

PROHI COMBINE IS MADE KNOWN

Pact Between U. S. and Canada Told

Information Exchanged Regarding Shipments of Liquor or Narcotics

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Canada and the United States have combined to suppress whiskey and narcotic smuggling along the Great Lakes and the Atlantic seaboard.

The state department today made public regulations of the convention of 1924 between the two powers, approved by President Coolidge and the Canadian cabinet, providing that each government will notify the other when authorities believe a rum or drug running ship is clearing to cross the boundary.

Customs officers are directed to refuse clearances of vessels when it is evident from the tonnage, size and general character of the ship or supposed false statements in the clearing papers that smuggling is intended. This will prevent clearances of small motorboats from Canada to points in Mexico and Cuba, it was pointed out.

Shipments of liquor through Alaska to northwestern Canada must be transported under the customs seals of both countries, according to the regulations. Shipments must be accompanied by a guard and provision is made for record of final dispatch from American territory.

means of the "exploring hole" in the engine room hatch.

Navy officers explained that this hole probably would permit of application of a compression gauge which would register whether or not water was in the engine room compartment.

This is the last compartment aft, and if it is filled, Admiral Christy's conviction that all men within are dead will be confirmed.

Believe Stern Flooded

The combined lift exerted by the Monarch and Century is 350 tons. It had been estimated that if the stern were not filled with water, this enormous power might barely suffice to pry the vessel from her sandy resting place.

Application of the "salvage air supply" simultaneously with the hoisting operation was intended to force out some water, thus lightening the weight upon which the two derricks had to pull.

It is assumed at the base that the "rescue operations" will now of necessity soon be converted into a "salvage operation."

However, it is understood that new operations are being made late this afternoon and that these will yield up further bodies to join the two already found.

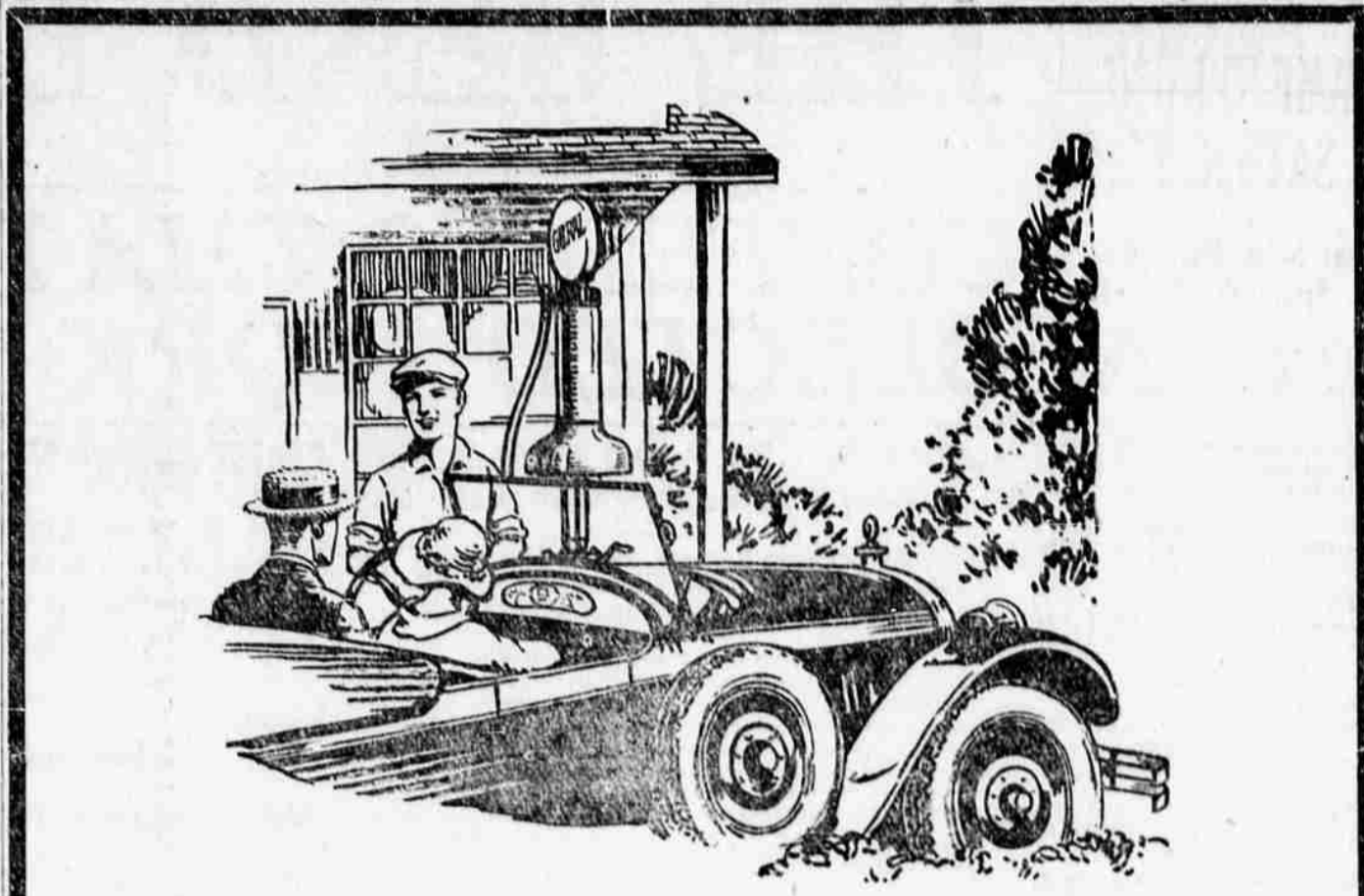
WOOL FAIRLY ACTIVE
