

The Dalles Issues Challenge To Bend For Two Games Of Ball

ONE CONTEST WILL BE HERE

Meeting Called to Outline Plans

A two game baseball series between the Bend Elks and The Dalles after the end of the Mid Columbia League season was in prospect today with receipt of a challenge from Manager McMahon of The Dalles.

"The fans want to see the two teams battle some more and The Dalles team is more than willing," McMahon said in a special dispatch to The Bulletin. "If Bend thinks it has a team that can win we will play them two more games, one at Bend and the other at The Dalles, the winner to take 75 percent of the gate and the loser 25 percent."

To Accept Challenge
Harold Kline, chairman of the Elks baseball committee, was eager to accept McMahon's challenge, but suggested that since The Dalles seemed so sure of winning the arrangement should be "winner take all."

Members of the Elks committee, interviewed by Kline following receipt of the challenge this morning, were inclined to endorse his proposal and a meeting of the committee was called for 7:30 o'clock this evening in the Elks club rooms to decide details of the games. Players on the Bend squad, called into a conference this noon, expressed a willingness to play on either the 75-25 basis, or the winner take all plan.

Under the terms of the challenge, rules of the Mid Columbia league will govern the contests, the teams being restricted to the playing roster turned in for Mid Columbia games. This would have both teams in practically the same shape as during last Sunday's game, with Bend minus the services of Fred Roberts, who was seriously injured in an auto accident Sunday morning. The result of Sunday's game, which The Dalles won 6 to 5, gave The Dalles an edge over Bend for the league pennant.

The Dalles has two Mid Columbia league games to play and must win both of them in order to make sure of the pennant. A postponed game with Hood River is scheduled for Friday afternoon, according to word received here from league officials, and the regular Goldendale game will be played Sunday. Hood River, which has been playing close to the cellar spot for the past two months, is rated as a set up for The Dalles, but upon Goldendale the Wasco county boys may stub their toes. Ralph and Bud Russell, former Bend boys who are on the Goldendale squad, expressed the opinion here this week that Goldendale will put the battle of the season in an effort to tumble The Dalles back into a tie with Bend.

One Game Remains
In case Goldendale succeeds in its ambition, the playoff series between The Dalles and Bend will have to be arranged in accordance with Mid Columbia rules. Bend has but one game to play, the one with Dufur Sunday, and according to reports reaching Bend today there is a possibility that the Dufur nine will be unable to play. The Dufur management is reported to be having difficulty holding the team together for the last game of the season in which it is conceded they have but a slim chance for victory. Definite announcement of the plans for next Sunday is expected at the committee meeting tonight.

The man was bleeding to death when Mrs. O. A. Jensen, a nurse, arrived in another car. She ran to a nearby house, obtained ice and bound it to the wound with a makeshift bandage. The blood flow was stopped and Shelburne will recover.
