

Elks and Federals to Battle for First Place in League Sunday

NOW TIED FOR FIRST PLACE

Three Games Listed in Three Days

Leadership of the Oregon State league, considered the fastest circuit in that vast territory between the Columbia river and the northern boundary of California, will be at stake here tomorrow when the Elks of Bend and the Federals of Portland meet on the high school diamond. The fact that these nine are tied for the league leadership, with an average of .667, has provided a "natural" for the opening feature of Bend's Fourth of July celebration.

The Oregon State league game is the only event scheduled for Sunday and it is expected that a record crowd will be on hand due to the tie for circuit honors. Ray Brooks and his Federals, now sponsored by Ike Woller, are to arrive in Bend this afternoon and will do a little fishing. The Sunday game will be at the regular time, 2:30.

On Monday, the Federals will meet the Shamrocks in a morning game, at 10:30, on the high school diamond, and on July 4th the Federals will again clash with the Elks, at 10:30 a. m. in a non-league game. Between games, the Portland players will take time out to visit choice trout lakes.

Brooks reports that he is bolstering up his team considerably for the Bend game, realizing that the league leadership is at stake, and is to bring to this city practically the same team he used last season in winning the circuit title. "Joe Gordon, my last season's shortstop, hit back again and he is without doubt the best in this city," writes Brooks. "Walter Schlichte, the little outfielder that went from my club to Scappas at the start of the season, will probably be back in uniform."

The Federal manager has hopes of bringing Bobby Grayson, former Jefferson high star and now one of Stanford's outstanding ball stars, to Bend for the fourth of July games, providing Grayson can get away. Art Zerk, former Bend player and more recently in organized ball, also wants to make the trip here, but Brooks has so many stars on his club he is not certain he can sign Parker.

Clarence Murphy, outstanding pitcher in the Oregon State league, with four victories to his credit in recent games, will be on the mound for Bend tomorrow. Murphy may also have to do the chucking on the morning of July 4th, since Clyde Wunder recently underwent an operation.

MAJOR LEAGUES
New York, July 1.—(UP)—Washington regained undisputed possession of the American league lead by beating Detroit, 2 to 1, while the New York Yankees dropped out of a top tie by losing to Cleveland, 12 to 12.

Chicago dropped a 4 to 2 decision to Boston when Henry Johnson let the Sox down with four hits. Philadelphia and St. Louis split a doubleheader, the Browns winning the opener 12 to 11 when pinch-hitter Gurns wound up a four-run spurt in the ninth by driving in the winning tally with a single. Jimmy Fox hit his 20th homer. The Athletics took the nightcap, 11 to 7, Frankie Higgins accounting for six of their runs with five hits in five times. His mate, Bob Johnson, made a homer in the 9th.

The New York Giants' National league lead was reduced to two and a half games when they were blanked, 1 to 0, by St. Louis. Pittsburgh lost ground by bowing to the Phillies, 5 to 4.

Brooklyn trounced Chicago, 6 to 3, after a three-run burst in the seventh that resulted from four hits. Boston scored its fifth straight victory, beating Cincinnati 9 to 2 when Ben Cantwell held the Reds to seven hits for his tenth win of the season.

There's little doubt that Lefty, who hasn't hit under .319 since his full-time introduction to big league baseball in 1928, is going to put an added punch in that Terry crew that will go a long way toward keeping them in the winning frame of mind they have displayed recently.

It may be that Bill Terry, who is earning himself quite some reputation as a manager since taking the helm of the Giants, has forseen a break in his boys' play—and added O'Doul to the roster as a psychological move.

He'll Get Going
The great O'Doul, leading hitter of last year in the old loop, slumped miserably this year. His swatting mark at the time of the deal with the Dodgers was just about the size of your hat—290.

Lefty, the guy who has been traded, exchanged, chased and given away by the Phillies and Dodgers, is known as "the man in the green suit." He came by that classification honestly. When he'd get into a slump he'd don an old green suit he has—and he's been wearing it so much lately that 'tis just about ready to part company with him!

But the former southpaw who was made into an outfielder by Miller Huggins, is going to hit his stride before long, and when he does, 't'll be curtains for National league pitchers.

Who'll Warm the Bench?
At present the Giants' outfield consists of Moore, left; Ott, right, and Davis, center.

Terry can't replace Mel Ott out there in right for the simple reason that the young feller has a sizable batting attack himself, and can cover a lot of ground. So it remains to be seen whether Moore or Davis.

It is our guess that Lefty will be out there in place of Moore.

New York, July 1.—(UP)—The only St. George Maxie Baer ever heard of is the hotel in Brooklyn, but the California pig-sticker is ready to go out and lambast himself a dragon on just as did the mythical Englishman in the days when knight-hood was in flower.

The dragon he craves to get hold of is Primo Carnera, the new heavyweight champion of the world. We caught Baer in his hotel suite today just as he returned from luncheon with a blonde baby doll.

"We'll have to talk fast," he said, "for I've got a date with the sweetest thing you ever laid eyes on in half an hour and it's going to take me half that time to pick out the right suit and tie."

Okay, what did he think of Carnera?
"Right down my alley, right down my alley. I never saw a better target than that jaw of his. It just sticks out there waiting to be slammed. And when he gets in there with me he's got a surprise coming, for he's going to find me the first man he ever met stronger than he is. The first time he tries that business of pushing and shoving he worked on Sharkey, I'm going to grab him around the middle and slam him up against one of the ring posts. And don't think I can't do it. He's tough but I'm tougher."

Did he subscribe to the belief that Carnera's jaw was invincible—that it was impossible to hurt him?
"That's crazy talk. I'll give you the best telephone number in my book if he doesn't go down when I catch him with my right swing. Remember, he's not such a leviathan bigger than I am."

Was he sorry that Carnera had decided against defending his title until next year?
"Yeah, I'm sorry, and I think he's crazy. I'm the only guy he can fight and make any real money. And right now the match is red-hot and would draw enough to make us both a pile of money. But that's his business. Maybe he's smart after all, for once he gets in there with me he's through as champion."

How would he like to fight with Sharkey in September?
"I wouldn't mind fighting him. It would be good exercise. But what would be the use? Sharkey is through as a card, washed up, and wouldn't draw haircut money. Of course, if somebody gave me a good guarantee I'd be glad to knock his head off."

Baer's manager, Ancil Hoffman, supplied the information that he didn't care whether Carnera waited one year or two before meeting his man.

"What do we care," Hoffman said, "I've got enough offers in my pocket to keep Baer on the road for a year. Maxie is young and the experience he gains in these boxing exhibitions is good for him."

Notice to Delinquents
Effective June 9, 1933
Chapter 462 Oregon Laws, 1933, waives and cancels all penalties and interest charged and accrued on taxes due on your real and personal property for the year 1933 and prior years and requires that on or before July 1, 1933 you must pay ten per cent (10%) of these taxes, the balance to be paid in nine equal semi-annual payments.
From July 1, 1933, the unpaid balance of these taxes shall be charged interest at the rate of two-thirds of one per cent per month and installments not paid on due date will be charged a two per cent penalty.
Section 4 of this law reads as follows:
"Whenever one installment of such delinquent taxes on personal property shall be past due, the tax collector shall proceed forthwith to collect the full amount of such delinquent taxes with penalty and interest and, in so doing, shall resort to and employ any or all of the remedies and processes of law for the collection of delinquent taxes on personal property."
See the other sections of the act which affect your real and personal property.
A small payment made before July 1 may allow you to save your property.
