## Parley On Armaments Is Shifted to London

London, July 21.—(AP)—The center of the naval armaments conference shifted to London today. W. C. Bridgman, first lord of the admiralty, and Lord Cecil, both of whom returned from Geneva late yesterday, arranged for conferences with the cabinet and with naval experts at the admiralty.

In government circles it was reported that Bridgman, head of the British delegation at the armaments conference, would lay before the government proposals which were said to constitute the basis of an agreement reached among the three powers at the conference earlier in the week.

## SENATOR SMOOT MEETS COOLIDGE

### Nation's Finances Is Subject Discussed

Rapid City, S. D., July 21.—(AP)—Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee, which will frame the tax reduction bill at the next session of congress, arrived today for a conference with President Coolidge on the state of the nation's finances.

Smoot indicated that he might have his committee meet before the regular December session begins so that it might work hand in hand with the house ways and means committee in framing the tax reduction bill.

The exact extent to which reduction can go cannot be determined as yet, he said. An announcement was made from the executive offices today that John Coolidge, the president's son, would come here about the middle of August for a three weeks vacation, indicating the president will remain in the Black

## Small Boy Injured When Dogs Battle

Richard Aiken, 2-year-old son of Fred Aiken, was in St. Charles hospital here today as the result of a dog fight. The small boy, visiting the George Graft ranch near La Pine, with his father, was standing just inside the door of the ranch house when two Airedale dogs attacked each other in the yard. Opening the screen door, the boy evidently attempted to stop the fight. The battle swept over him and in the general confusion he received several severe cuts on the head and neck.

The boy was brought to the hospital here shortly after midnight. He was operated upon this morning and, unless infection develops, was expected to recover soon. One of the wounds narrowly missed the jugular vein, while another cut was in his cheek, one tooth having been knocked out by the dog's fangs.

## Mrs. Snyder Requests Mate to Take Blame

New York, July 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder, convicted of slaying her husband, Albert Snyder, was reported today to be trying to persuade Henry Judd Gray, also convicted of the murder, to accept full blame for the crime. If Gray agreed and Mrs. Snyder was released as a result, she would make every effort to save him from the electric chair, she was said to have promised. Warden Kawes and other officials at Sing Sing prison, where Mrs. Snyder and Gray are imprisoned in the death house, said Mrs. Snyder had not communicated with her former lover so far as they know.
