THE FREMONT TRAIL AGAIN

We are pained to observe that the Portland Telegram still persists in giving the name of Fremont trail to The Dalles-California highway thereby doing violence both to the facts of history and to the nomenclature established by the state highway commission. The matter would be of little importance were it not for the fact that those who are not acquainted with Dave Hazen's playful little whim may be confused and led to believe that there is actually another highway called by the name of Fremont.

The business all started several years ago when Dave and a few friends made the trip from The Dalles to Klamath Falls to establish the all-winter openness of the north and south highway. The fact that they got stuck in a snow drift somewhere around Shaniko has nothing to do with the story except that it gave Dave a few extra hours in which to think up something new to spring on his public. The result was his suggestion that The Dalles-California highway ought to be called the Fremont trail.

So far as we have been able to discover there was no falling over one another on the part of engineers, reporters, highway commissioners or other sections of the public to adopt Dave's suggestion, possibly because only about 30 miles of the 300 mile course of the highway is anywhere near the route taken by Fremont when he followed the squaw trail south from The Dalles. Dave, however, persists and whenever he gets a chance he uses his proposed name. We even have a suspicion that he got himself assigned to cover the meetings of the highway commission so that he could stick Fremont trail into his news stories now and then.

Of course it's all right. Dave does not mean any harm. But when anyone uses his stuff it should be remembered that maybe it is so and maybe it is just some little personal idea of his own that he is trying to get over.

Funeral Service Held For Prineville Farmer

PRINEVILLE, Oct. 3.—Funeral services for the late Samuel Ruberg, who died at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday morning at the home of his nephew, Martin Ruberg of this city, following a lingering illness of nearly a year, were held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock under the auspices of the local Knights of Pythias. Interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Ruberg was bedridden for the past six months.

Ruberg, who was 52 years old at the time of his death, was born in Minnesota, and when still a young man he moved to Idaho, where he remained for about 10 years. From Idaho he came directly to Prineville, where he made his home for the past 20 years. For the past five years he lived on his ranch two and one-half miles north of Prineville. He was a member of the Methodist church and the Knights of Pythias.

He is survived by five brothers and two sisters, Adolph of Seattle, Oscar of Idaho, Arndt of Portland, Edward of Washington, Charles of Prineville, Mrs. J. Pearson of Portland, and Mrs. Anna Anderson of Idaho.

Heinen Again Witness In Shenandoah Inquiry

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 3.—As a result of testimony which tended to strengthen his theory concerning the destruction of the Shenandoah, Captain Anton Heinen, dirigible expert, will be recalled to the stand on Monday in the naval probe here.

Heinen, who believes that the ship crashed because 10 safety valves were removed, will be called to the stand to verify his testimony.

Letters read into the record yesterday showed that the bureau of aeronautics, headed by Rear Admiral W. A. Moffett, was well aware of the hazards involved in the removal of the valves.

They were removed, it was brought out, only on Commander Zachary Lansdowne's insistence.

Monday Marks Time Limit For Second Half of Tax

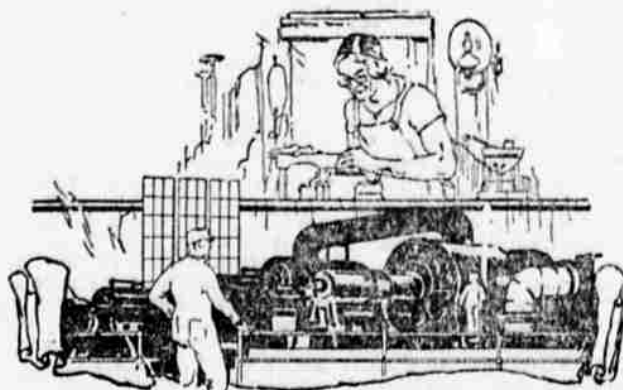
