Missouri Senator Will
Give Way to Successor

Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 21.—(UP)—
The resignation of U. S. Senator
Harry B. Hawes, St. Louis, was re-
ceived today at the office of Govern-
or Guy B. Park.

Hawes resigned so that Governor
Park could appoint Senator-elect
Bennett Champ Clark of St. Louis
to the position, allowing him to enter
the next session of congress with
seniority over other newly elected
senators.

Governor Park was out of the city
today, and will take no action on
Hawes' resignation until Monday.

McEWAN RESIGNS

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 21.—(UP)—
Captain John J. McEwan, suspended
and football coach at Holy Cross
college, resigned today.

McEwan, one time head coach at
West Point and Oregon, was sus-
pended by college authorities soon
after Holy Cross was defeated by
Brown.

The breach between McEwan and
college officials developed from his
differences with Bart Sullivan, vet-
erinary trainer and track coach, who
had been connected with Holy Cross

CAR LOADINGS GAIN

Washington, Jan. 21.—(UP)—The American Railway association today announced that loadings of revenue freight for the week ending January 14 totaled 506,322 cars, an increase of 70,670 over the preceding week but 66,327 cars less than in the corresponding week of 1932.

Miscellaneous freight loadings totaled 150,855 cars, an increase of 19,375 above the preceding week, but 28,225 under the corresponding week a year ago.
Less than carload lot freight totaled 158,896 cars, an increase of 25,362 above the preceding week, but 27,727 below last year's corresponding week.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 21.—(UP)—A dividend of 6 per cent was declared by the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers on all outstanding common stock, it was announced today.

Hoover's 'Cousin' Blocks Move To Forclose on His Farm



A. E. Hoover, above, who says he is a cousin of President Hoover, has forestalled foreclosure of a \$14,000 mortgage on his farm near Grand Meadows, Minn., through a plea by a committee of the Minnesota Farmers' Holiday association. Accompanied by the committee, Hoover went to Des Moines, Iowa, and effected a compromise with the mortgage holder through the joint stock land bank there. The compromise, it was reported, will allow Hoover to stay on his farm as a renter. According to Hoover, he had missed one semi-annual payment of \$400 and was faced with eviction and loss of his stock, machinery and household goods, as are many midwestern farmers. Hoover says his father and the president's father were brothers. Hoover says that he, like the president, was born in West Branch, Iowa.
