DEBT MISSIONS SETTLE TERMS

But French Government Yet to Ratify

Patchwork Agreement on Debt Covers Only Five Years, Is Made Known

(U. P. Lensed Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—A temporary settlement of the French debt was reached here today between French and American debt funding commissions.

It provides that France shall make certain payments for the next five years when the French capacity to pay will again be discussed by the two countries.

The French debt mission will leave Washington immediately for France. The annual payment on account of the debt for the next five years will be \$40,000,000.

This settlement was announced to the press late today by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon. A statement explaining the settlement was promulgated in a few minutes.

The patchwork settlement, it was emphasized, is subject to ratification or rejection by the French government. Finance Minister Caillaux having told the American commission that he had no power to enter such an arrangement. He explained that he was empowered only to make a full settlement.

No agreement of any kind was signed by either commission because of this limitation of power.

The agreement will not be effective if the French government refuses to make the annual \$40,000,000 payments for the next five years as agreed to by Caillaux, it was said.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—A new set of American proposals for funding the \$4,200,000,000 French debt to the United States were submitted to the French debt mission today when the two debt bodies resumed negotiations in joint session.

Will Leave Tomorrow
With only 24 hours left in which to effect a settlement if Finance Minister Caillaux adheres to his plans to depart for France tomorrow, the French commissioners took the new propositions, which were described by a high official of the American commission as "a complete change from former French proposals," under consideration.

The proposals were handed to the French at a 10 minute joint meeting of the two commissions this morning and a reply is expected from them at another joint meeting scheduled at 3 p. m. today.

This eleventh hour development followed a visit by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and other members of the American commission to the White House and the issuance of a sensational statement by Mellon repudiating authorized statements from the French side that a tentative agreement on terms and the security clause had been reached by sub-committees of the two commissions last night.

The French were completely silent concerning the rebuff and, following the debt meeting, retired behind the doors of the French embassy, from which they refused to be drawn for comment.

So comprehensive was Mellon's statement in blocking off all avenues of speculation along these lines, however, that there was little more than confusion concerning the incident.

Traffic to be Permitted On New Paving, Stated
Traffic will be permitted on the completed pavement on the section of Scott street which lies outside the city limits, at 4 o'clock this afternoon, announces Fred Fairry, manager of the Warren Construction Co., which has done the work.

However, men are still working on the rock shoulders of the roadway, and motorists are warned to exercise care in traveling over this section.

No Cost For Licenses For Disabled Veteran
It is not generally known by former service men in this part of the state that a disabled veteran of the world war can secure a hunting and fishing license for the rest of his life in Oregon without cost, explains Mrs. V. A. Forbes, local Red Cross secretary.

In order to secure such a permit, disabled veterans must write to the veterans' bureau, in the Woodlark building in Portland, addressing the request to Zach Taylor. After receiving credentials from this bureau, the applicant is to forward them to the state game commission, in the Pittock building in Portland.

SCHOOLS FEATURE FIRE PREVENTION

Appropriate Programs to be Given, Says Ager

Schools of Bend will observe fire prevention week, October 4 to 10, with impressive and appropriate programs. It is announced from the office of G. W. Ager, city superintendent of schools. A circular letter has been sent to all teachers in Bend, suggesting programs of observance.

"The people of Bend feel proud of the fine silk flag presented by Governor Walter M. Pierce to the schools of Bend for the active part they took in the fire prevention work in the school year 1923-24." Superintendent Ager mentions in his letter to the instructors. "They are proud of the Thomas H. Ince cup won by the city this year and hope, through united cooperation of all agencies concerned, to be able to hold the cup two more years, when it would become the permanent property of the city."

Fire Chief Carlson will visit the Bend schools next week, and will be given an opportunity of talking to the children on fire prevention. The suggested program for fire prevention week in the schools is short talks on fire prevention, reading of fire prevention essays, short fire prevention "quiz" on materials studied, reading of the governor's proclamation, and fire drills.
