### Not Guilty Plea Made In Canada Rum Case

San Francisco, April 21.—(UP)—Frank Parsons, Canadian insurance broker, charged with liquor conspiracy, pleaded not guilty today when arraigned in federal court.

Date of the trial was not set. Parsons' attorney, Walter Duane, advised the court he would file demurrers to the indictment within 48 hours.

Parsons asked permission of the court to return to Vancouver on business. His request was taken under advisement.

Parsons' arraignment today was a legal point in his favor. The date had been set for April 20 but his attorneys were successful in having the case moved up.

### GAG RULE FIGHT AROUSES CAMPUS

#### State University Scene of Hot Battle

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 21.—(Special.)—The hottest fight that has shaken the student body for many years was under way today with Sol Abramson, of Portland, editor of the Oregon Daily Emerald, conducting a spirited battle for freedom of the press.

An amendment to put control of the Emerald's editorial policies in the hands of the publications committee was drafted by leading members of the student council which started the campaign against the Emerald. According to the Emerald, the amendment, which Abramson has branded as the "gag rule", was framed by Lowell Baker of Stanfield, Thomas Graham of Oak Grove, Phil Bergh of Roseburg, Ted Larsen of Eugene, Mary Clark of Heppner and Glenn Fisher of Portland.

Each day the Emerald is printing two-column endorsements of its stand on the first page. The communication columns are filled with letters from students for and against the amendment.

Hugh Biggs, of Ontario, student body president, who is supporting the amendment, declares that it is only wise and just to put the editorial policies in the hands of a committee which, more truly than the editor, represents student public opinion.

Abramson contends that a self-respecting newspaper cannot be conducted when it is subject to censorship and that his policies have represented the student body as closely as those of the student council.

In point of interest the free press controversy is overshadowing the student elections, and will be decided in two weeks.

### Very Aged Sandstone Found In This State

Berkeley, Cal., April 21.—(UP)—A difference of opinion, of some years standing, as to the age of certain sandstones found in Lincoln, Columbia, Coos and Lane counties, Oregon, has been definitely settled by Dr. Hubert Schenck, former assistant in the department of geology, University of California, now connected with the Stanford university.

The sandstones are of the Oligocene period in the earth's history, which closed about 10,000,000 years ago, according to popular estimates. Schenck also points out that there is sufficient data upon which to base the establishment of a new horizon to be called lower Oligocene.
