TRADE SWELLS ON EXCHANGE

Rails Dull, But Other Stocks Aggressive

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Free from worry, stocks gave one of the most impressive exhibitions of the current bull market in today's session. Trading was swollen to the heaviest proportions of the year and rapid advances went ahead throughout the industrial list.

United States Steel headed the day's bullish demonstration, moving ahead on huge transactions in response to further indications of a steady expansion and increasing business. Substantial advances were also

scored by such leaders as White, Mack Truck, A. T. and T., U. S. Rubber, American Smelting, Baldwin, Maitland Oil and Texas Company.

Several issues of the specialty type experienced sensational uprushes and gave the backwash of the railroad group the general list presented a picture of unimpaired vitality.
