Queen Eda was accompanied into the Pilot Butte Inn dining room by Mrs. W. F. Calbraith, president of the Tri County Women's association.

Immediately following the brief luncheon period, the queen and her attendants—Ruth Hansen, Doris Thompson, Hazel Bartlett, Doris Knorr, Gladys Wimp and Vera Dunham—returned to the flower decor-

NAVAL SECRETARY
ORDERS NEW WORKDefinite Fate of S-51 Men
Must be Learned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Secretary of the Navy Wilbur today ordered Admiral Christy to continue rescue operations at the scene of the sinking of the S-51.

Operations must be carried on, Wilbur said, for rescue, until it is determined that no one is alive in any of the compartments of the submarine.

When it is determined that no one is alive on the vessel, Christy is directed to continue his work in removing the bodies of the dead men. He is directed to relieve all unnecessary equipment in carrying out this work.

These instructions were wired to Admiral Christy after a conference with Rear Admiral E. W. Eberle, chief of naval operations, on Christy's request to be given authority to withdraw the wrecking derricks Century and Monarch.

"When determined no one alive in any compartment, continue efforts to recover bodies. Retain such equipment as necessary for this purpose. Authorized to relieve other equipment."

President to Start Trip
To Omaha Convention

WARNING GIVEN
TO LANSDOWNEValve Removal Made to
Cut Down WeightOriginal Installation For
Shenandoah Is Declared
More Nearly Foolproof

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 2.—Commander Lansdowne of the dirigible Shenandoah was warned by the navy department of the caution with which the ship had to be handled around "pressure height," because of the removal of 19 of its 18 automatic safety valves.

This fact was brought out by the correspondence read to the court of inquiry into the disaster today by Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, senior surviving officer.

It was also established in today's hearing that it was Lansdowne himself who recommended removal of the safety valves.

Moreover, Lansdowne's recommendation, dated last May 12, bore the endorsement of Captain George W. Steele, Jr., commanding officer of the Lakehurst station.

A desire to reduce the weight of the ship led Lansdowne to remove 19 of the 18 automatic valves, it was shown by the testimony. In his letter of May 12, Lansdowne stated that experience gained by the Shenandoah's trip to the Pacific coast showed that the ship could operate with fewer automatic valves and removal of 19 would reduce the weight by 400 pounds.

The bureau of aeronautics to which Lansdowne applied for permission to remove the valves, was fully aware of the hazards, it was shown in a letter from that department.

"If for any reason the ship gets out of control and drives above pressure height, consequences will be serious," a letter to Lansdowne stated. "The modified arrangement of valves proposed for the Shenandoah is not as fool proof as the original installation. The proposed arrangement imposes an added reason for cautious operation of the ship near pressure height."

"However, on the assumption that the operating personnel realized and accepts the operating practice which is involved and will take the necessary precautions, the arrangement of the gas valves and tanks as proposed is approved by way of experiment," the letter concluded.
