

Early Season Games May Play Big Part In Teams' Rating

REAL OPENING DUE TOMORROW

Eastern Colleges Facing Gridiron Test

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Two important games that will have much to do with the ranking of the big college teams at the end of the season will feature the real opening of 1925 football tomorrow. Topping the card in national interest and importance is the game between Illinois and Nebraska, at Urbana, Ill. The game not only will give a line on the western and Missouri valley conferences, but it will provide a comparison with the east as Illinois comes east on October 31 to play Pennsylvania, rated as one of the strongest teams in the east.

The game between Lafayette and Pittsburgh is the most important game on the eastern schedule. It is a tremendous early season test for both teams and Pittsburgh is looking to one of its good seasons.

Yale meets Middlebury at New Haven; Harvard plays Benelux at Cambridge and Princeton opposes Amherst at Princeton.

The service academies will also get into action for the first time. The army has an interesting and hard interservice game with Detroit and the navy has William and Mary, a little team, but one that may give the midshipmen a real game.

The southern and far western teams have no games of any great importance.

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 2.—South Dakota will play Northwestern Saturday before the biggest opening game crowd Evanston has known. "Moon" Baker will not be in the game. Gustafson, who took his place, has been injured also, and Griffith is being groomed to take the place vacated by the two.

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 2.—Bert Griffin, husky half, will go into tomorrow's game against Nevada in the place of Captain "Tut" Inlay of the California varsity. Inlay's back, injured last Saturday, is not yet in shape for him to play.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 2.—On the eve of the opening game with Willamette university, football critics say Oregon Agricultural college

has a faster team than it has had in years. Willamette will meet the Aggies Saturday.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 2.—Fans will get their first opportunity to judge the abilities of Richard Shore Smith, new University of Oregon football coach, when his team goes into the initial game of the season with the Multnomah club of Portland here Saturday.

Pershing Dark Horse, Convention Believes

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 2.—The Pershing boom took somewhat definite form today when rumors flew among incoming delegates that the former commander of the A. E. F. would be the principal "dark horse" in the race for commander in chief of the American Legion at the national convention here next week. No one seemed back of the Pershing movement, however, and the general understanding was that "Black Jack" would be a compromise candidate in case the convention came to a deadlock over the choice of a commander.

With six avowed candidates in the field, a deadlock seemed likely. Those who have announced their candidacy include:

John Rea McGuire of Cleveland, Ohio; Howard P. Savidge of Chicago; General George B. Duncan, commander of the seventh corps area, Omaha, who retired from the army October 10; O. L. Brodenhamer of Eldorado, Ark.; Edgar B. Dunlap of Gainesville, Ga.; and E. E. Spafford of New York city.

Soap Man Regains Cash Spent on Leonard Wood

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—A jury in the federal court of Judge Thomas Slick this afternoon returned a verdict in favor of Colonel William Cooper Procter, Cincinnati millionaire, who sued Colonel A. A. Sprague of Chicago for \$50,000—Sprague's share of a \$100,000 note which the two colonels signed jointly to defray expenses of the presidential boom for Major General Leonard Wood in 1920.

The jury decided that Sprague owes Procter \$62,097. This represents Sprague's share of the \$100,000, all of which Procter paid, plus interest of 5 per cent.

California Will Crush Much Wine This Year

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—Four hundred thousand gallons of wine—a sizable drink in these prohibition times—will be made legally and consumed in Northern California this year, according to internal revenue bureau statistics here today.

According to the bureau, 2,000 heads of families have filed their intention to make the 200 gallons of wine for home consumption that the law entitles them to crush.

Under the prevailing legal decisions, this wine, or fruit juice, must be "non intoxicating in fact," which simply means that the drinker thereof must judge his capacity well—for if he is caught in an inebriated condition he faces prosecution for illegal manufacture.

EUROPEAN RAFFLES AND GEMS SOUGHT

Rose Pink Pearls Lure In Donahue Jewel Theft

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—A European thief who followed two rose-pink pearls across the Atlantic was hunted today in the theft of jewelry valued at \$750,000 from Mrs. James P. Donahue, daughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth, five and ten cent store founder.

