Americans In London Again Seeking Advice

(Continued from page one)

European governments was interpreted in some quarters today as a back-fire against possible failure of the London economic conference to deal with the problem of trade barriers.

There is no indication of any hostility to the conference in the movement for trade agreements initiated this week. But it appeared significant that Roosevelt contemplated agreements on so wide a front stretching from Scandinavia to Latin-America.

Identical instructions went to American diplomats in Argentina, Brazil and Colombia to inform foreign offices that Roosevelt desired to begin explanatory studies.

The president plans to include Chile, Sweden, and perhaps Norway in the initial negotiations. As they progress, other nations probably will be invited to join.

Whether the ambassadors and ministers of the various countries will conduct negotiations or whether special representatives will be sent here is a matter for the foreign governments to determine. Roosevelt would prefer the utmost informality.

The president was rather taken with the idea of a seasonal apple tariff to permit importation of the Argentine fruit in June, July and August when the American product is from the bottom of the cold storage barrel. But it developed that Argentina is not an apple exporter and it is assumed that Roosevelt's advisers cited apples as an illustration of what might be done rather than as a definite objective. Other Argentine fruit might be so handled.

New York, July 13.—(UP)—America's delegation to the world economic conference came out with the national pants and shirt intact, but only after an unimpressive display of "muddle-headed blundering," Arthur J. Nowatt, editor of the New York News, said today upon his return from London.

The conference was ill-advised, untimely, and poorly managed," he declared, "and the delegates played at cross purposes from the moment they landed in England until they came away—and yet the net result is that the United States didn't lose anything."

There may, in fact, be one good result from it," he added. "The nations over there may have discovered the fact that the United States isn't going to play Santa Claus any more."

Sinnott, who returned on the Manhattan with the party of Professor Raymond Moley, of the Roosevelt brain trust, watched events in London from early in June.

URGES ACTION ON WHEAT
London, July 13.—(UP)—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald appealed today for a rapid agreement on world wheat control which could be presented as a definite achievement to the world economic conference.

MacDonald addressed a meeting of the "big four" producers—the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina—with the Danubian countries, European importers and Russia. Describing the importance of wheat to the world's economic structure, he reminded the experts of their responsibility to humanity.

When Hendrikus Colijn of Holland moved that the wheat negotiations be thrown into a new conference sub-committee, Henry Morgenthau of the United States, Thomas Leblond of Argentina, R. B. Bennett of Canada and Howard Bruce of Australia, spoke and side-tracked the proposal. It was agreed the big four would meet the Russians and then the Danubians tomorrow.

Addressing the wheat section, London, July 13.—(UP)—American Prime Minister MacDonald revealed for the first time in any large public forum that it was the intention to recess the world economic conference by the end of July or early in August. He urged that everything possible be done to obtain a wheat agreement before adjournment.

MacDonald said that wheat was "the key that will open the door," and left no doubt that he was determined to see the delegates arrive at an accord on grain which might become the outstanding, tangible achievement of the major conference.

Washington, July 13.—(UP)—Sweden and Portugal were added today to the group of nations with which the United States actively is seeking trade agreements.

The state department announced American ministers in Lisbon and Stockholm had been instructed to inform the foreign offices President Roosevelt desired discussion of a trade agreement.

SILVER PRICES SOAR
Shanghai, July 13.—(UP)—Silver prices jumped to the highest peak since 1929 here today under heavy Chinese speculative buying.

Gold bars declined accordingly. The tremendous upswing in silver prices was attributed to cable advices that a silver agreement had been reached at the world economic conference.

New York, July 13.—(UP)—Prices on silver futures jumped sharply here today on advices that a silver agreement had been reached in London.

At 1:30 p. m., gains ranged from 15c to 18c points with upwards of 12,000,000 fine ounces having been traded.
