### STRANGLER HELD IN MURDER CASE

#### Coroner's Jury Votes Him Responsible

Winnipeg, June 21. — (P)—Earle Nelson was held responsible for the deaths of a Winnipeg woman and girl by a coroner's jury which late yesterday heard testimony of 26 witnesses in police court here. In a verdict reached after deliberating an hour, the jury found that Mrs. Emily Patterson, 34, and Leola Cowan, 14, were killed by smothering and strangling and held Nelson responsible.

Throughout the hearing, which lasted two hours, the alleged murderer was apparently unconcerned as he sat heavily guarded within a few feet of the witness stand.

Nelson was formally charged with murdering the woman and girl soon after his capture at Killarney last week, but was not asked to plead the counts. The case will be resumed Thursday. Indications today were that in event Nelson pleads not guilty he will be placed on trial early in July.

#### IDENTIFIED BY GROCER

Portland, June 21. — (P)—Earle Nelson, alias Earle Ferrell, held at Winnipeg, Canada, for murder, was tentatively identified here today as Adrian Harris, the accused strangler of Mrs. Blanche Myers, Portland. Shown a picture which police received from Winnipeg authorities, Russell Gordon, grocery clerk, declared: "That is the man." Gordon is known to have become acquainted with the "dark

strangler" who choked the life out of Mrs. Myers and who is suspected of having killed Mrs. Florence Monks, Seattle, and three other Portland women.

All the "strangler" murders in the Pacific northwest occurred last October and November.

Gordon, who sold groceries to Harris several times, was positive that the picture of the man held at Winnipeg was that of the man sought here.

In a car accompanying the stage were Conway, Henry Sackett, Wanser's assistant, and County Treasurer Clyde M. McKay. Conway, Sullivan and Reed went on to Eugene. Walter Hodge, of the highway engineering force, was also driving through. Just ahead of the stage went a Salem car in which Jim Linn and George Putnam, editor of the Salem Capital Journal, were on their way home.

Although autos were getting through without too great difficulty today, the pass will be actually open until this evening. It was apparent, checking the announcement made by Wanser after inspecting the condition of the road. Snow is melting rapidly, and the work of the sun, plus the shovels of the state, was making the clearing of the way only a matter of hours.

### Newspapers in Butte And Anaconda to Quit

Butte, Mont., June 2. — (P)—Butte and Anaconda, the world's largest "mining camps", will be newspaperless tomorrow morning unless something unforeseen occurs to change decision of publishers to suspend. Decision to suspend followed failure of attempts to settle differences between the local typographical union and the newspapers. Printers seek a daily wage increase of \$1.75 and a 7 1/2 hour day. The Butte Miner-Post and Anaconda Standard have announced that publication will be suspended at 2 o'clock this afternoon, the hour the printers' strike is scheduled to start.
