Cline Falls Defeats School Consolidation

Redmond and Pleasant Ridge Favor It

New Board Elected in District 21 Yesterday As All Districts Vote

Redmond, Oregon, June 21.—(Special)—The proposed consolidation of Pleasant Ridge and Cline Falls school districts with Redmond was defeated at the election held yesterday. The measure carried in Redmond and Pleasant Ridge districts but was defeated in Cline Falls.
 The vote must be favorable in all districts concerned in consolidation, according to the state law governing such measures.
 E. C. Parker was re-elected to the Redmond school board at the annual election yesterday. Max Canning was re-elected clerk of the board at the same election.
 The budget for the Redmond school district was adopted at the annual tax payers meeting held last night. It was within the six percent limitation.
 An entire new school board will have charge of affairs in school district number 21 during the coming year. Two new directors were named last night and a third must be named now to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of W. G. Brown from the district. J. Alton Thompson, county superintendent says.
 P. J. Peterson and Charles Schuler were elected last night. They will take the places formerly held by Ed Young, whose term expired, and H. Heigerson, who resigned.
 A petition to resubmit the proposed bond issue to a vote of the district is before the board now. Thompson says. The proposed bonds for \$4280 to build a new school house were defeated recently at a special election.
 S. Christopherson was elected to the school board in district 22 at the election yesterday. Thompson has been informed. J. H. Baker was elected clerk of the board.

Greater Oregon Field Executive Visits Bend

J. King Bryon, field worker for the Greater Oregon association, was in Bend today. The association is interested in defeating the state income tax and the assessors' "blue blank" provision adopted by the last legislature. Both will be voted upon at the special election June 29.

The income tax was referred to the vote of the people by the legislature and the "blue blank" measure was referred upon petition of the people.
