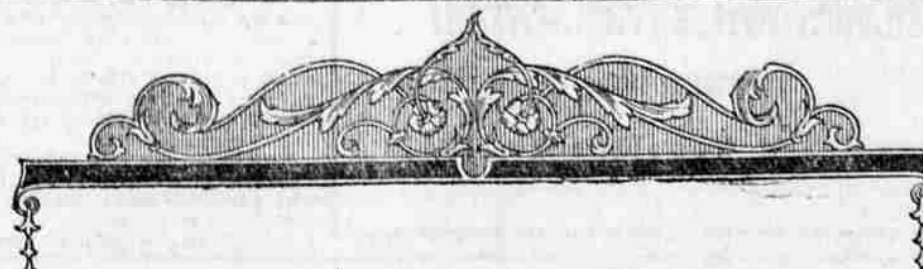
Pilot Butte Inn Room Secured for Red Cross