Police Commissioner Richard Enright took direct control of the case, upon which a large force of detectives, including city, hotel and insurance company agents, began investigation.

The fact that the two largest pearls in one of the necklaces stolen from the Donahue suite in the Hotel Plaza had arrived from Paris only 24 hours before the robbery, led police to the theory that the jewels had been followed from abroad.

The thief who perpetrated the perfectly timed robbery, occurring as it did within the space of 15 or 20 minutes while Mrs. Donahue was in her bath Wednesday afternoon, displayed a shrewd knowledge of jewels. They discarded four ropes of imitation pearls, which were so perfect as to confuse any save an expert.

Chief Hanson Bags Geese On Trip to Summer Lake

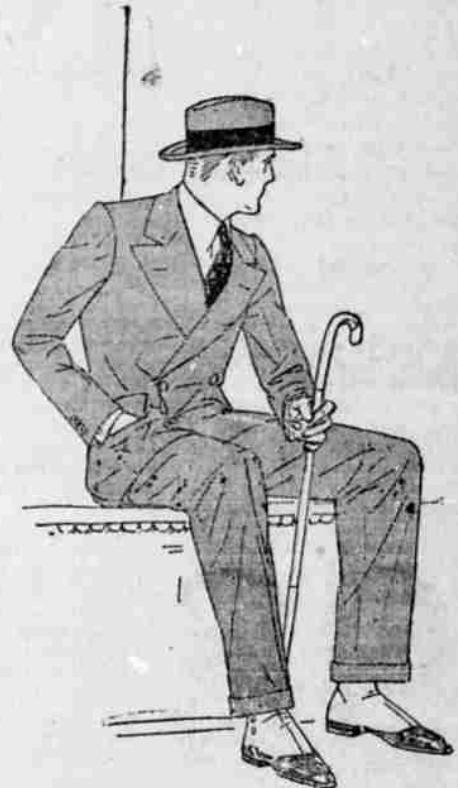

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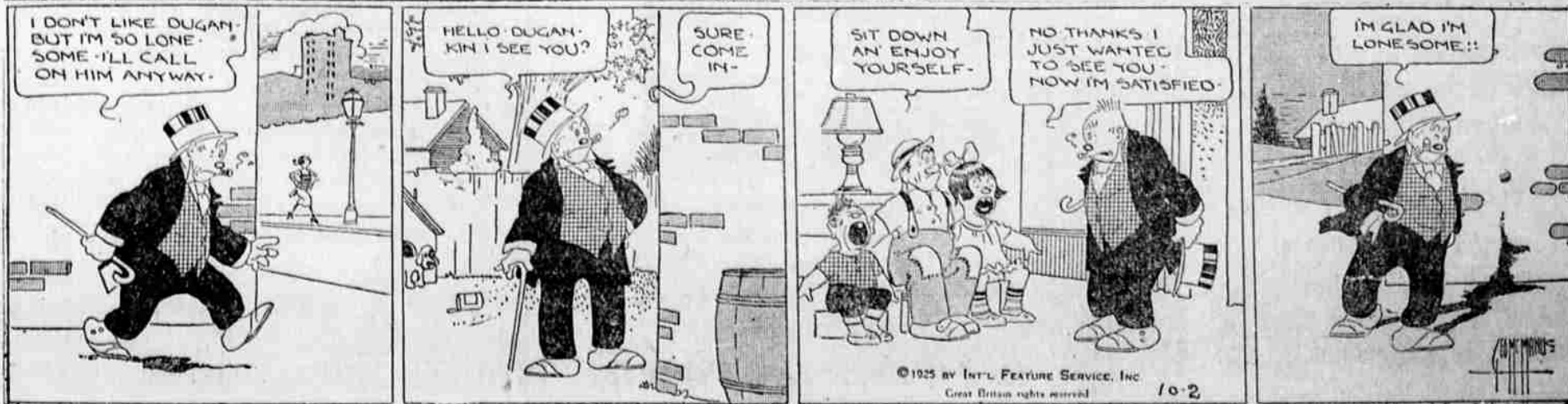
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
