

SCREEN STAR MAY BE HELD

Kelly Is Charged With Murder of Man

Dorothy Mackay Wanted as Material Witness—Saw Death Blows

Los Angeles, April 21.—(P)—For the second time in two days, Paul Kelly, popular film juvenile, was cast in the role of a murder defendant, when a coroner's jury returned a verdict today holding him responsible for the "bare knuckle murder" of Ray Raymond, stage comedian.

Los Angeles, April 21.—(P)—The arrest of beautiful Dorothy Mackay, stage star, as a material witness in connection with the alleged "bare knuckle murder" of her husband, Ray Raymond, loomed here today.

Steps to detain the actress were considered by the district attorney's office following the indictment of her admitted sweetheart, Paul Kelly, on first-degree murder charges.

The admission of Mrs. Raymond that she was in Kelly's apartment while he was administering an alleged "death beating" to her husband at the Raymond home, climaxed a day of sensational revelations after which the grand jury returned an indictment in record time.

The nerve-shattered actress, who collapsed four times during the grand jury probe, was scheduled to face another ordeal today when she will be called upon to view the broken and bruised body of her husband.

This step was ordered by Coroner Frank Nance for formal identification records which will

be presented at a coroner's inquest this afternoon at which Mrs. Raymond will again be called to testify.

Chief Speaks
Questioned as to the report that Mrs. Raymond would be formally detained Chief Deputy District Attorney Harold Davis said, "we'll see."
"What's to keep the witness from leaving town if they are not detained?" was Deputy District Attorney Ragan's comment.
Mrs. Raymond was still under the care of physicians today who administered sedatives in an effort to quiet her. Frequent spells of hysteria characterized her condition today following her fourth collapse on being told of Kelly's indictment.

The testimony of a new witness, Max Wagner, chum of the accused man, was expected to prove the high light of today's session before the coroner's jury.
Wagner is asserted to have made a number of startling disclosures in connection with the alleged efforts to "cover up" the death of the musical comedy favorite.

According to investigators, Wagner said he was given \$500, part of which was paid to a physician and part to the hospital in which Raymond died Tuesday morning.

Dr. W. J. Sullivan, who attended Raymond, testified before the grand jury that he had received \$500 for his services. He told the jury that he notified the coroner's office that Raymond died of natural causes and still held that opinion.

Statements Verified
Wagner corroborated Mrs. Raymond's statement before the grand jury that she was in Kelly's apartment when her sweetheart called her husband on the telephone and then left for the Raymond home.

Her admission came as a startling close to a hectic day. She told the jury that, in company with her chum, Miss Helen Wilkinson, she went to Kelly's apartment Saturday evening. There, she testified, she told Kelly of

remarks her husband had made concerning her relations with Kelly. The film actor telephoned Raymond, and while Raymond remained in Kelly's apartment, he went to the Raymond residence, and the fight between the two men resulted.

Mrs. Raymond previously had told detectives that she was buying Easter eggs for her 13-year-old daughter when the fight occurred.

Forces of America Attacked In South

Washington, April 21.—(P)—Two attacks on American naval forces in Nicaragua yesterday by "revolutionists or bandits," were reported to the navy department today by Admiral Julian I. Latimer.

Latimer said no Americans were killed or wounded in the fighting.

One attack occurred at Chichigalpa, where 50 or 60 shots were fired. American forces returned the fire and two of the attacking force were killed and three were wounded, Latimer said.

The other attack occurred on a force of 24 men at Posoltega by 50 mounted revolutionists. The attacking party was driven off when American troops returned their fire. Three attackers were killed, one was wounded and two were captured.

Pay Day For Teachers Means Roll of \$11,000

Tomorrow is pay day for the Bend school teachers. Checks for \$11,559.12 were drawn today by J. C. Rhodes, clerk of the district. The payroll for the union high school teachers is \$2822.50 and for grade and junior high school teachers, \$5126.62. This does not include those employed by the school district by the month as janitors, stenographers and clerks. That payroll, known as the short payroll, is made up at the first of the month.

DAUGHTER SLAYER TERMED MONSTER

Life Sentence Asked For Mrs. Stoble

Freehold, N. J., April 21.—(P)—Mrs. Christina Stoble, who killed her 15 year old daughter as the girl lay with a new born infant in her arms, was mercifully condemned as a monster unworthy of the name of mother as the state summed up her trial for murder today.

Mrs. Stoble, a bent, emotionless figure in black, heard John J. W. Quinn, prosecutor, tell the jury that execution was too good for her and ask for a life sentence, where she would be cut off forever from society.

Quinn made a brief but dramatic summing up during which there was not a sound in the court room but the mournful ringing of his voice.

3,000,000 acres of land inundated. Additional rains over the upper valley, principally in Arkansas, brought promise of still greater casualties and damage.

The highest river stage since 1903 was predicted for St. Louis as tributaries to the north continued to swell. New breaks in the river levees below here meanwhile were opening the way for water to sweep over even more of the valley.

PUMPS NEEDED

Kansas City, Mo., April 21.—With the Missouri river at the highest stage it has reached in 10 years, city engineers today were ready to start operation of two large flood pumps in the event of an overflow.

Torrential rains that swelled tributary streams have caused the Missouri to rise two feet within 24 hours, and the stage was near 25 feet today.

ILLINOIS IS UP

Beardstown, Ill., April 21.—Water of the Illinois river was creeping slowly over Beardstown

today.

The anticipated flood, the first along the Illinois, began last night when Combs' levee gave way. The entire lowland area had been evacuated, however. The flood added 1000 homeless to the rapidly increasing total of destitute.

The new flood comes just as the city was beginning to recover from similar overflows of the Illinois last spring and fall.

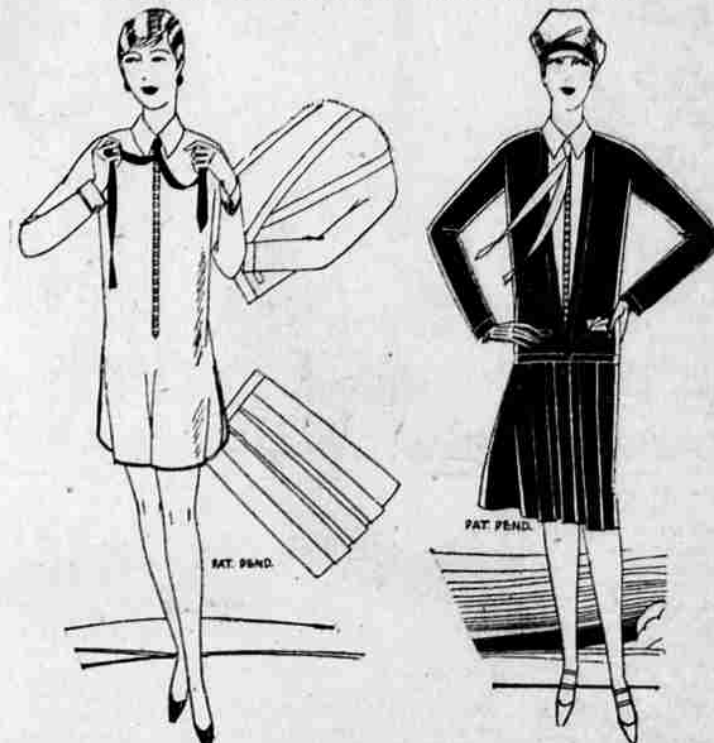
LEVEE BREAKS
