

Oregon State Hoopers Cling to Half Game Lead in Division Standings

WASHINGTON SECOND NOW

W. S. C. Pushed Down to Third Place

Portland, Ore., Feb. 13.—(UP)—Oregon State's flag chasers start the week's northern division coast conference basketball play tonight with the same half-game lead over the nearest rival that they had last week.

It is Washington that now crowds the Beavers, however. The Huskies supplanted Jack Friel's Washington State by winning two straight games at Seattle, shoving the Cougars into third place.

Cold dope would favor the Beavers to hold that half-game lead, or end in a tie with Washington, but with the three leaders grouped so closely, anything might happen this week.

Either Idaho or Oregon will have to measure the Orange, if Washington is to get out ahead. The big advantage for the Beavers is that they play three of five remaining games at home, two against Idaho and one against Oregon, and the remaining two games only 40 miles away, against Oregon at Eugene. The Beavers, too, meet the two teams that are weaker in standings than any others.

The Huskies, to the contrary, have a road trip to Pullman and Moscow in which four games will be played in five days. The first two tilts, Friday and Saturday, will be against the powerful Cougars, twice-beaten at Seattle but doubly dangerous on their own court. The Huskies end the season with two games against Oregon at Seattle.

Should Oregon State and Washington sail through unbeaten, a three-game playoff series would be necessary. Each would have won 13, lost three. The play-off would react in favor of the Trojans, who apparently have won the southern title. A minor sensation last week was that Oregon won a game. The Web-feet after losing to the Beavers and Idaho, turned around and trampled the Vandals. Cap Roberts and Homer Stahl, leader of the bench brigade for three seasons, got their mad up and won the game.

New York.—The 57th annual dog show of the Westminster Kennel club opened its three-day session at Madison Square Garden today with 2340 bluebloods entered. They represent 15 breeds. The judging of 130 Scottish terriers and 107 wire-haired fox terriers features today's competition.

New York.—Ernie Schaaf, heavyweight boxer confined to Polytechnic hospital with an intra-cranial hemorrhage and partial paralysis of the left side, was being studied today to determine whether an operation would be necessary to remove a blood clot on the brain. It was learned Schaaf was still semi-conscious from the pounding he received Friday night from Primo Carnera before being knocked out. The latest bulletin from the hospital said his condition was "unchanged." Dr. William V. Healey, attending Schaaf, and S. Phillips Goodhart, professor of clinical neurology at Columbia university, who Dr. Healey called into consultation, believe that the partial left side paralysis indicates formation of a blood clot on the right side of the brain.

Football Rule Changes Adopted By Committee

New York, Feb. 13.—(UP)—The nation's football coaches, increasingly important factors in college athletic systems because of the depression, enjoyed additional prestige today when the national football rules committee announced adoption of two rule changes they had recommended.

Emerging from its secret three-day session at Philadelphia, the rules committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association announced these changes in the existing code:

1. Side zones, 10 yards wide, were established on either side of the field to eliminate loss of downs on futile side line plays. This will strengthen the game's offensive side.

2. The definition of "clipping" was broadened to include any contact with the back of a player not carrying the ball, and the penalty for "clipping" was reduced from 25 yards to 15 to insure prompt penalizing by hitherto hesitant field officials.

Both changes were recommended a week ago at the first annual meeting of the recently organized rules committee of the American Football Coaches association.

The new definition of "clipping" will make it illegal for a player to run into the back of an opponent not carrying the ball. This is in addition to the previous rule against throwing or dropping the body across the back of an opponent's legs below the knees.

Under the new side line rule, when the ball becomes dead in the side

zones it will be moved immediately to a point 10 yards from the side lines without time being taken out. If the ball goes out of bounds, it will be brought in 10 yards from the side line instead of 15 as heretofore.

Clashes In Germany Seen Over Weekend

Berlin, Feb. 13.—(UP)—Clashes between nazis and communists left nine men dead and 40 injured over the weekend. Several of the injured were expected to die.

The most serious fight occurred at Eisleben, Saxony, where two nazis were killed and 12 communists wounded. Little hope was held for recovery of four of the injured. Nazis stormed a building housing a communist bookshop, from which the nazis charged, communists opened fire on a nazi parade.

Marseilles, Feb. 13.—(UP)—Former

Premier Edouard Herriot, who recently accused Premier Mammolini of Italy of declining to cooperate with him for safeguarding European peace, warred today against Vice-chancellor Von Papen's alleged plans to reestablish a militaristic regime in Germany. Herriot viewed the exterior situation as serious. "Italy should not be softened by concessions, which she interprets as weakness," he said.

MUSSOLINI PLANS ELECTION
Rome, Feb. 13.—(UP)—Premier Benito Mussolini will dissolve the Italian chamber this summer and call for new elections in March, 1934, it was announced today.

LAVA BEARS WIN IN CLOSE CONTEST

Redmond's Players Show Big Improvement

In a non-conference game in Redmond Saturday night, Coach Bill Tweedie's basket shooters of the northern Deschutes county town forced the Lava Bears of Bend, winners of all conference tilts played this season, to the limit to win. The final score was 15 to 12 for Bend, but at the end of the third quarter Redmond held a one point lead, 9 to 8. The half score was 6 to 4 in favor of the Lava Bears.

Redmond, decisively defeated by Bend in the regular conference game earlier in the season, showed marked improvement and is now recognized as a real contender for the midstate title, to be determined in a tournament on February 24 and 25. Using a zone defense which the Lava Bears could not penetrate, Redmond had the Bend quintet considerably worried Saturday night and it is expected that the Lava Bears will no longer consider the tournament a one-sided affair.

Redmond's victory over Sisters on Friday night resulted in a three way tie for second place. Bend is perched on top of the percentage heap with a record of five wins and no defeats. Redmond, Madras and Sisters are tied for second place, with La Pine and Prineville bringing up the rear.

According to original plans, the four high teams were to take part in the Central Oregon tournament, with the team in first position playing the third position quintet and the second place team meeting the fourth place squad on the opening night, in Redmond. It will be practically impossible for the three second-place teams to play off their ties, so it is expected that the teams will have to be assigned tournament positions.

Next Friday night, the Lava Bears will go to Sisters for a non-conference game and on Saturday night The Dalles will come here to play Bend. Lineups of the Bend-Redmond game Saturday night:
