

TWO MORE BODIES FOUND IN ENGINE ROOM WHEN DIVERS LOWERED TO SUBMARINE S-51

ASK INCENDIARY TO BE TREATED IN INSTITUTION

**Bessie Keenan Confesses
Setting Fire**

DREAMS GAVE IDEA

**Tied Own Feet, Admitted to
Officers—Sought to Con-
ceal Neglected Work**

Representing the state fire marshal's office, Chief Tom Carlson will file a complaint not later than tomorrow afternoon asking commitment to a state institution of Bessie Keenan, 21 year old girl who confessed last night that she set fire to the Tracy Fairchild house, 620 Riverside, Monday morning. She did this, she explained, to conceal the fact that she had neglected to do certain work which she was expected to do while Mr. and Mrs. Fairchild were out of the city. Delay in filing the complaint was allowed this morning by Deputy State Fire Marshal H. H. Pomeroy after learning that the girl's sister and brother were on their way to Bend from The Dalles.

The girl's confession, made to Pomeroy, District Attorney A. J. Moore and Fire Chief Tom Carlson in the presence of newspaper reporters Thursday evening, came as the culmination of questioning on the part of the officers throughout the day, during which they constantly pointed out to her the absurdity of the story she had told at first.

This story had been that a strange man had come to the house demanding food, and that when she had refused to give it to him, he had bound her feet and then set fire to the house.

Jewelry Scattered
According to the confession, the girl had not felt well during Saturday and Sunday, while the Fairchilds were away, and had failed to wash the woodwork in the front room. She had gone to a dance at Pleasant Ridge with Miss Frances Snee and two young men, one of them Miss Snee's cousin, and had spent Saturday and Sunday nights at the Snee home.

She stayed away from the Fairchild home these nights because she had been frightened Friday night while staying there alone, believing there was someone in the house. On Sunday she was ill as a result of eating grapes, and Monday morning after returning to the Fairchild home she suffered an attack of unconsciousness.

After making preparations to do the washing, she went upstairs to telephone for groceries; and on her way back to the basement she set fire to a box of papers standing near the foot of the stairs. This was done, she said, to smoke up the house so that her failure to wash the woodwork would not be discovered.

Next the girl scattered some jewelry about the front room to make it appear that someone had attempted a robbery, and then called the fire department, asking the telephone operator to turn in the alarm.

Denies Earlier Fires
After tying her feet with the small rope which she found in the kitchen, Bessie started to crawl to the front door, but was overcome by the smoke, and fainted. She did not regain consciousness until she had been carried to the W. J. Williams home.

The idea of starting the fire, Bessie said, had been gained from dreaming of the Fairchild house burning down the night before.

Once before, while living near Richfield, Idaho, the girl dreamed that her uncle's house, a mile and one-half from her home, burned down, and two nights later it did so, she related in her confession. A year before that, she had dreamed about the same uncle the night before his house burned down. She denied having anything to do with causing these

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Penitentiary Gambling Is Charge of Chaplain

**Methodists In Eugene Con-
vention Bryant's Audience**

**Untrue, Both as to Guards and Con-
victs, Asserted by Warden
Dalrymple In Reply**

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 2.—Five gambling tables were in operation at the Oregon state prison prior to the recent break when three men were killed, according to charges made before the Oregon Methodists' conference, in session here, by Rev. C. H. Bryant, chaplain at the prison.

He charged that both guards and prisoners took part in the games, which were held in the "dog house," although the guards did not play with the prisoners.

Following an address by State Senator Jay Upton, the conference voted to request the state legislature to appropriate funds to have Oregon represented in the hall of fame at Washington. Dr. John McLoughlin and Jason Lee have been chosen as suitable men to represent the state.

CHARGES DENIED
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—Charges of gambling by convicts and guards in the "dog house" at the state penitentiary, made by Rev. C. H. Bryant, prison chaplain, before the Oregon Methodist conference, were denied today by Warden A. M. Dalrymple.

"There has never been any gambling either by prison guards or convicts within the prison to my knowledge since I have been in charge of the prison," Dalrymple declared.

He admitted that there "may be some watering of tobacco and such" on baseball and other sports, however.

JAPANESE SEEKING REDRESS IN COURT

**Leaders of Toledo, Oregon,
Riot Defendants**

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—A suit seeking \$125,000 damages for five Japanese who were ousted from Toledo, Oregon, July 12 in a race riot, was on file in federal court here today. Nine residents of Toledo and leaders in a citizen mob who participated in the affair were named as defendants. The case will attain international significance, it was said here by attorneys for the Japanese.

Toledo citizens, enraged by the importation of Japanese laborers by the Pacific Spruce corporation lumber mill, did not inflict any bodily injury on the Orientals, but they took them to the county line and warned them not to come back.

BODY SOLVES MYSTERY

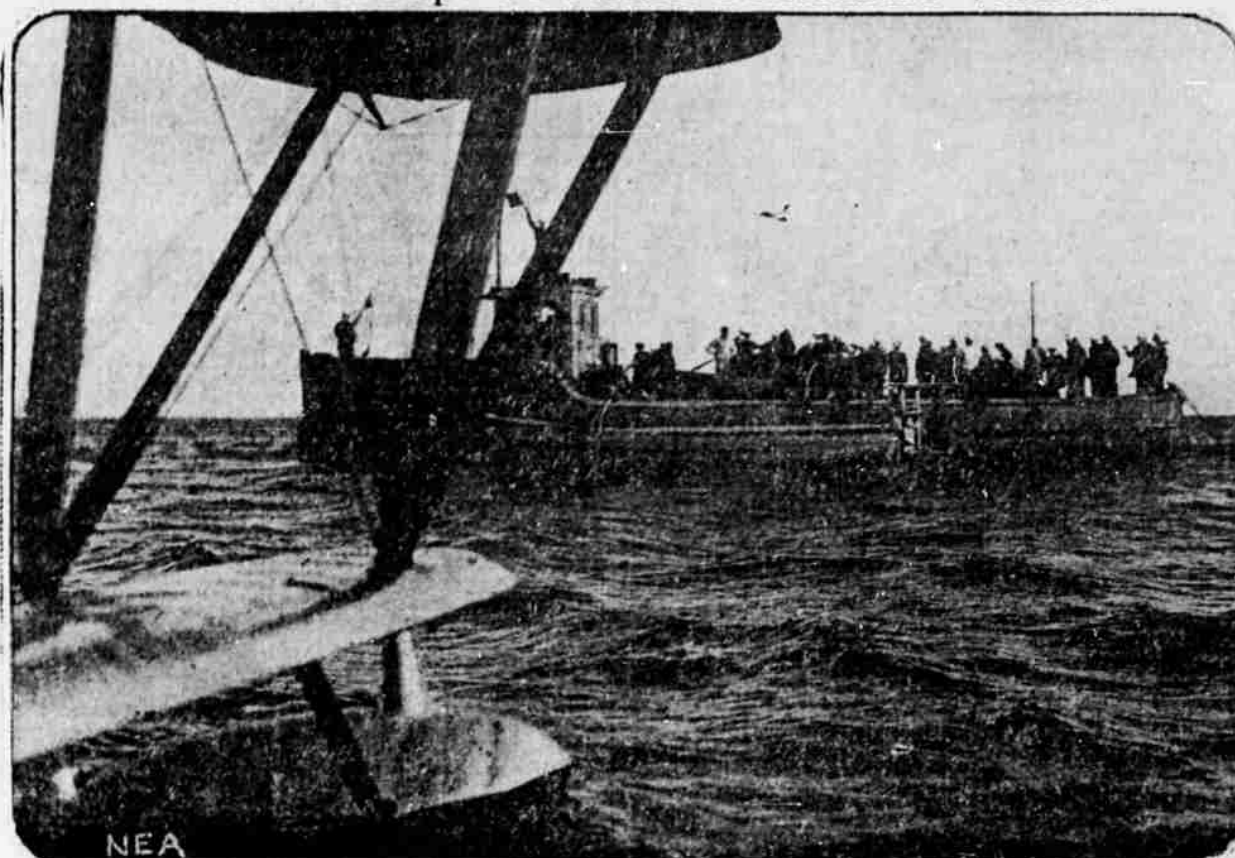
Bend Pays Homage to Queen of Deschutes Fair

WILL RECLAIM WHERE NEEDED

**Plans Well Under Way,
Says Elwood Mead**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Plans are now well under way to insure "without interruption" the irrigation development of the west, Elwood Mead, commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, announced today.

Mead denied reports that there has been needless delay in carrying out projects from which appropriations were made by the last congress.

The bureau desires to carry out the purpose of the reclamation act of 1924, and to build projects wherever a sound economic development is assured, he said.

"The situation on old projects the investigations of the fact finders' committee, and the hearings of the last congress make it evident that there has been too great haste in the past in beginning construction," Mead added.

Increased cost of construction, delay in organizing the water users in some instances, and failure of the states to provide their share of the cost, were stated by Mead as main causes of the present delay in getting new projects started.

Tot's Behavior Angers, Hanged as Punishment

The child, who is not related to Mrs. Williams, had been left in her care by its mother, who lives in the same house.

Police say the woman is not insane, but possesses a naturally mean disposition.

Industrial Survey to be Started Here at Once Decided by Directors of Bend Commercial Club

**Accurate Information Sought to be Used In Interesting
New Enterprises—Portland's Industrial Report
Will be Used as a Guide In Local Work**

Plans for an industrial survey of Bend and Central Oregon, especially that part of the mid state country which is in the trade territory of Bend, have been approved by the directors of the Bend Commercial club. The survey will start in the immediate future.

CATTLE RUSTLING TRUE BILL FOUND

**Robertson and Whealy Will
Face Larceny Trial**

Charges of cattle rustling will be faced in circuit court here, probably next week, by Vannie Robertson and Ralph Whealy, who were indicted today by the grand jury. One other indictment was returned last night, a secret true bill.

Robertson and Whealy are charged with larceny of a red and white heifer calf which is alleged to have been the property of Lewis W. Bennett, rancher of near Hampton butte.

The defendants admitted in the preliminary hearing in August that they had obtained the calf in question at the Winfree ranch, but said that Whealy had traded a mule and a larlat to Newt Winfree, an 18 year old boy, for six calves and that this was one of them.

The complaint in this case was signed by Kenneth Thompson, who had seen the defendants taking the calf to the John Helfrich ranch in a trailer behind their automobile.

Whealy and Robertson are also charged jointly with William McKinley, with other cattle thefts, the evidence against them having been found by Deputy Sheriffs George Stokoe and L. A. W. Nixon while at the ranch house which the three men occupied on the Helfrich homestead. The grand jury was expected to consider this charge today.

Engine Overtakes Handcar, Railroad Workers Killed

ADRIAN, Mich., Oct. 2.—Two railroad workers were instantly killed, two others were believed fatally injured and 17 others received minor injuries near here today when a Chicago to Detroit passenger train crashed into a handcar with several trailers attached.

The crash was attributed to a heavy fog which accompanied a severe storm.

Purpose of the survey is to secure accurate information which can be used in bringing new industries to the Deschutes territory; to provide data for use in the commercial club office in answering letters and inquiries, and to secure information to be used in conjunction with a state industrial survey now being made.

Scope of the survey, first of its kind ever undertaken here, will include general facts about Bend—its population, school attendance, public institutions, attractions, churches and other things; information about industries now in operation, such as the mills; data relative to raw material, such as lumber waste, agricultural resources and stocks; facts about transportation, fuel, power, markets and labor.

"By using the industrial report of Portland as a guide, the work of getting up a similar report on Bend and Central Oregon will be comparatively easy," L. K. Cramb, secretary of the Bend Commercial club, mentions in explaining the scope of the work.

When completed, the industrial report of Central Oregon will not only include much valuable information and data, but also maps, diagrams and other illustrative material. This report, when compiled, will be indexed, making the great store of information easily accessible. According to tentative plans, a considerable part of the report will be given to facts about timber and agricultural resources.

There is surprisingly little definite information available at present relative to the resources of Central Oregon, it is pointed out by those who are making plans for the survey. This report will have great value in connection with the colonization work to be carried on in this part of the state, it is believed.

INDICT NINE FOR WRECK

BIGGEST CROWD ATTENDS FAIR

REDMOND, Oct. 2.—The biggest crowd on record crammed the stands and massed its automobiles around the track at the Deschutes county fair here this afternoon, at the same time that hundreds were still making their way through the attractive exhibits in other parts of the grounds.

The Bend crowd, attending primarily for the annual Bend-Redmond high school football game, was nevertheless greatly interested in the fair exhibits and especially in those from their own community, which were more extensive than in the past, particularly those arranged by the schools.

In the spectators' stands, Bend colors predominated, and it was seen that the Bend high school rooters were better organized and greater in number than ever in the past. The rooting section was under the command of Lester Gallagher and Ray Thatcher, yell kings named this week for the football season.

Bend was represented by a crowd of townspeople which was fully as numerous and as enthusiastic as the student group.

The Bend high eleven which was expected to start the game lined up as follows: Pitman, left end; Brink, left tackle; Williams, left guard; Rae or Corbin, center; Feltz, right guard; O'Leary, right tackle; D. McKay, right end; Loomis, quarterback; Ballantyne, fullback; O'Brien and Shull, halfbacks.

Officials for the game included Don McClintock, referee, and Bernard Ramsey, umpire.

Convict Given Acquittal For Death of Policeman

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 2.—Acquitted yesterday of the shooting of Patrolman Clyde Nunn, Floyd Hall, sensational convict-bandit and murderer, was back at Folsom prison today, awaiting the outcome of his appeal from the death sentence for the murder of H. J. Litzberg, Sacramento merchant.

Patrolman Nunn was shot during the manhunt for Hall and his prison pal, Joe Tanko, several days after the Litzberg murder. Testimony at the trial failed to show that Hall participated in the shooting.

FLOODING SHIP DESTROYS HOPE LATEST REPORT

**Torpedo Room Is Being
Given Final Test**

PONTOONS WILL LIFT

**Buoyancy Expected to Raise
Undersea Craft—Will
Tow to Boston**

NEW LONDON, Conn., Oct. 2.—The bodies of B. D. Lindsey and Walter D. Lawton, were recovered from the engine room of the ill fated submarine S-51 today.

Lawton was an electrician's mate first class, home at 148 Sea street, Weymouth, Mass., and Lindsey was an engineman second class of 527 East Government street, Pensacola, Fla.

With finding of the two bodies, the divers reported that the water tight compartment door leading into the motor room—the last room astern—was open. This meant definitely that the whole ship with the possible exception of the torpedo room—the first compartment forward—is flooded, and that nobody is alive in this part. The torpedo room will be tested this afternoon for presence of water.

If water is in there, too, as believed, then Admiral Christy's conviction that none lives will become a certainty.

Then derricks must be removed and huge pontoons brought to the scene. The pontoons will be filled with water and sunk alongside the submarine. After lines have been fastened to the submarine and to the pontoons, the water will be emptied from the pontoons, the buoyancy of which probably will bring the craft up.

Patching Required
Before this operation is made, the boat must be patched and pumped out. This work probably cannot be completed before three or four weeks. Once the submarine is up, it will be towed to Boston.

Admiral Beuret, after consulting Captain King and the wrecking master, this afternoon left for the scene of the wreck.

Before departing, he declined to reveal his plans, though it was known he was preparing for providing the necessary service in connection with the forthcoming salvaging.
