

"THE MIKADO" DUE MARCH 29

O. A. C. Glee Clubs to
Present Operetta

Gilbert and Sullivan Mas-
terpiece to be Played
in Bend Next Week

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 21.—(Special.)—"The Mikado", presented jointly by the O. A. C. Glee and Madrigal clubs, is scheduled to appear in Bend Tuesday night, March 29. Fifty members of the cast in the operetta will leave Corvallis Friday morning on their annual tour of Oregon.

Two special chair car busses have been obtained for the trip. The first stop will be made in Roseburg, where the troupe will give the opening show Friday night. Other towns to be visited on the tour are Klamath Falls, Prineville, Portland and Monmouth.

Since the successful performance in Corvallis, where the clubs played to a packed house each night, two new towns have been added to the list. One show, sponsored by the alumni, will be given in Portland, and another performance has been scheduled for Monmouth.

Paul Petri, director of the conservatory of music at O. A. C., will accompany the players on the tour and direct the performances.

The operetta is a story built around Nanki-Poo, the heir to the throne of Japan, who is disguised as a wandering musician. The many trying situations which he encounters add comedy to the plot. Nanki-Poo's entire life is devoted to his love for Yum-Yum. This part will be taken by James Jenks of Albany.

The leading feminine role is that of Yum-Yum, played by Evelyn Quine of Roseburg. She loves Nanki-Poo, but is betrothed to Ko-Ko, who is "lord high executioner" in the town of Titipu. The part of Ko-Ko will be played by Marion Weatherford of Arlington. This part adds humor throughout the entire performance.

The role of the Mikado of Japan, father of Nanki-Poo, will be taken by Don Harris of Portland. Doris Zimmerman of Portland will be Katisha, an elderly lady in love with Nanki-Poo. John Spahnower of Corvallis, will play the part of Poo-Bah, who is "lord high everything else" of Titipu. In the progress of the play, Poo-Bah is condemned to death by the Mikado.

The part of Pish-Tosh, a noble lord, will be taken by Earl Riggs of Salem. Melba Hartzell of Portland will be Pitt-Sing, a sister to Yum-Yum. Dorothy Hamilton of Upland, Calif., will play the part of Peep-Bo, another sister of Yum-Yum's.

Students from the O. A. C. orchestra, chosen by Mrs. Marguerite MacManus, director, will accompany the singers. Cleone Andrews, sophomore in music, and pianist for the Madrigal club, will be the accompanist for the operetta, assisted by Myrtle Clayton, freshman in music. Mrs. E. L. Potter, former instructor in the public speaking department, has charge of the stage direction.

Women chosen from the Madrigal club who will sing in the chorus for the operetta will be Vivian Orcutt, Mary Davis, Geraldine Richardson, Elva Willey, Frieda Klopfenstein, Fay Keenins, Etta McCreight, Elizabeth Taylor, Gertrude Skow, Esther Liening, Stella Fishburn and Alice Andresen.

Woman Charges "Friend" Killed Husband In Night

New York, Mar. 21.—(LP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder charged today that her husband, Albert Snyder, art editor of "Motor Boating," had been murdered by Henry Judd Clay, a friend of Mrs. Snyder. Police Commissioner McLaughlin announced.

McLaughlin's statement came after Mrs. Snyder had been under almost constant questioning since her husband was found dead in their Queen's village home early yesterday, a stout piece of picture wire twisted around his throat.

Neighbors of the Snyder family said the wife and Gray had been friendly for two years.

After Mrs. Snyder had told her story, two detectives were sent to

Syracuse, where Gray, a salesman for a Syracuse corset firm, was said to have fled.

Gray was arrested by Syracuse police in the Onondaga hotel there and held pending arrival of the New York officers. Mrs. Snyder

That she, her husband and their nine year old daughter, Lorraine, had returned from a card party at 2:15 a. m. yesterday, finding Gray in the house.

After her husband and Lorraine had retired, Gray and Mrs. Snyder were left alone and they talked for some time.

Then, after Snyder was asleep, she charged that Gray went to his room and pounded Snyder on the head with a heavy object and also choked him with wire.

Prison officials believe that they have been assisted off the island by outsiders.

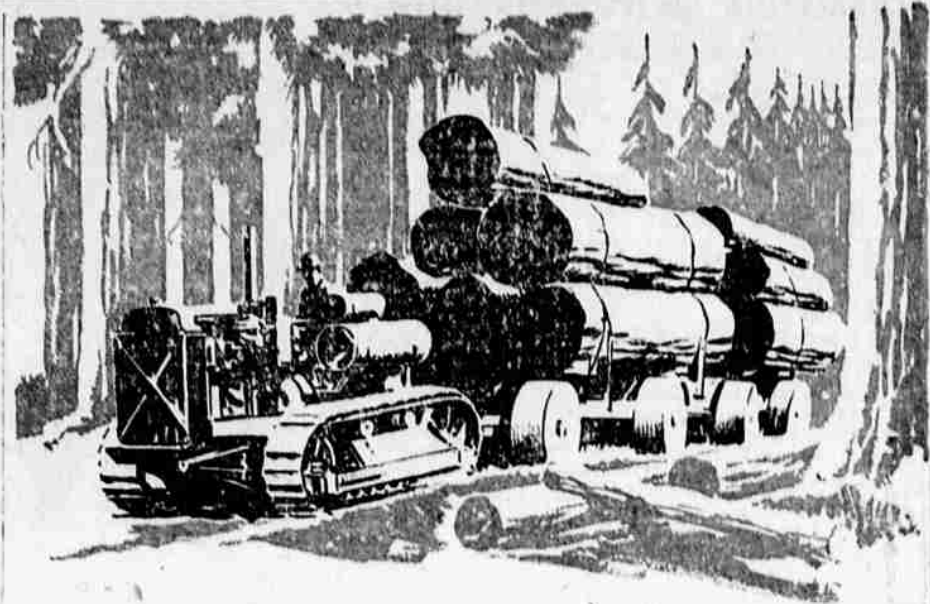
