Portland, July 21.—(UP)—A crew now surveying the Bend-Burns road will be transferred to the Bend-Lakeview highway some time next month to locate that route, it has been ordered by the state highway commission.

It is pointed out that while some sections of the Bend-Lakeview highway have been improved the entire route has never been located and the work was ordered to clear up this unfinished work.

More than half the distance of the Bend-Burns road has been covered and the route has been shortened 11 miles, it was announced.

Surveyors on the Bend-Burns highway project are working near Riley this week, according to word received at the highway department office here. It is expected that the survey will be completed by August 19 or 15, and at that time the survey of the new Bend-Lakeview highway will begin.

J. C. Burns, head of the surveying party now working on the Bend-Burns road, will probably be sent in to the La Pine

STORM'S VICTIM HELD DESTITUTE

Griffin Seeking Arrest of Amburgey

Portland, July 21.—(UP)—Archie Griffin, a brother of Mrs. Marjorie Amburgey, who almost lost her life in a blizzard in the timber country between Lakeview and Paisley, Oregon, last March, seeks a warrant for the arrest of David Amburgey, the woman's husband.

Griffin maintained that his sister, who lost her left foot in battling the elements, is destitute. Mrs. Amburgey was alone in the freezing snows with her three children, two of whom were frozen to death.

On July 4, another child was born and the crippled mother is alone with the two children.

Griffin sought Amburgey's arrest on a charge of non-support. Amburgey is still in the country between Lakeview and Paisley, but Mrs. Amburgey was brought to Portland soon after her foot was amputated in a Lakeview hotel.

Mrs. Amburgey was alone in a tiny cabin last March and one Saturday night started for a neighbor's place, taking her children with her. She became lost in a blizzard, and was not found until Monday.

Two of her babies were frozen but the third, huddled between the mother and a sheep dog, lived.
