COUNTY GRANGERS WILL MEET IN JUNE

Plans Are Outlined For Session

Grangers of Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook counties will hold a tri-county picnic at the Deschutes fair grounds on June 25 with a program of sports outlined as the chief entertainment feature of the day. The biggest single event is to be the horse-shoe pitching contest, according to plans announced today by H. P. Beck, chairman of the sports committee for the picnic.

As many horse-shoe pitching teams as desired may be entered by each grange in the three counties, the only restriction being that all members of each team must belong to the same grange. Prizes will be awarded to the granges as well as to individual members of the winning team. Beck said. The finals in the horse-shoe pitching will be staged in front of the grandstand, a 50-point match with regulation shoes and standard rules. In the preliminary games, each contestant may use his own horse shoes or those provided by the committee.

Another special event will be a "mystery stunt" for which only masters of Pomona or subordinate granges will be eligible. The nature of this event is being kept secret until the time of the contest, the only description furnished by Beck being that the event is "something that none of them has ever done, but which is a very popular sport with both young and old." The prize in this event, donated by the Redmond Commercial club, will be a brief case stamped with the name of the winning grange. A complete program of events, with a prize list, will be announced later, Beck said.

OPENING OF PASS NOT ON PROGRAM

Present Work For Maintenance

Rumors that the state highway department has begun the attack on McKenzie pass snow banks with a view to opening the road to traffic were emphatically denied here this morning by C. W. Wanzer, division engineer. Only the regular maintenance crews, working with ordinary equipment, are busy on the McKenzie highway.

"We are trying to make it possible for those who want to reach the snow fields to have a good road and that is all we are trying to do," Wanzer said. "The maintenance crew from Sisters is using a truck and a blade, following up the road as fast as the snow melts away. Of course they can cut through small drifts of soft snow, but that doesn't mean they will tackle the main drifts that are blocking the pass."

"We are now working more than two miles below Windy point, and anyone familiar with the McKenzie country knows that Windy point is nowhere near the top of the pass."

"After the survey planned by R. W. Sawyer and T. R. Conway is made we will be in a better position to say whether the pass can be opened now," Wanzer said. "In the meantime, we are merely working up from Sisters as fast as the snow will let us."
